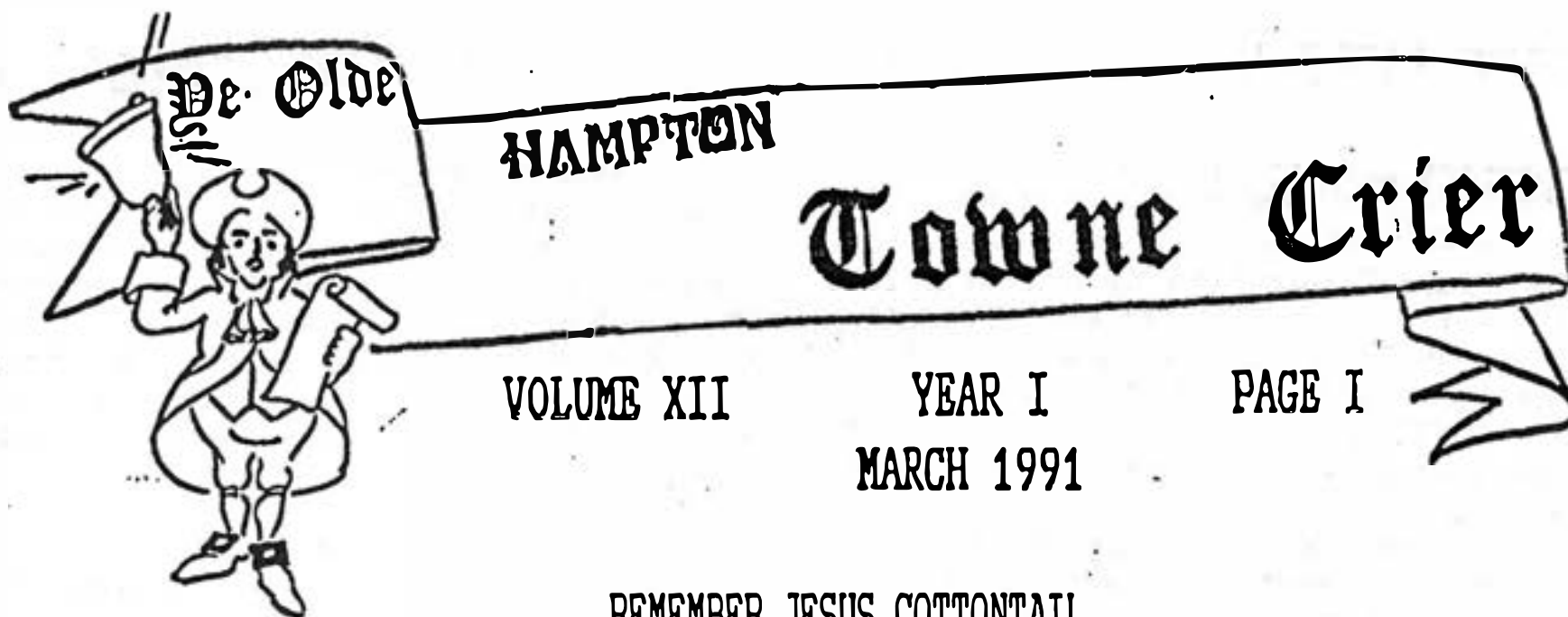




REMEMBER JESUS COTTONTAIL

FROM COUNTRY DOCTOR TO RIVER PILOT

Born Marvin Fredrick Weissman in Cincinnati, Ohio, "Doc" Weissman has covered a lot of territory. "Where the name Marvin came from I don't know." said the Doctor. "There were no super market, checkout counter, magazines September 6, 1907 my mother could have read."

His heritage started with the arrival of his grandparents to this country as *indentured servants* in 1880. They had not known each other previously although they came from the same territory along the Rhine in Germany. For their passage and sponsorship, they worked out their debt for one year as gardener and cook in the same wealthy household. The hills and rivers in

Cincinnati were very similar to those in Germany, and so, German immigrants felt very much at home here. "Doc" laughs as he remembers how they dubbed the Miami & Erie Canal the "Rhine".

The German people are highly motivated toward a good education and "Doc" relates that they passed all of the educational tax referendums in Cincinnati. So opportunity was at his doorstep. He was always interested in science; the family doctor was the only scientific role model so medicine was a natural choice. He attended the municipal University there working his last two years of medical school at the Cin-

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PATRIOTISM IN OUR COMMUNITY

We could not help but notice the visual display around the area. Some extensive, some simple but just as powerful. Our initial intend was to point out some of them but I think it is wiser to let the kids tell us how they see this War.

We went to the Grade School and had the opportunity to speak with several of the teachers and students. We were very impressed with their knowledge of the subject and with their concerns.

