Water, Water, Everywhere

Rage of the River

The waters of the Mississippi have crashed in on our little town of Hampton. Fire fighters and volunteers from all over the area came together to try and stop the mighty river from expanding and taking our town.

A special meeting was called on June 30, as the water rose. Scott Newberg asked that the fire dept. be open 24 hours a day until the crisis is over. Request were out for the donation of time and food



items to help the flood victims and the volunteers.

There were volunteers everywhere helping sandbag. Everyday we watched and prayed the rains would end and the water would stop rising. Well, the rains came and the waters rose. This did not stop the determined towns people and visitors from their efforts to keep the river back.

On July 4, a plea for help went out on radio and TV to help sandbag. This proved amazing the way people came. Our bike path is in jeopardy, Chief Craig Haigh said, "look at the cracks in the path."

Into the water went the

firemen, to build up the bank to keep the water from eroding under 1st Ave and cracking the path more. People were throwing bags to the men in the water as fast as they were filled. If you could have gone into the waters I'm sure all you would have seen was a wall of white for as far as the eye could go.

Pumps had to be manned and kept going 24 hours a day. This did make for a noisy night for those who lived so close to them. Without those pumps others would have been flooded.

Sandbags up in the new park area kept water from going to 3rd Street.

The evacuation of the sheep was another thing, those poor animals did not understand what was going on. They just fled everytime someone came close. It took several attempts to bring them to safety.

Many people were amazed to see so many people come together to help, I guess disaster always does seem to bring people closer. Not only were the

citizens in Hampton out there sandbagging, but there were people from Iowa and Wisconsin here to help in the relief efforts.

I talked with Ginni Davis, and she expressed to me that while she was helping sandbag, she met a man that was from Walnut, IL. The man was out looking for a place to go fishing and he heard that Hampton needed help and stopped to offer support. Also, a couple from Wisconsin, that were passing through the area while on

vacation stopped to throw some sandbags. These were not the only people mind you that helped, but it was nice to see that these people actually cared, and were not only sight seer's.

The flood was publicized very well, people knew about the flood all over the country. Telemundo, a Spanish News Network from Texas, did a report on the flooding efforts here over the fourth of July. The flood was even televised over seas. **Continued Page 2**

With the Fire station being open 24 hours a day to provide food and comfort for anyone who needed it. The volunteers at the station kept the coffee on, the food available and the support up. Towns people and even those not a member of the town came down with food and money to help with the relief efforts.

With the waters receding the fire department is now back to normal. The pumps are shut down unless we get some fierce rain storms.

Clean up time is now beginning for those who can get to their homes. The town has placed a dumpster down on 1st Ave for the residents in that area.

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Life Long Resident Boasts Five Generations

I have always been interested in Genealogy, whether it be mine or someone else's. Carol Doose had mentioned to me that she needed to get an interview with Eliza Haertjens before she turned over the newspaper, I jumped at the chance to do it. I have always thought that Eliza was a very interesting person. Well she did not let me down. I went down to talk to her and she promptly lent me several scrap books and memoirs. I have been reading these, and I have to tell you that this woman is fascinating.

She was born on February 12, 1910. Given name is Ann Eliza Lee. The daughter of Jennie Sikes and Robert E. Lee. Married to Frank E. Haertjens on March 27, 1927. They had three children; Marion Jane, Mary Dorothy and Bernard Lee. Mary Dorothy is deceased. There

are 9 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren.

Eliza lived here in Hampton all of her life except a short time when she moved so that her house could be moved out of the way of the now Highway 84. As Eliza and I were talking, I find that she is extremely proud of her family and the way they settled here.

Great Grandparents (paternal), Joseph and Cornelia Atkinson, settled in 1838. Joseph was the first

blacksmith.

Great Grandparents (maternal), Jeremiah and Letitia Payne, settled in 1851. Jeremiah was a brick mason.

Great Grandparents (paternal), William and Betsy Lee, settled in 1858.

Great Grandmother (maternal), Martha Sikes, came to Hampton in

1844 from Nauvoo a widow with two children.

Grandfather Reuben Sikes served in the Civil War, and was a painter/wallpaper hanger by occupation. Reuben married Maria Payne.

Grandfather, Charles S. Lee also served in the Civil War, but he was most noted for his help in securing a Methodist Church here. Charles married Ann Eliza Atkinson.

Robert E. Lee, father served in the Spanish war and was a truck farmer, he raised onions for many

years. He married Jennie Sikes and this joined two of the oldest families in Hampton.

If you should ever go and visit Eliza you will either find her in the garden, canning or quilting. I have found this lady to be extremely fascinating. To sit and listen to her talk of the town and the events that have taken place

makes you feel as if you were actually there. Eliza takes great pride in the town and the way in which her family was instrumental in its founding.

