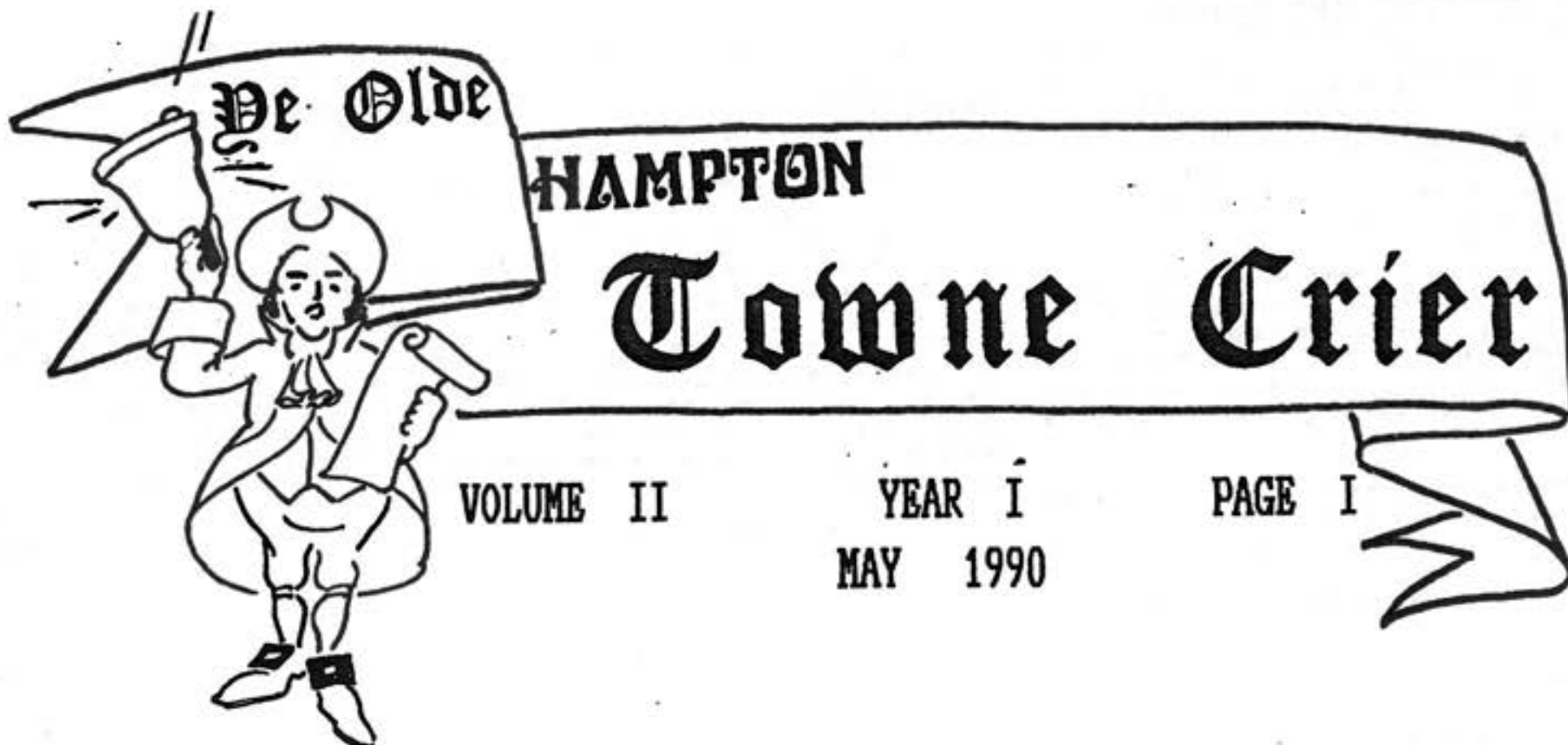




BIG HEARTY WELCOME TO NEW VILLAGE DENTIST, DR. RICHARD DAY!

CONTEL TO RAISE RATES

We waited right up to press time for "corrected" information that was reported in the *Daily Dispatch*. Since we did not receive such "correct" information on base rates, and per call charges, we feel that the rates mentioned in the *Dispatch* were very close with probably the question falling more in the area of terminology of where the tacked on charges fall. So, we will forward the new rate increases to you as we understand them to be.