In Mrs. Densford's 5th grade class we learned that they made several projects - posters to decorate their desks, pictures of flags, they wear Desert Storm clothing and have even decorated their lunches. We understand that the entire school is planing a Thursday to dedicate it to the wearing of Red, White & Blue in support of the troops. They talk about what is happening in the War each day. JEREMY HULL made a giant Valentine that was mailed to the front line. AMANDA MARSH felt that we were right in stopping Saddam Hussein from taking over smaller countries. If we don't stop them, they might try to take over our country one day and there might be nothing we can do about it. JOHN MARTINEZ also felt that we were right to help out the people in the Mideast and that it was wrong for Hussein to take over other countries. CHAD WATSINGER thought we ought to get Hussein's wife on our side and have her go after him. Chad heard that she was the only thing Hussein was afraid of.

In Mrs. Jones split 4th-5th grade class we learned that they also talk about the war daily. They have a map and follow the activities. Each day they write about the War in their journals. The morning starts with the pledge, and either singing or listening to patriotic songs. They wrote letters to the soldiers and Mrs. Jones divided them between the four branches of service. TOM TERRONEZ, 5th, doesn't like the idea of War and he wouldn't like to be on the losing side. He worries about the casualties - on both sides and how lives are ruined. He feels that Hussein should not have given false hopes to his people in thinking the War would be over and he would pull out. He would like to see the War over. RYAN HART, 5th, doesn't like War but said President Bush tried to talk to Hussein before it started and feels that it was

wrong of Iraq to take over Kuwait's freedom. We had to move in. He feels Hussein's cause is stupid & that it is dumb to be losing lives over it. He didn't like it when they caused the oil spill. (I sincerely felt these kids hoped their words would help the War effort and that maybe they could help find the answer.) TARA POLEK, 4th, feels that Saddam should not have taken over Kuwait. She doesn't think it was right to take over the land and money of innocent people. Hussein is mean to us and to Kuwait. He's ordering his men to carry out his ideas. Our troops are doing their best to get him out. Hussein shouldn't bomb Israel; they didn't do anything to him. MARIA NINO, 4th, doesn't think Saddam should have taken over Kuwait to get all the money and stuff. He just made a War so he could rule more. He should have been happy with what he had because other people have rights, too, and not just him. He should respect other people's rights!

And, we understand, that when asked to name the 8 invertebrates (having no backbone) TOM TERRONEZ corrected the teacher and told her that "there were actually 9 invertebrates - Hussein and his men were spineless". Tom didn't know we knew that.

And finally, we talked to Mrs. Ryerson's kindergarten class. Mrs. Ryerson explains that she has to temper the War news because of the age level. They do discuss the War to handle any fears but do not treat it in depth. The students have written to Cpl. Paul Caruso of the Marines on two occasions and recently they received a reply. Paul stated that the students "Made his day!" I was able to read the second letters that were going to Paul - they are colorful, cheery, and concerned. Five year old AMY WEBER says she is proud to be an American. She likes to write to Cpl. Caruso; it makes her feel good. She didn't think she had any relatives in the War. KAYCIE AKERS hopes Cpl. Caruso gets back soon. She worries that they might shoot guns at him. She thinks we are doing right.

Finally, "What is the meaning of Easter?"

"I'll tell you what Easter means... Jesus rose from the dead. He came out of the tomb and he rolled the rock away. He'd need to be awful strong to move that rock!"

Easter suffers, as does Christmas, in that the real meaning is often lost, or at least mixed in with other interests. Most of the above answers verify that observation. Perhaps, if the question were asked, "What should we remember of Easter?" our experiential answer would be, "Remember Jesus Cottontail."

What is Easter? It is not Jesus plus Peter Cottontail, but Jesus alone. The Apostle Paul said it well to Timothy: "Remember Jesus Christ, risen from the dead" (2 Timothy 2:8). Easter is all about Jesus Christ and the work He accomplished on Calvary.

In an article, "History's Most Fantastic Fact," Josh McDowell cited a conversation with a Muslim friend:

"During a discussion of Christ's resurrection, a Muslim student said to me, in a joking manner: 'You poor Christians, you don't know where you're going! We go to the tomb of your master and it's....' I noticed his bewilderment and remarked, 'Go ahead, say it! It's empty!' Oh, how I would love to have captured his expression on a polaroid!"

Because Jesus Christ is alive, He is able to be our Savior. Have you trusted Him for eternal life? The eggs and candy will be eaten, the bunnies will go their way, and the new clothes will grow "old", but Jesus "must reign, until He has put all his enemies under his feet" (1 Corinthians 15:25). 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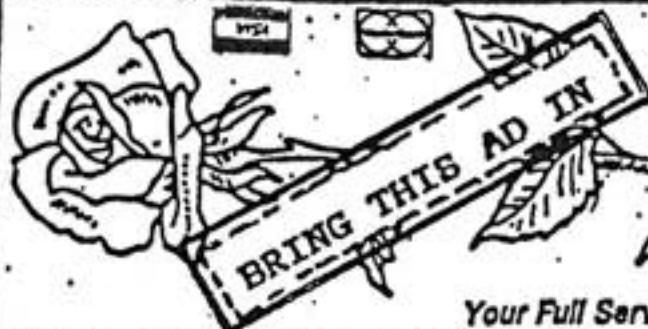
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BIRTHS:

cinnati General Hospital. Even back then, the hours of a medical student were long and hard.