Eliza can be found at the Blacks Museum from time to time helping with the various happenings. She is a member of the Historical Society, Methodist Church, Women's Society and the Happy Mixers. Eliza graduated from the eighth grade at Hampton, and never went to High School, because she was

needed to help with the onion fields and other chores. She did make it to High School when she was about 55 years old to take Drivers Education so she could drive. Yes, she did not drive until then.

Eliza shared the family car with her husband until he purchased her a 1966 Studebaker. Then there was no stopping her.

Quilting is not just a pass time for her it is also a business for Eliza. She has a list of people who would like her to finish their quilts for them. In her quilt room you can view her rogues gallery, as she calls it. She is very proud of each and every member of her family.

I can not begin to tell everything there is to tell about this fascinating lady. She has seen and done more than most people her age and she is still seeing and doing. I truly have enjoyed my reading and studying this remarkable lady.

Village Board Meeting June 14, 1993

Village board members agreed to seek bids for the storm sewer project on sixth street. McClure engineering gave the specs for the project. Sealed bids were due by July 6, 1993 so work could be completed before fall.

Tabled till next meeting was the repair on the intersection of sixth street and eleventh ave, until they could raise funding for the project.

Brought to the boards attention was the ordinance for the parking of RV's. Over the past weekend several were ticketed for improper parking. Mr. Bob Emmert has asked the board that they revise the ordinance to help with hardship it is causing. The ordinance now specifies that a RV be parked behind the front building line. The committee will hold a meeting on June 23rd to resolve this dilemma.

The board was asked to place a Deaf Child sign up on 6th Street and 2nd Ave.

the village.

The closing of 12th Ave between 6th St. and 8th St. for a block party on July 3, 1993 was approved. This block party was to say a fond farewell to the Clancy's who have been living in Hampton over the past 20 years.

Special Board meeting June 30, 1993

Discussion on the current flooding were covered. Darrell Irby past fire chief was asked for his input on the problems.

Sandbags are to be placed in the park to keep water from coming up and flooding 3rd Ave and the homes there.

The police department was asked to put up barricades to keep sightseers out.

The fire department has been designated as the central nerve system for the flood. They will be manning it 24 hours a day until the flood is over.

Village Board Meeting July 12, 1993

Main discussing was focused on the flood and the need now to learn and prepare for the future.

Ken Wright hit the nail on the head when he said " We've had quite an learning education during the last few weeks. It would be a shame if we didn't learn from it."

In this response the city officials are asking the residents to help with any type of input on how to make things run smoother or what needs to be done to better protect the town.

Sam McKay has volunteered to help contact the flood victims and let them know that the City would like to help.

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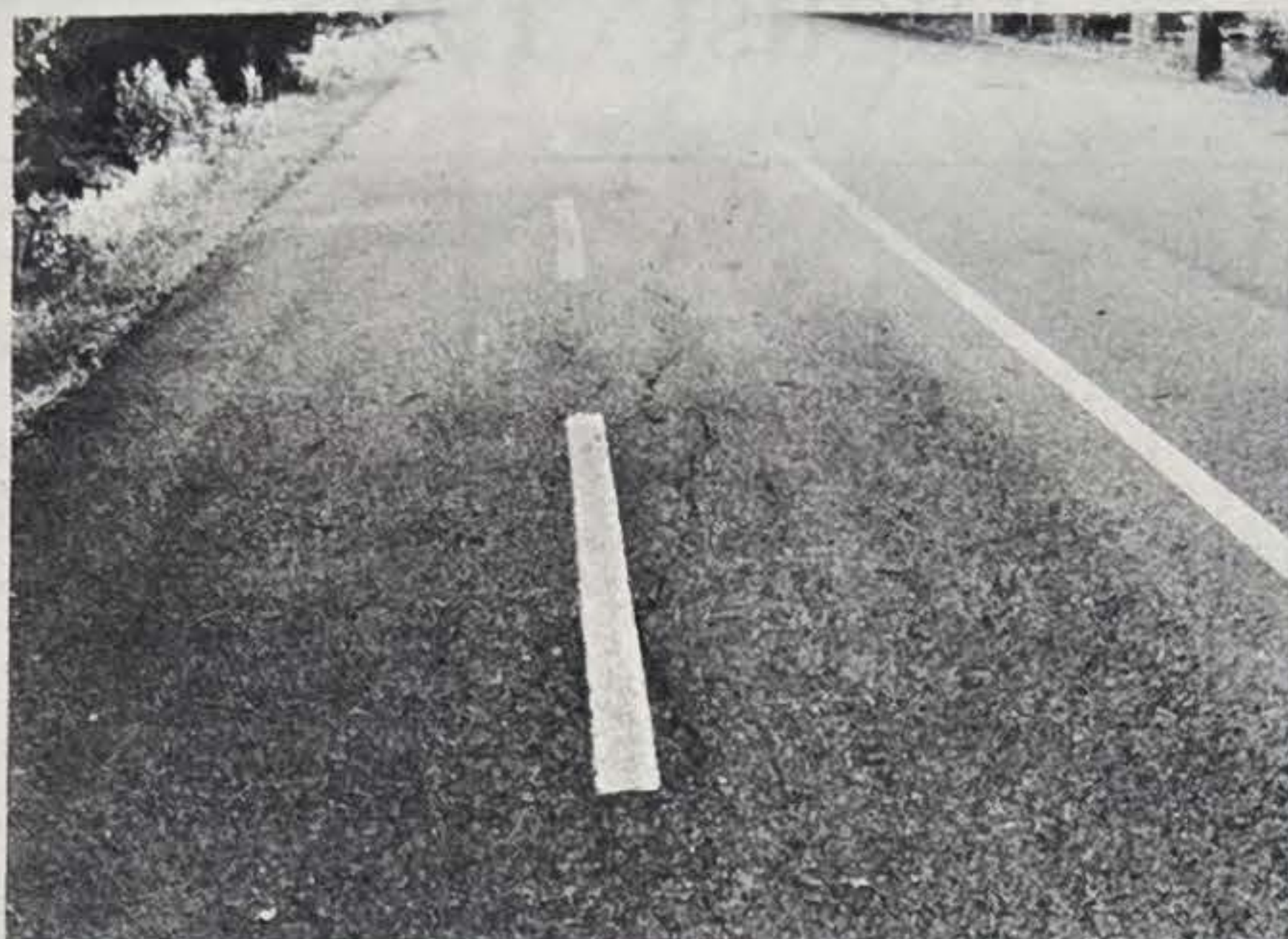

