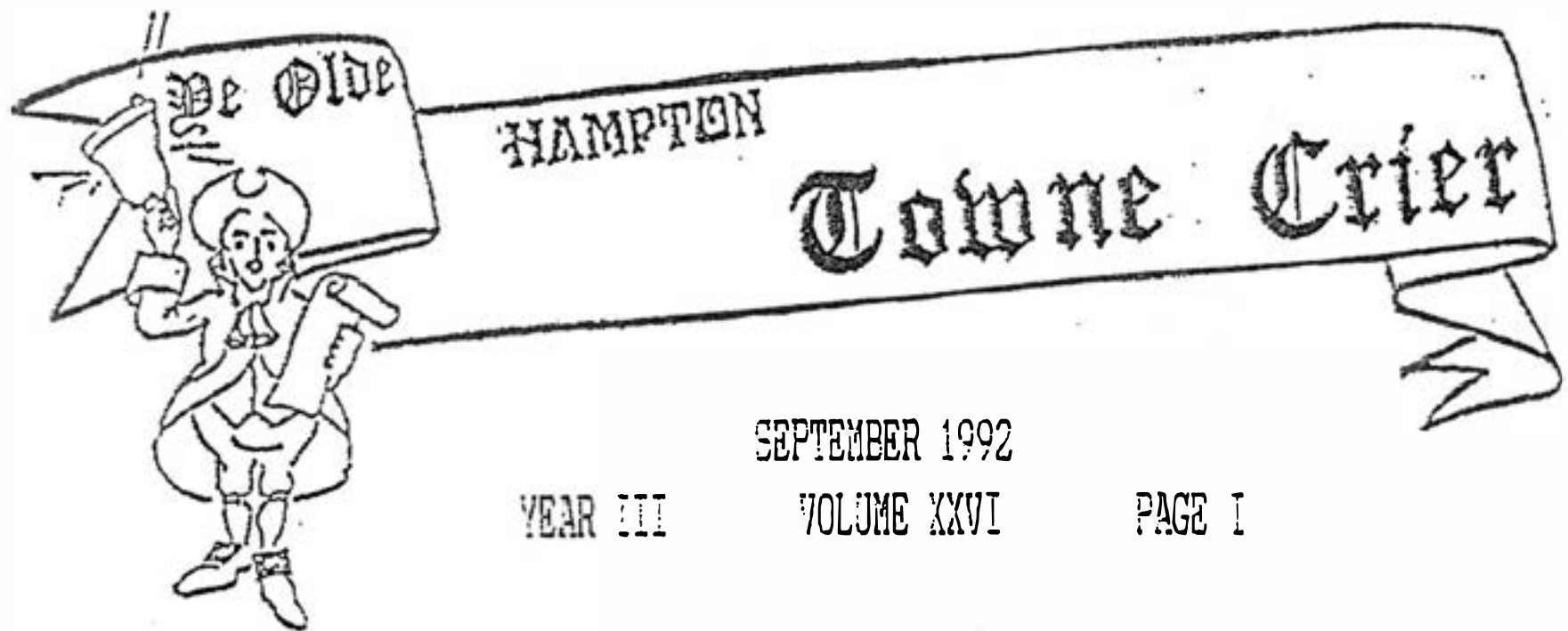




## TERRI GILLESPIE OF SINGAPORE - HOME VISITING WITH FAMILY

For the last 15 months Terri and Jim Gillespie have called Singapore home. Terri was back visiting family last month. Her roots are as deep and as many in Albany, IL as the Gillespie family is here in Hampton.

The couple was sent to Singapore to re-activate the design firms' office with the purpose of its becoming the corporate headquarters of the Asia Pacific region. It is a two man office now with Terri managing the office for Jim who handles the marketing. She drew from her computer background when she was in real estate while they lived in California.

I found Terri to be very informed of the Pacific island. She has read many books on the subject. They both love the people finding them to be very warm and friendly. Although very Westernized, the population is about 80% Chinese, 15% Malaysian and the last 5% Indian & mixed.

The country looks much like San Francisco but very much cleaner. Singapore has a \$500 fine and 2 weeks mandatory jail time for throwing a cigarette butt on the ground. Bringing drugs into the country is automatic death - no trial. Chewing gum is unlawful to sell. When planning the continuing growth of the island, space for greenery is always included. There are many parks and botanical gardens with over 200 species of trees that are not native to Singapore. Buildings grow skyward. Outsiders are not allowed to own property (exceptions would be a condo above the 8th story).

