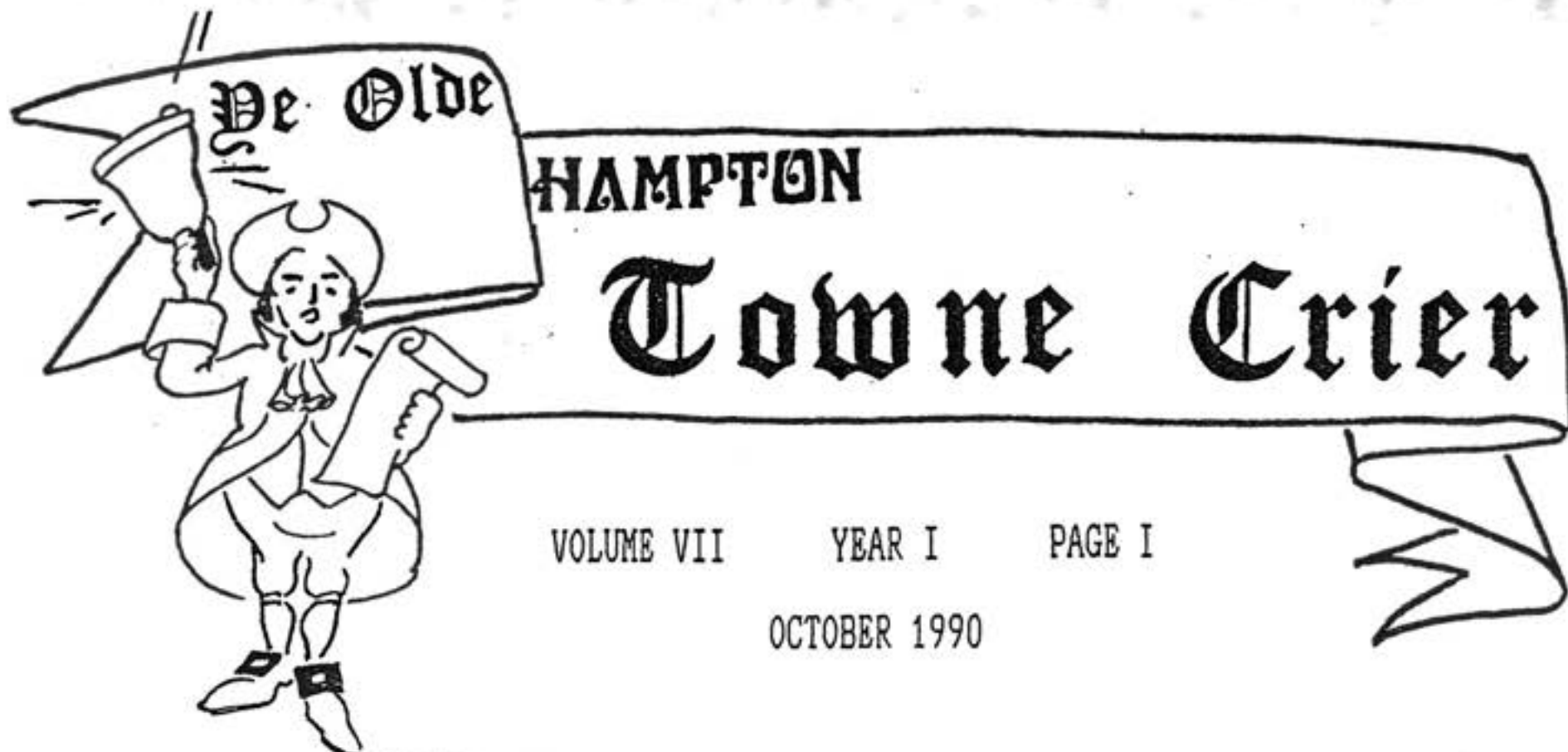




DIANA AND ADMIRAL LYLE BULL — A HOMETOWN SUCCESS STORY

"Dad," he said. "Oh, hi Bruce," the Admiral replied. "Dad," Bruce went on, "I almost ran our of fuel waiting for you to do something!" The father looked up at the son and said "Bruce, this is like a John Wayne movie."

Ron was born after Diana's Jr. year of college and Vince was born two weeks after she graduated. Diana majored in child psychology and Lyle jokes that she had her *lab course* at home.

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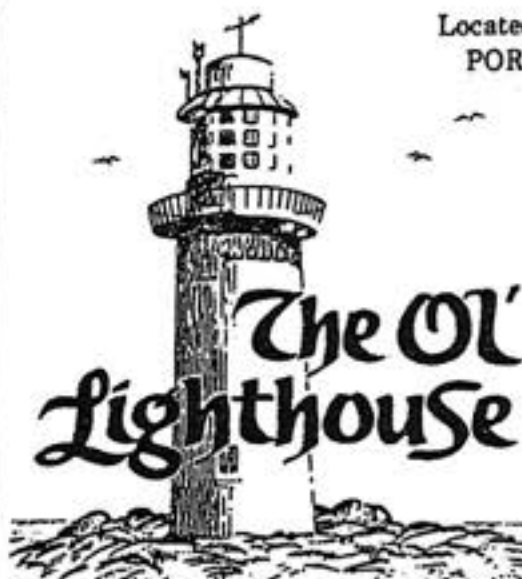
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HAMPTON PUMPKIN FESTIVAL

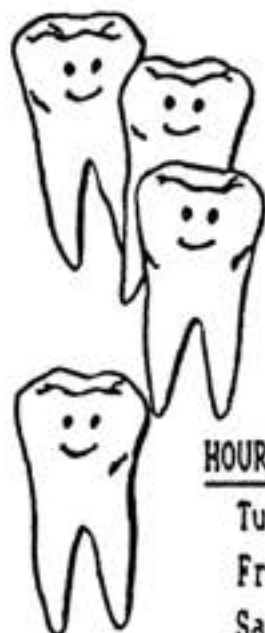
ED. Note: We understand that the Apple Festival of Sept. 22 had very good response with a great number of people coming from across the river to share the warmth and atmosphere of our village.

