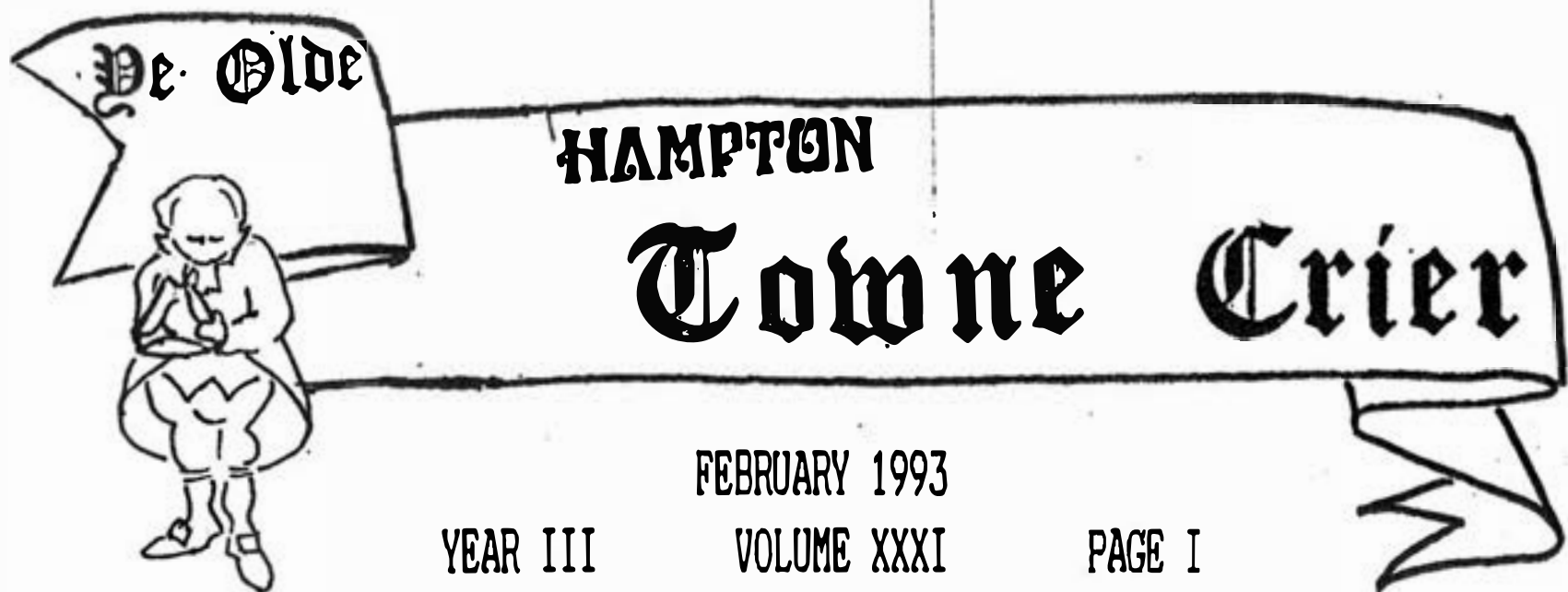




RESPECTS TO TIRELESS FRIEND!

On January 17th Lorraine Mabis retired from this life but in her fashion left behind the motivation for others to go on caring for the village she loved so much and to which she dedicated a lifetime. Cancer finally took her away but she never gave in to it. Lorraine planned for the village to her last hour.

After the very fine articles written in the *Dispatch* and *Times* of Lorraine's service to Hampton and to the community at large, you will think it redundant of me to bring up her dedication. But it is the best word to describe her. She never took a challenge she didn't intend to see to completion. That you cannot win them all, was not through lack of her exhausting every possibility. Lorraine was the most self motivated person I ever met. She did not seem to suffer 'burnout' and was always 'up'. And she had the ability to motivate others as well.

She will be pleased with the plans for a memorial. Not that it would honor her but that people, instead of sending flowers (a waste to a budget minded treasurer) would put their efforts together to add to the usefulness and beauty of the River Park. Consideration is being given to erect a gazebo or an overlook along the river's edge. She loved the park and often mentioned how many people she met on the bike path from a great many places. She enjoyed showing off Hampton. Memorials can be made to the Village of Hampton.

The heavily attended service was simple, reflective, upbeat with tributes paid by Scott Newberg, Hampton Village President, by Vern Gielow, President of the Great River Bike Trail, and by Vince Bull, manager of Stone's Apple Barn where she had been employed. Afterward a modest

UTHS BOWLING TEAM RIDES THE CREST

Just three years ago coach Randy Knox took over the girls bowling team and the result has been a series of victories. There are seventeen on the team that serves from the freshman to senior level. When asked what the team average was, Coach Knox said that he stressed 'team' effort and did not encourage the potential for the girls to compete against each other. "The other school is the opponent," he said. "We work as a team to win." The strategy has paid off.