Singapore is in a constant state of upkeep, 24 hours a day. Anything over five years old is repaired. The cheapest car of the smallest size costs from \$80 - \$100,000 plus permit and they are junked after 10 years. Needless to say they have

## FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

Rescue 2 was used to lead the Quad-City Boat Parade on July 4 and Engine 3 & Rescue 1 were both displayed in the Amvets July 4th parade.

The house at 833 1st Ave. was used for live structure fire training July 25 & 26.

The instructional staff has arranged scheduling so that all department members have access to all classes. Training sessions are now held each Tuesday night, each Wednesday night for those attending EMT classes on Tuesdays, and one weekday for our first shift personnel.

Lt. Keith Ward earned his Certified Fire Service Instructor I rating, joining our instructional staff.

Three new airpack seats were placed in Engine 3, allowing use of new Scott 2A airpacks. The two seats removed from Engine 3 were installed in the rear of Rescue 1. This addition allows all personnel on Rescue 1 and Engine 3 to don SCBAs en route to an alarm as well as be seat belted in.

A pop machine was purchased and installed on the front of the station hoping to generate revenues from our park and the bike path. A container located near-by is being researched for can disposal and recycling.

## HAMPTON SCHOOL BOARD

The school board is again looking for a volunteer from the community to take the minutes of the school board meetings. Interested persons can call the school.

In July the board approved a 4% salary increase for the superintendent and supporting staff. This August the teacher's ratified and the board approved the teachers' contract which called for a 3% increase in salary.

The tentative fiscal budget for 1992-93 year was placed on file Aug 17th for public inspection. The budget was increased by \$35,164 over last year.

Education - \$676,744

Operations & Maintenance - \$31,425

Transportation - \$43,100

Ill. Municipal Retirement - \$11,180

Working Cash - \$4,300

# VILLAGE BOARD MEETING

DeBlaey Construction of Silvis was granted the restoration and repair work needed on Village Hall for the sum of \$11,140. Work is to be completed before winter sets in.

Graham Lee, village attorney, has been instructed to draw up a letter to Ed Nightengale advising him to bring the unoccupied house he owns up to code or risk its being demolished. Residents on the block attended the board meeting to stress the problems of safety, health and appearance. The situation has been going on for several years and parallels Davenport's Vale Apts.

Several areas in the village incur flood problems in heavy rains. The village will obtain an engineer to study the situation.

It was advised that the state has a 'noise pollution' regulation and that Hampton will/does enforce it. If the noise extends more than 75' from its source, a \$50 fine can be imposed.

Permission was given to erect a billboard in the River Park for the purpose of promoting village events. The sign will be placed selectively so as not to interfere with the continuity of the park.

A standard fee of \$25 (with an additional \$25 deposit that will be returned if left clean) will be set for anyone wishing to secure the new pavilion for

special events. Electrical hook-up is \$5.

By chance or good luck the pavilion can be used free with priority given to the party who reserved it.

The board decided to place a referendum on the November ballot for the residents to determine for themselves if they wish the Metro Link bus service to the town. They will schedule a special public meeting to answer any questions and concerns to the taxpayer.

## SPECIAL MEETING AUGUST 17th

The special meeting was set for the purpose of awarding bids for garbage collection and the River Park parking lot.

The garbage bid was granted to Jeeters Hauling of Clinton, IA for the cost of \$4.00 per household with recycling to be considered at a later date. This cost reflects an increase of only 50¢ as opposed to the \$2.75 increase Watts wanted to levy. Jetters said they work 'all' holidays except Christmas and will go up Wren Street hill. Service will be effective in October. Pickup days will be assigned later.

The low bid of \$119,162.62 was granted to Brandt Construction to put in the parking lot with a seal coat finish. It was noted that, if Motor Fuel Tax money could be used, they would proceed with blacktop since to do so later would be more costly than including it initially.

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**Q-CITIES EDUCATIONAL ROUNDTABLE**

For the first time all three networks and cable will air at the same time an in-depth program addressing the educational needs of our community. James Viermere, Regional Superintendent of Schools attended the August school board meeting and presented information on the purpose of the Roundtable. The hour long program will deal with timely issues as the changing work field, the challenge of dealing with today's problems in education, the shifting social environment and to resolve concrete goals with action as the outcome.

Educational leaders, business representatives and community members have been asked to sit the roundtable. Tune your T-V set on September 10th at 7:00 pm to take advantage of this timely issue.

