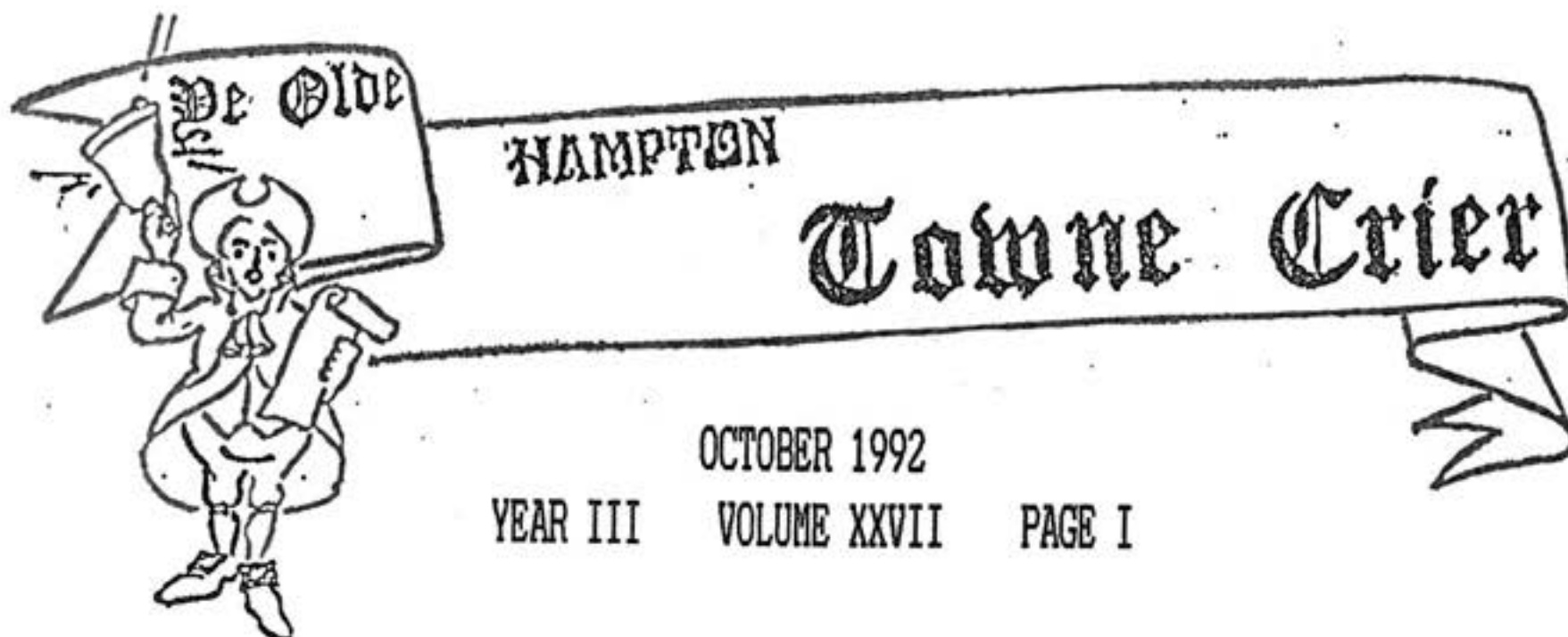




VOTING - A PRIVILEGE TO BE TAKEN SERIOUSLY!

VILLAGE BOARD MEETINGS

It was voted to have Village Attorney Graham Lee draw up the resolution to have the Home Rule proposition placed on the ballot. The board also set Oct. 19th at 7:00 pm for a 'public meeting' to discuss with the residents the pros and cons of the issue.

Many inquiries were made to the village by residence regarding bus service. After consulting with a Metro Link representative, the village decided to have attorney Graham Lee draw up the resolution to have the proposal brought before the public for vote. The board set October 5th at 7:00 pm to hold a 'public meeting' on the subject to answer any questions. **BOTH RESOLUTIONS HAVE BEEN PLACED ON THE BALLOT FOR THE NOVEMBER 3RD ELECTION.**

The additional boat ramp at E.M. and parking lot at Hampton are underway. The board was able to go ahead with blacktop.