The team just pulled off their third straight win in as many years at the Knights New Year Invitational at Rolling Meadows. No other team ever pulled off two successive wins let alone a triple. At the Board Meeting of January 11 Trustee Jeannie McKay reported that all but the restrooms at the fire dept. meet the state requirements for wheelchair accessibility. The code can be met with some modifications.

1992 UTHS HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

This year three former UTHS students will have their names entered in the Hall of Fame. Kari Gunderson 1983-87, Joe Thompson 1969-73, & Gary Wienke 1952-1955 will receive this honor on February 19th at the halftime of the Galesburg basketball game.

During her student years at UT, Kari earned 4 varsity letters in swimming. She was a 3 year member of the National Honor Society and earned All-State honors as a swimmer in 1985. Ms Gunderson is the only UT athlete to win 4 consecutive Sectional Championships. She went 2 years to the US Air Force Academy and then transferred to the University of Minnesota.

Joe Thompson attained All-State recognition in track for pole vault. He was named to the Western Big 6 All Conference Football Team his senior year. At Augustana Dr. Thompson was named All-American of both track and football. He has had much success as both a head track coach and assistant football coach. Currently Joe is head track coach at the College of St. Thomas in St. Paul. Dr. Thompson has coached over 60 All-Americans, 19 National Champions and has had 2 athletes invited to the 1992 Olympic Trials.

Gary Wienke received varsity letters in track & cross country while attending UT. At Augustana he earned 4 varsity letters in both track and cross country. Gary has been head track coach at the University of Illinois since 1973. His team has received 5 indoor and 5 outdoor Big Ten Championships. Gary has been inducted into the Halls of fame of Drake Relays and the Illinois Track & Cross Country.

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It was enchanting to spend some time with Pearl and Don Cooper. Although younger than my own mother, it was like getting to meet my own grandparents; how I think they might have been.

Born in Port Byron, Pearl moved to Hampton when she was 14 graduating from Hampton and UTHS. Don was born in Stromness, Scotland. In 1910 his family moved to the states. Don wound up in the Quad Cities looking for work. An Aunt & Uncle from Rock Island helped get him a job at Farmall. He retired from there in '65 after 31 years. No matter what Don says, the truth is that they met through Don's sister who worked with Pearl. (Don promised to give me as many stories as I wanted - but I looked to Pearl for the non-fiction version.)

They married on October 9, 1931. They lived 3 years in Rock Island before moving back to Hampton. Here they raised their three children. DON, Jr. is married to Donna (Ingold). They live in Bullhead City, AZ. At one time young Don had a grocery store here in Hampton south of the post office. He is now retired from the Rail Road Express. His wife is a nurse; their 5 children are all married and scattered about. Don has 7 grandchildren. Second is GERALD who lives in Hampton with his wife Mearlene (Olson). Gerald has retired from John Deere Parts Depot. Their 5 children (including a set of twins in there) are grown and moved from the homestead. Not to let brother Don out do him, Gerald also has 7 grandchildren. And last is DAVID who resides in Prophetstown with his wife Beverly (Erdmann). David works at Pen Berthy, a brass fitting firm. Beverly is a nurse. The couple has 3 grown children. and 5 grandchildren. As a youngster David

and his friend went fishing. But Mom & Dad didn't know 'fishing' was going through the locks. The river was rough above the dam and the boat capsized shortly after locking thru. Luckily the operators saw the boys and rescued them before they got caught in the rollers.

Pearl, you might remember was our Dispatch correspondent for 25 years retiring in '76. She also worked as a clerk at the post office. A member of the Hampton United Methodist Church for 50 years Pearl is a member of the women's group and taught Sunday School for many years. She still helps with the church activities; school lunch, chicken-noodle dinner, etc. In the past she has been a member of the PTA, Historical Society & Auxiliary. Don was one of the first volunteer firemen. Currently he keeps busy woodworking in his garage. Years back he was well known in the area for the camp wash basins he welded. He used to fish a lot and remembers when a neighbor caught 2 big catfish by the dam; one 60 lbs & one 70 lbs! (It's true - Pearl verified it!)

The two have seen a lot of changes in Hampton good and bad. They remember when the main road was along the river, construction of Rt 84, water & sewer installed, developing the hill area and they also remember losing their sidewalks last year to the bike path. All in all they felt it was a good place to live and raise their children. Regardless, Don did feel bad that they didn't get to go to Arizona this winter for the first time in 18 years. BUT his health is good and he was cleared to go. I was given several parting gifts of Don's handicrafts. The cross I especially enjoy and it serves on my wall as a reminder of our visit.