In February Contel filed an application with the Ill. Commerce Commission asking for changes in local rates, long distant calls, and miscellaneous services. The increase is to take effect in July 1991. Only half of the town will be subject to these changes.

Those being the 496 exchange. Illinois Bell also has some shocking changes in store but they are very much milder than the proposed Contel changes.

Contel customers will be charged on "per-call", "per-zone" basis. The proposed rate for calling another 496 number is 5¢ each call with unlimited talking time. However, when calling outside the 496 prefix (like to the school, the village hall, fire dept.) it will cost 2.6¢ each call plus an additional 5.6¢ per minute. The base rate will be raising (and here is where terminology plays a part) from around \$20 to \$26 with the extended area service being dropped. There will be a \$30 ceiling on per-call charges (roughly 6

to 700 calls, depending if your calling is in or outside the 496 exchange - the per minute charges have no ceiling.

Many years back extensive effort was made through the legal system to acquire just one phone company for the entire village. To no avail. Neither could the commission ever explain when and why an incorporated area of a village was assigned a separate phone company. Our best hope for fair play will probably be that at least the entire village can pay the same rate regardless of which system your stuck-with!

The village has been in contact with an attorney from Springfield and will be filing an objection.

NEWS RELEASE

Hampton, Illinois, will hold its' second annual community *Open House* to attract new home buyers on Saturday, April 28th, and Sunday, April 29th.

According to Scott H. Newberg, president of the village board of trustees, "Last year's event proved to be a success. We brought new construction to Hampton. New dwellings were built in numbers exceeding that of many years prior to 1989. We look forward to meeting families interested in small town living along the shores of the Mississippi River."

If newcomers purchase lots, they will receive the benefit of three incentives: Rebate of municipal taxes for one year; building, plumbing and electrical permit fees will be waived, and there will be no water or sewer hookup fees.

To further entice visitors to Hampton, the same weekend will see a community-wide yard sale. Local residents are being urged to display and sell items they no longer use or need.

All municipal facilities will be available for inspection. Hampton's historic village hall will serve as a hospitality center. Visitors will receive detailed village information, refreshments, and meet with civic leaders.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Village has obtained the services of two additional police officers. We welcome officers Tim Scott and Doug Elliott to the community.

Chief Ott wants the villagers to beware of the bands of frauds that run scams of various sorts. Basically, there are two groups better-known-as the *Travelers* and the *Gypsies*. They operate in similar fashions trying to obtain access inside your home. They drive around and look for persons outside (preferable older people), then try the door to see if it has been left open. By the time you realize you have been robbed, they will probably be out of the area. Sometimes they will send one of their members to detain a victim out-of-doors while the partner goes through the home looking for valuables. And, of course, the house repair scam where they overcharge for repairs and the work is done with inferior products. The best advice? Keep your doors locked! Do not allow strangers into your home. Be sure to ask if they have obtained a village permit to sell. This would mean that they have an actual, paper permit. You should call the Village Hall 755-7165 to let Sue know that someone is in the area. If you

feel you are in jeopardy, call 911. If you feel you need to speak with an officer, call 794-9111.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Jaws-of-Life Fund is growing and as the figures rise so does the excitement. The goal is \$14,000. They are within about \$3,000 of achieving this purpose.

A big boost was given to the Fund recently when Contel, represented by Marybeth Sanders, presented Chief Cruse with a check for \$500. Just prior to that presentation, Cox Cable sent the department a check for \$200. The fire department has been working on this effort for 3½ years. Approximately 75% of accident calls require some form of extrication. Chief Cruse believes that once we have the equipment, they will receive many more calls for assistance. Currently we depend on Colona or Cordova.

Once the equipment is received, the crews will participate in an extensive training program. Then they will drill to stay proficient.

Our Volunteer Professionals have an average response per call of 14 persons. While not considered short-handed, the department is always looking for more volunteers. Please don't be scared off by reading about all of the paramedic skills being sought. Just plain, regular firefighters

(of with there are a majority) will be equally welcomed! Once you get in the spirit of volunteering for a worthy cause, the self-pride is reward enough.

