CHALK SEMINARS AT J & D CERAMICS

Joyce Dahms, who recently moved to Eldridge, IA from Minot, ND, brings with her an art from North Dakota in chalk painting on ceramics. A Duncan certified teacher, Joyce has won numerous awards in the field including the coveted 'Peggy' award which is the highest award given in the industry. Joyce had her own ceramic shop in Beulah, ND for many years. When the family moved to Minot she went into teaching and also worked in a ceramic store.

The chalk technique adds a depth and dimension to the color tones similar to an oil painting. The use of layering one chalk color over another and developing its richness gradually, surpasses the dry brush method in stains. In the June classes students worked on statues of Jesus, The July classes worked on steins.

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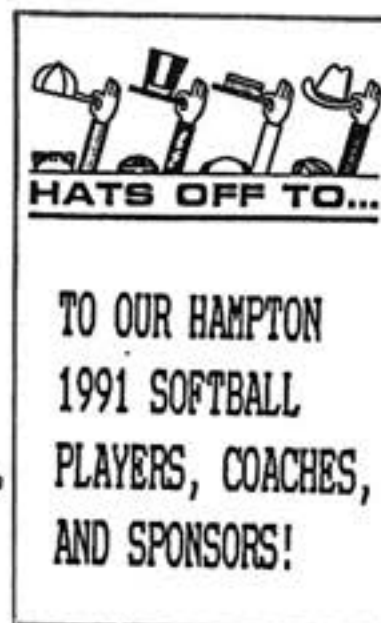

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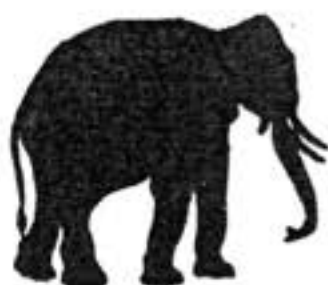

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VILLAGE BOARD MEETINGS

The new fire truck is in town. Many of you have probably already seen it. Three weeks to a month is a norm to qualify a dept. on a new vehicle. So, for a while, the individual firefighters will be acquainting themselves with the equipment. A representative from the company will be in Hampton for 2 separate training sessions.

The siren has been overhauled. Arrangements are being made to install it on the bluff's edge around 4th St. It will have 1 tone to alert firemen and a 2nd tone as a citizen weather alert.

The village is going out for bids on a new dump truck.

After the various departments have taken an inventory, a date will be set to hold an auction.

Jeanne McKay, Loraine Mabis and Vern Gielow went to Springfield to apply for grant money for the boat ramp and parking in the river park. It looked favorable but the word will not come back for several weeks.

Chief Terry Ott reported that BO has been used on 3 occasions. One vehicle was seized as a result. Chief Ott vouches for Bo's highly trained nose.

Bids went out for street repairs for their earliest possible legal return so that the operation can get underway.

Motions were made to remove the sidewalks on 1st. Ave. from 1st St. to 5th St. and from 6th St. to 7th St. and to make a swale to catch the rain as required by the Dept. of Transportation.; and to go out for bids to widen and surface 1st Ave. The estimated cost of \$130,135 will be picked up by \$66,000 from a DOC Grant and the Balance from DOT. Jeanne McKay and Denny Gottwalt voted against the project. The project could possibly be started by fall.

HYDRO PLANT BIGGER ISSUE THAN EVER

FERC (Federal Energy Regulatory Commission) has wheedled to the influence of the lobbying LeClaire was able to do with its seemingly endless supply of PR monies. It appears that it will grant a license to LeClaire to develop the hydro plant based on information from decades back. Basically the same consideration given to Keokuk at the turn of the century will apply today. We have not advanced in 80 years.

According to Village President Scott Newberg, Hampton will seek heavier support from our congressmen. Rock Island County Board member, Elmer Hofreiter attended the Monday night meeting and will report to the County Board.

The Izaak Walton League will be filing against the project. This will delay the project for a great deal of time while other strategies can be arranged. Hampton will ride on their tail for the present.

At a news conference July 1, The QCCA pointed out that sport fishing on the Upper Mississippi River will be worth over a *billion dollars* by the year 2000 according to the US Fish & Wildlife Service. Pools 14 & 15 are worth upwards of \$30 million. The proposed \$3-4 million LeClaire hopes to gain will not offset the loss to the fishing industry. If 1½-2" trash racks are not installed and the 6" sq. grides are used, 30" long Walleyes with a girth of 20" would be sucked in by the 50 MPH current. With another 16 proposed hydro plants proposed on the UMR, the QCCA is pushing for a current Environmental Impact Statement that considers these cumulative impacts of multiple plants.