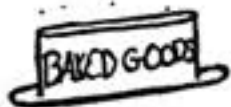

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REFLECTIONS

In 1977 when the Methodist Church celebrated its 100th anniversary, I was asked to write something about the work of the women of the church. I found some old minute books of the Ladies Aid, the oldest dated back to 1919. Here are some interesting items to pass on to you.

Over the years, the name of the Ladies Aid was changed to the Women's Society of Christian Service, then to the present name The United Methodist Women.

I have seen many changes in the working area of the church basement. Before 1952, our kitchen was in the east end of the main building. We served dinners in the west end of the room. Then in 1952 we added the old St. Mary's Catholic Church to the back of our church.

I have seen the use of kerosene, coal stoves and coal furnaces - changes to bottle gas stoves & now we have the gas stoves & furnace - and, indoor plumbing. Our first school lunch was served in the main church basement on Sept. 27, 1949. We served chicken & noodles for 10¢ - mashed potatoes for 5¢ - molded jello salad, 5¢ - tomatoes, 5¢ - roll & butter, 5¢ - milk or coffee, 5¢ - & a slice of pie for 5¢. We changed our menu to macaroni & cheese or spaghetti to vary it.

We had rationing of food items and kerosene during the war years 1942 -etc. We were allowed 4 lbs. of sugar, 6 lbs. of coffee, and kerosene for 2 months - the rationing board would not allow us lard for our doughnut sales. If we did not use all of our allotment of sugar or other items, we sold them to families who needed more than they were allowed.

Fold in;	3 cups	grated Carrots
	½ cup	Nutmeats

Bake in 9x13 pan for 1 hour at 300°

The Spreader is used to push & pull and has 18,000 lbs. force. The Cutter can be used to push & pull also and has the potential of 30,000 lbs cutting force. The Ram is used to turn things over. It has different attachable tips also used in pulling & pushing. The only other JAWS in Upper R.I. County are located in Cordova & Colona.

HATS OFF TO KELLY MCKAY

On September 18th Sierra Club (an Iowa club interested in the environment) hosted a debate for Hampton and LeClaire to air their feelings on the Hydro plant.

May we state for the record for those of you who were not there; *Kelly McKay*, representing Hampton, *did us proud!* The kid knows his stuff. Let's qualify Kelly first of all - he is a graduate biologist at Western Illinois University. His masters thesis is on the eagle.

Bill Farwell, LeClaire's acting mayor presented their hypothesis on how these new turbines won't hurt the fish population along with much of the old song and dance they've been trying to promote by just virtually wearing everyone down and outlasting any feasible, financial opposition. When a Sierra Club member asked if Farwell would put his arm in one of the turbines, he admitted probably not.

Like a polished lawyer addressing the jury before they cloister themselves for their final decision, Farwell tried to plant the idea that much of Kelly's information was incorrect. However, he never referred to even one specific statement - he simply, implied.

Kelly, in his first time ever at addressing an audience of some repute, came across as sincere, honest, and extremely well versed in not only the eagles, fish, clams, currents and acceptable oxygen levels in water but as one equally learned in the legalities set up to protect the balance of nature and her endangered species.

Even though Mr. Farwell's wife was employed at the Bettendorf Library where the Club meets, the Club was unable to take a stand in their favor. The Club remains neutral.

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NEWS RELEASE - FIRE DEPT.

"When you change your clock back to standard time this month, you could get more than an extra hour's sleep. By taking a few more minutes to change the batteries in your family's smoke detector and flashlights, you can also rest assured you and your loved ones are protected against home fires.

As a caring member of the community, the Hampton Fire Department also urges you to step beyond your home during the fall time change weekend, Oct. 27-28, and check and change smoke detector batteries for a friend, neighbor, family or elderly or disabled person unable to do so.

We launch this "neighbors helping neighbors" plea in an effort to reverse a recent trend linking a significant number of fire-related deaths to children and elderly, disabled and low-income people.

Currently as much as half of the smoke detectors in the U.S. homes are useless because of old or missing batteries. Yet a smoke detector with working batteries can double the chances of surviving a fire.

That is why we stress an annual battery change as the single most easy, effective and accessible way to reduce the number of fire-related deaths and injuries.

In doing so, we aim to snap a "no progress" trend in reducing fire deaths and injuries that has plagued much of the 1980s.

We hope the decade of the '90s bring a new age in fire safety awareness -- an era characterized by an annual smoke detector battery change and fewer fire-related deaths and injuries.

We urge you to join in this effort by committing to this important fire safety. It's a habit that could save your life.

Ed. Note: I asked Bill a dumb question (I'm really good at that), "I thought all smoke detectors had an alarm when the batteries were too low?" "They do," he said "but, if you are gone for an extended amount of time, say on vacation, the alarm could be exhausted and you would be none the wiser thinking you were still protected." (Of course.)

Bill also pointed out that October is the worst time for structure fires with the starting up of furnaces again. We are all required by law to have a smoke detector in our homes - this is one law that does make sense. If you need someone to help you change your batteries, you may call the department 755-6182 for assistance.