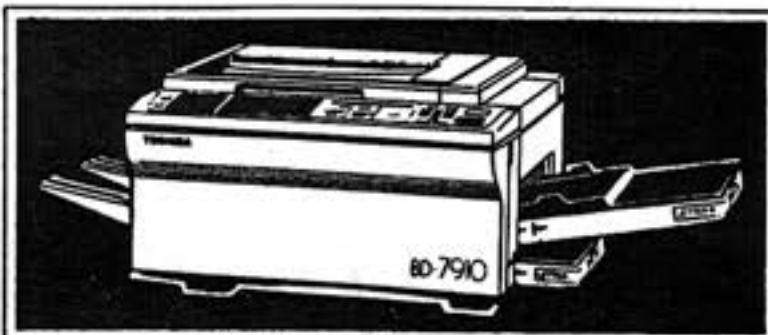
SIREN TESTING: The village tests the siren on Tuesday evenings before their meeting. This would occur between 6:15 & 6:30. On Saturday afternoon Silvis preforms a systems check by setting off the alarm from their headquarters. This is done at 2:00. Should you hear the alarm at any other time, it would indicate an actual emergency. If we are experiencing hazardous weather conditions, you would be well advised to seek cover!

LOOKING AHEAD: The dept. is not about to be caught unprepared with the expected growth in riverboat tourism. The fire departments in the 2 pools of waters from Dam 13-14 and 14-15 have formed a mutual rescue association, Illowa River Rescue Association (IRRA). In the event of a large vessel disaster many lives would be at stake.

SERVICES OFFERED

Many of us are not aware of the services provided at the Hampton Township Office, located on the "s" curve on Hwy. 84 as you enter East Moline.

They are there to answer questions you have regarding your taxes, real estate, and homestead exemption. You may register to vote.

All township residents are entitled to free services provided by the Clinic. The clinic is manned by 1 doctor and 2 nurses. They are equipped to do Blood workups, EKGs, general physicals shots, etc. School Physicals do require appointments; otherwise it is first come first served.

HYDRO PLANT UPDATE

The village has been in contact with a lawyer in Springfield who has expertise in the utilities field. It is the express intent of the village to acquire intervenor status with the ultimate goal of halting the installation of the hydro plant.

On the surface things appear to be at a standstill, but behind the scenes contacts, paperwork, and legalities are being served.

RECYCLING-THE WAIVE OF THE FUTURE

At best we can only admit that recycling is a necessary evil. It invades our routine; it makes work where we had ease; it requires we make a special effort to drive to a dump site; and most of all it infringes on our time.

But after many (too many) decades of living off the fat of the land, we are now faced head-on with the real issue that we all must become environmentalists. For the last year the village has been trying to acclimate us into the recycling process with a few items first. This has been strictly voluntary and, as such, has not caught on very well. The idea was to have the various village organizations man the center (located on the hill near the water tower) and share in the proceeds.

Very soon we will all be forced into recycling like it or not. We are burying ourselves in our own waste. Here is some surprising information on how long it takes to disintegrate a few items.

Paper napkins	2-4 mo.	Paper	2-5 mo.
Orange peels	6 mo.	Cotton rags	1-5 mo.
Rope	3-14 mo.	Milk ctns.	5 yrs
Filter tip cig.	1-12 yrs	Wood w/paint	13 yrs
Plastic bags	10-20 yrs	Leather shoes	40 yrs
Nylon cloth	30-40 yrs	Plas. Cont.	50-80yrs
Soup cans	100 yrs	Aluminum	200-500yrs
Plastic rings	450-7 yrs	Styrofoam	never

Currently the village is taking 3 kinds of items for recycling:

- Aluminum cans....from beverages, pop & beer
- Glass bottles....from pickles, jams, juice, baby food, wine, etc.
 - There is a separate dumpster for colored glass.(keep brown & green separate) *Sorry glass from windows and mirrors are not acceptable*
- Plastic Bottles...from milk, bleach, juice, laundry soaps, & opaque containers with dull surfaces. *Sorry we cannot take things like laundry baskets, toys, etc.*

Items should have the caps removed and be rinsed clean. Helpful hints in storing items until you accumulate enough to transport; To clean glass, put it in the empty spaces in your dishwasher. To store all items, put in a separate garbage can and divide when you get to the dump site, To conserve space, flatten plastic containers. Please do not break glass items. That is dangerous. You need not wait until Saturday to bring your items. There are several dumpsters, all are well marked for the various items! If in doubt, leave in bag outside of dumpster.

Can crushers can be purchased from Central Recycling and Transfer company (located at the landfill) for \$13.00.