VILLAGE BOARD MEETING - JAN 25

In respect for Lorraine Mabis the meeting opened with silent prayer. Per her request, a replacement was found as quickly as possible. Mike Toalson, a 12½ year resident of Hampton, was sworn in for the balance of her term. Her other responsibilities were delegated as follows: Mike, budget chrm.; Jeannie McKay, alternate on Q-C Riverfront Council; and Denny Gottwalt, Q-C Solid Waste Commission.

The village needs a plumbing inspector and one more person on the zoning board. 7 petitions are out at this time for village positions - 4 for trustee, 2 for mayor and 1 for clerk. Next month we will ask them all to give a short bio for the *Crier*.

In other business-voted to transfer \$26,053 from sewer fund to general to pay Brandt Construction for the balance on the ramp parking with the amount to be replaced when the state reimburses us and voted to purchase a police car for \$12,694 to be delivered after June 1, 1993.

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Dear Resident of Hampton:

It is a pleasure to again report to you on the "State of the Village of Hampton." By all standards, 1992 was a year of modest accomplishments. Your Board of Trustees recognized the importance of fiscal prudence, thus we ended the year well within budget. We will continue to be conservative in 1993.

Because Hampton is an older community, infrastructure problems have risen to some extent. Virtually at each of our Board sessions, residents brought up situations which needed prompt attention. These included streets, sewers, garbage and other public services. Keeping the Village budget in mind, we attempted to resolve each issue as expeditiously as possible. We know growth of Hampton through new home starts will heighten the infrastructure concerns, but we welcome the additional taxation which helps balance costs.

Some actions taken include the renegotiation of the Village's franchise with Iowa-Illinois Gas & Electric Company. Garbage pickup was assigned to a new firm. We have annexed property which fronts the Mississippi River to a point near the I-80 bridge. We look forward to other annexation efforts to assure an ongoing growth of Hampton. A new boat launch is being constructed adjacent to the East Moline facility. We look forward to bus service to Hampton in accord with the public referendum held in November. We have again entered into agreement with the Bi-State Joint Purchasing group which enables bulk purchases at a substantial cost reduction. The Board also elected to join into agreement with the Rock Island Area Solid Waste Management Joint Action Agency.

For Village services we purchased a new truck for village maintenance. The Village Hall received needed repairs to its exterior. Thanks to superb volunteerism, we now have a new park pavillion. Craft fairs held in our new park have proven a most exciting and popular activity.

Our Volunteer Fire Department should be a model for other communities to emulate. Ongoing training, additional training and additional equipment has made this organization an exemplary service. In 1992, a rescue boat was purchased for the Fire Department. All personnel were inoculated with hepatitis vaccine, a very important consideration if river rescue operations are necessary. Our Emergency Medical Technicians receive regular

updates. A defibrillator has been donated for use in cardiac arrests and similar traumas.

In fairness, not all has been a "bed of roses." We will continue our fight against the hydroelectric project. To date, we have not been able to negotiate land acquisition needed for the proposed Marina. We will continue to strive for local business growth.

Thanks are in order. To Sam McKay, for his work on new streets and coping with drainage problems. To Jeannie McKay for her efforts to make our new park outstanding. To Denny Gottwalt for updating an outmoded plumbing code. To Ken Wright for his devotion to the Fire & Police Departments. To Sandy Carmack for revising sewer and other regulations. To Sue McBride for management of all details pertinent to village administration. To Graham Lee for keeping all things legal. To Police Chief Terry Ott and Fire Chief Craig Haigh for being ever mindful of the people they serve. Each has a great team of dedicated individuals. To Dean Sparrow for his "can do" spirit which keeps virtually all material things going.

Appreciation is extended to the many volunteers who are always there, ready to help when something's to be covered. A special thank you for all the good work of Bill & Carol Doose.

Activity of your Board President includes participation with Bi-State Regional Commission, Quad City Riverfront Council, Waterfront Workshop, Great River Trail Council, Northwest Illinois Municipal Association and other public or quasi-public bodies.

To Bill Francis, thank you for your service as a Board member until you moved away to another community.

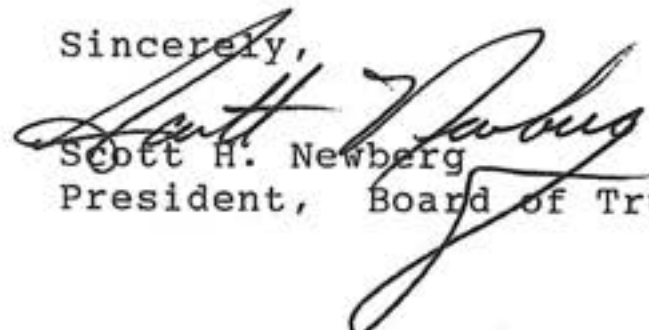