Responses for the month of May 1993 were 20.

The Fire and Rescue department responded in the search and recovery operations for Ty Massey, Rock Island Police Dive Team and Hampton Fire Rescue had the opportunity to work very closely together. Rock Island was extremely impressed with our department, equipment and personnel. They have requested a mutual aid agreement between our two agencies, as well as the opportunity to train together. One class was held at East Moline Pool already with additional ones planned.

The structure at 509 Third Ave was burnt Saturday, June 12, 1993. Three field instructors from the University of Illinois Fire Service Institute provided the guidance and instruction. Two of these instructors are officers (Lt. and Capt.) with the Chicago Fire Department and the other is a Lt. with Schaumburg Fire. Hampton personnel said the instruction and practical exercises were the best they have ever attended. This training will undoubtedly enhance the service we provide to our citizens.

Registration was held on July 7, 1993. If you were unable to register your child in July, you may register them from 8:00 A.M. - 11:00 A.M. on August 16th - August 20th.

We will also have a line, in order for parents to access school calendar events. We hope this line will assist parents in regards to early dismissals, emergency items. We are all very excited about this new system which should open the lines of communication for everyone.

Cook berries and corn starch until thickened. Then add soft gelatin last. Let cool before putting into baked shell.

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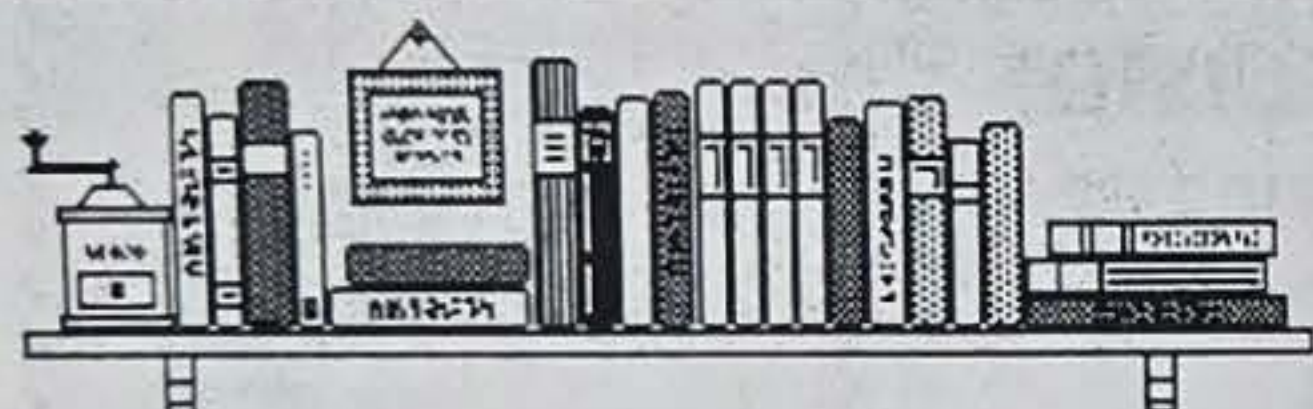

4 teaspoons dill seed
2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
2 unbeaten eggs
5 cups flour
Combine all items in large bowl except flour. Mix well add flour, 1 cup at a time. Cover let rise until double, stir down and divide into two loaves. Let rise until doubled and then bake at 350 for 40 to 50 minutes.