The contract with the new garbage firm will begin in October. **THE ENTIRE VILLAGE WILL BE PICKED UP THE SAME DAY - MONDAYS!** This firm picks up on ALL Holidays except Christmas! Fees will be raised to \$8.00 a quarter to cover the additional expenses.

The board is working on the various areas where flooding has been a problem.

It was noted that Hampton has always operated in the black even with the unexpected circumstances that befall a municipality.

As of this writing, Sept. 25th, we do not believe there will be a fall Village Wide Yard Sale.

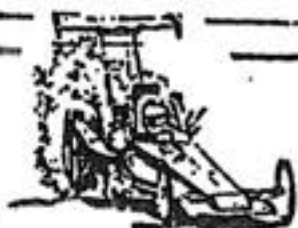

THE VILLAGE SIREN - AND IT'S MEANINGS

The village alert siren has been operating again for some time. The Fire Dept. and the Village would like to inform the residents as to the signals and their meanings.

3 BLASTS: The siren will cycle three times with a pause between each blast. This is a call to the department for a fire or medical call. This type call will only operate between the hours of 8:00 am and 8:00 pm. An alternative method will be used to contact the department members during the off hours.

1 steady BLAST for 3 MINUTES: This long blast that will not be interrupted for the full three minutes means that there is a *severe weather alert!!* All residents should be advised to take the necessary safety precautions. This operation will operate the full 24 hour day.

It is still the standard that the siren will sound every Saturday at 2:00 pm and every Tuesday night at 6:15 pm. This is to test the equipment from Silvis, which activates the 911 signals and from the Hampton base. If you have any questions regarding the sirens or the fire dept please feel free to contact Chief Haigh at 496-2232.

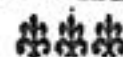

PROPOSED AMENDMENT *TO ADD SECTION 8.1

TO ARTICLE 1:

(Crime Victim's Rights) *Explanation of Proposed Amendment Article I of the 1970 Illinois Constitution is known as the "Bill of Rights." Currently, the Bill of Rights specifically guarantees the rights of accused persons in criminal prosecutions, but it does not provide any specific rights for the victims of crimes.

This amendment will add Section 8.1 to the Bill of Rights to guarantee that victims of crimes have the right:

- 1) To fair treatment;
- 2) To be informed of court proceedings;
- 3) To confer with the prosecution;
- 4) To make a statement to the court at sentencing;
- 5) To receive information about the conviction,, sentence, imprisonment, and release of the accused;
- 6) To a timely disposition of the case following the arrest of the accused;
- 7) To be reasonably protected from the accused;
- 8) To be present at all court proceedings on the same basis as the accused, unless the victim's presence would materially affect the victim's testimony at trial;
- 9) To have an advocate or other support person present at all court proceedings
- 10) To receive restitution.

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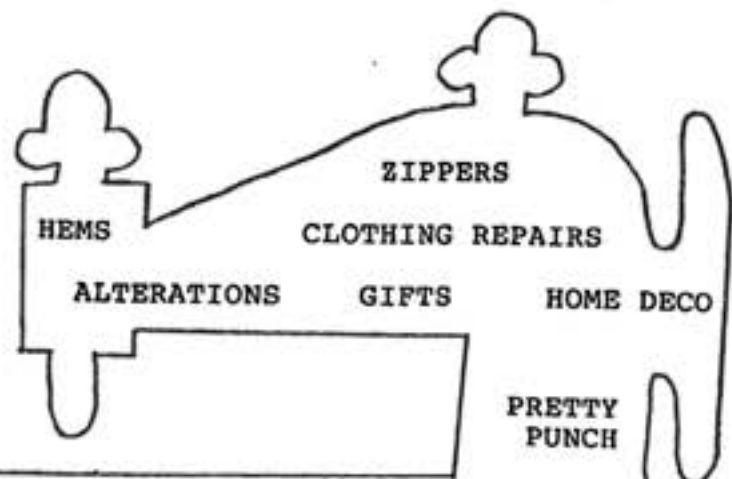
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