In 1933 the World's Fair was in Chicago and for \$10 "Doc" took a rail excursion that would eventually set his steps toward Hampton. Yes, we got him to admit *HE SAW SALLY RAND!* Sally shook hands with many of her admirers and greeted them with the expression "Hello Suckers". An epidemic of amoebic dysentery accompanied the Fair with Sally getting full credit.

While the Doctor was in Chicago, he sought out a hospital in which he thought he would like to take his internship. He found it in Evanston and the North Shore, the 'home of millionaires' (the closest the Doctor got to real money).

Enters his partner for life, Olive Maxwell. Doc smiles impishly as he says "You know how doctors are oriented toward nurses - they are usually the only women they know. Their first date was to the Circus.

Olive comes with her own proud heritage. The Maxwells, who then lived in New Windsor, served in numbers in the Civil War. At its end, Richard was given a land grant in Iowa which he sold and settled instead in Hampton. Richard (Olive's grandfather) was a commercial fisherman and light tender on the rapids. These were actually kerosene lamps on piers in the Mississippi River (the love of rivers comes from both sides of the family). Before the dams were built, the rapids made navigation difficult. Olive's father, James started out as a rapids pilot and later was a captian-pilot on the Mississippi. His boat was the Steamboat Ellen which was the flagship of the U.S. Engineering Fleet that helped build the Keokuk Dam and others.

Doc's internship ended in 1934 and he took over a country practice in Milford, IL for the next 11 years. Olive and the Doctor married in '37. At the end of World War II, the Maxwell's family doctor in East Moline asked Doctor Weissman if he would be interested in taking over this practice. He was finally home and had a chance to be on a large river at last.

When he first met Olive, he visited Hampton. The two climbed the hill behind what is now his home. Jim Maxwell referred to the hill as 'Mt. Moriah'. There he remembers looking down on the Mississippi and saying, like the Mormon leader Brigham Young, "This is the place". As he related the story to us, we noticed a bit of sadness in the doctor as he was surely remembering Olive.

He lost his precious Olive in 1974 at the age of 64. When one speaks of Olive around the village, she is remembered with great fondness. Olive gave much of herself to the community. She was a charter member and president of the PTA in Hampton, was on the school board for many years, and held various offices in the Methodist Ladies Society. She loved her antiques and was a collector.

They have two sons, Fredrick and James. Olive quit nursing after the boys came and stayed home to rear the children. Fred went into the Army after graduating UT and then went two years to Black Hawk College and finished at the University of Illinois. James graduated from Augustana and then served in the Army. Ironically, both boys served in Germany near the Weissman beginnings.

The Doctor retired in '76 and now laughs that he can't remember ever working. Along with his membership at

the Methodist Church in Hampton, Doctor is a member of the Hampton Historical Society and Coast Guard Auxiliary where he teaches piloting on the Mississippi.

He spends much time gardening and credits the fruits of his labor to the sign, "The Garden is God's Place on Earth", that Olive posted in the garden. He plays piano by ear and listens to the classics. As a young boy he became interested in astronomy and continues to study the 'heavens'.

Doc is a world traveler having been to Europe, North Africa, the Holy Land, India, Egypt, most of South America and numerous other places. His loves, however, are when he travels rivers - the Mississippi and Nile but, especially, when he is on the Amazon. His tales are many and full of good humor. Tomorrow, is Maundy Thursday and on this day most of the churches celebrate a special Holy Communion Service commemorating the Last Supper that Jesus ate with his disciples in the upper room in Jerusalem.

Friday, called Good Friday - is anything but good. It is the saddest, the darkest day of all the week, the day of crucifixion and burial, the end - on this day in my church we have a prayer vigil. The cross on the altar is draped in black. Every half hour, from 6 am until 6 pm, people come to spend one half hour to meditate, and pray, and read - no one speaks - Margaret Lasek and I will be there together at 3:30 - as we have done so many years before.

Saturday is spent mostly in preparation for the next day - the most glorious day of all - Sunday morning, Easter morning at 6:30 o'clock we enter the church that is transformed from the cold darkness of the Friday before to the beauty of a garden of Easter lilies- Easter lilies everywhere. Everyone brings their lilies for the Sunrise Service at 6:30. After the Sunrise Service is over, the men of the church serve a breakfast for all who will stay. Then Sunday School at 9 am and another Worship Service at 10:30.