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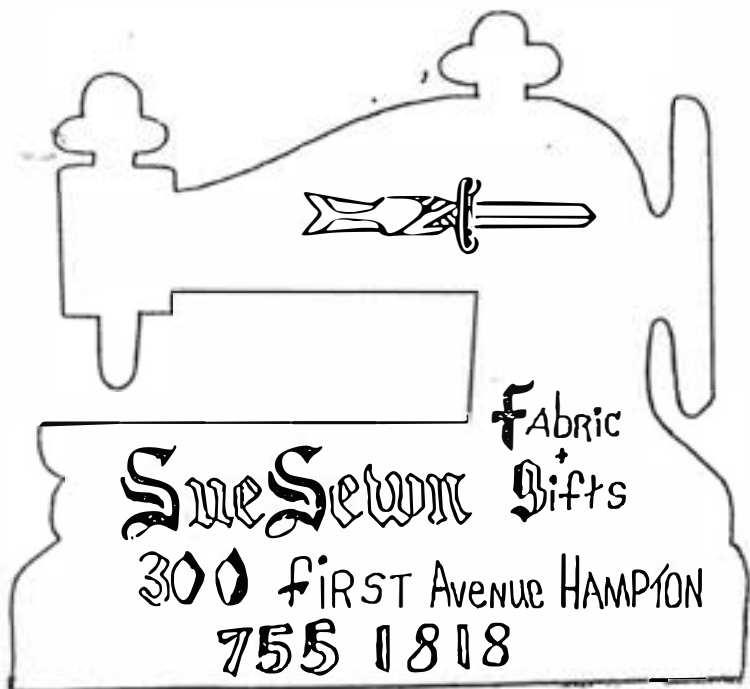

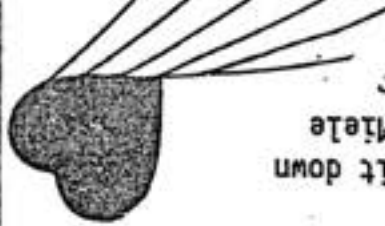

a great mass transit system or you walk. Terri says she goes through a lot of shoes and foot powder.

Everything is imported. Two apples cost just under \$6. They eat mostly at 'hawker' stands, little speciality food stalls set up around the streets. You can pick up a rice dish here and something else there and eat in the park more reasonably than dining out. Recently four of them ate at the buffet at Addante's for under \$20 - the same meal would have cost at least \$170 in Singapore. (Terri did praise the cuisine at Addante's. She said, "You can tell authentic Italian dishes when they make the sauce special for each recipe and not just put the same spaghetti sauce on each pasta dish".)

The main occupations in Singapore are in trading, banking and shipping. The government is similar to that of Great Britain with an elected Prime Minister currently Mr. Goh. The President is Mr. Wee Wee. Just 20 years ago Singapore was a durg infested island with crime and prostitution rampant. Rivers and air were polluted. One man, Lee Kuanuyew is credited with the remarkable recovery. His expertise is revered among many nations and often has addressed the U.N. The government makes each citizen put 30% of their wage into government savings. The only way to retrieve it is to purchase a home or for retirement. As a result, 95% of the natives own their own home. Terri says there is no bigotry on the island. All races are accepted equally. The country observes all holidays, Buddhists, Christian, Hindu, Judaism, etc. After a certain grade all students must earn the privilege through good grades to continue

their education. Competition is high because there are no menial jobs (what few laborers are necessary- gas jockeys, construction, etc. are imported from Maylasia and Hong Kong daily or they sleep on the job site). There are no bums or vagrants. Terri says they really find it difficult to have total censorship over books, newspapers, videos, music and art.

As we said Terri is related to half of Albany. Her mother was a Kennedy with 8 brothers & sisters. She has survived 2 husbands and still lives in Albany. Terri has a brother Mick Hobson of Davenport and 2 sisters, Kathy Lorber of Alabama & Pat Morrill of Wheaton and a step-brother and sister, Ron Dolan of Maryland and Donna Allard of Davenport. The two Gillespie boys share an apartment in San Francisco. Matt 24 is a Junior at St. Dominic's majoring in Korean & Japanese. Kirk 22 is an art major and illustrator. He still has 3 years of study but dreams of going the Disney Studio as some point.

Two years ago both Jim & Terri were able to come home for Christmas and as luck would have it they got to see each and every brother, sister, mother, and kid. She said that it was the best Christmas ever! This August Terri divided her time in Albany, San Francisco and Hampton where she stayed with Jim's Mother, Harriet Gillespie. Many of us remember when both Jim & Theresa taught at Hampton as newlyweds.

Living in another country has been the best education. Terri & Jim have a new perspective of the 'other guy'. She feels they have become less individually focused and have broadened their viewpoint.



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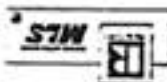
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
