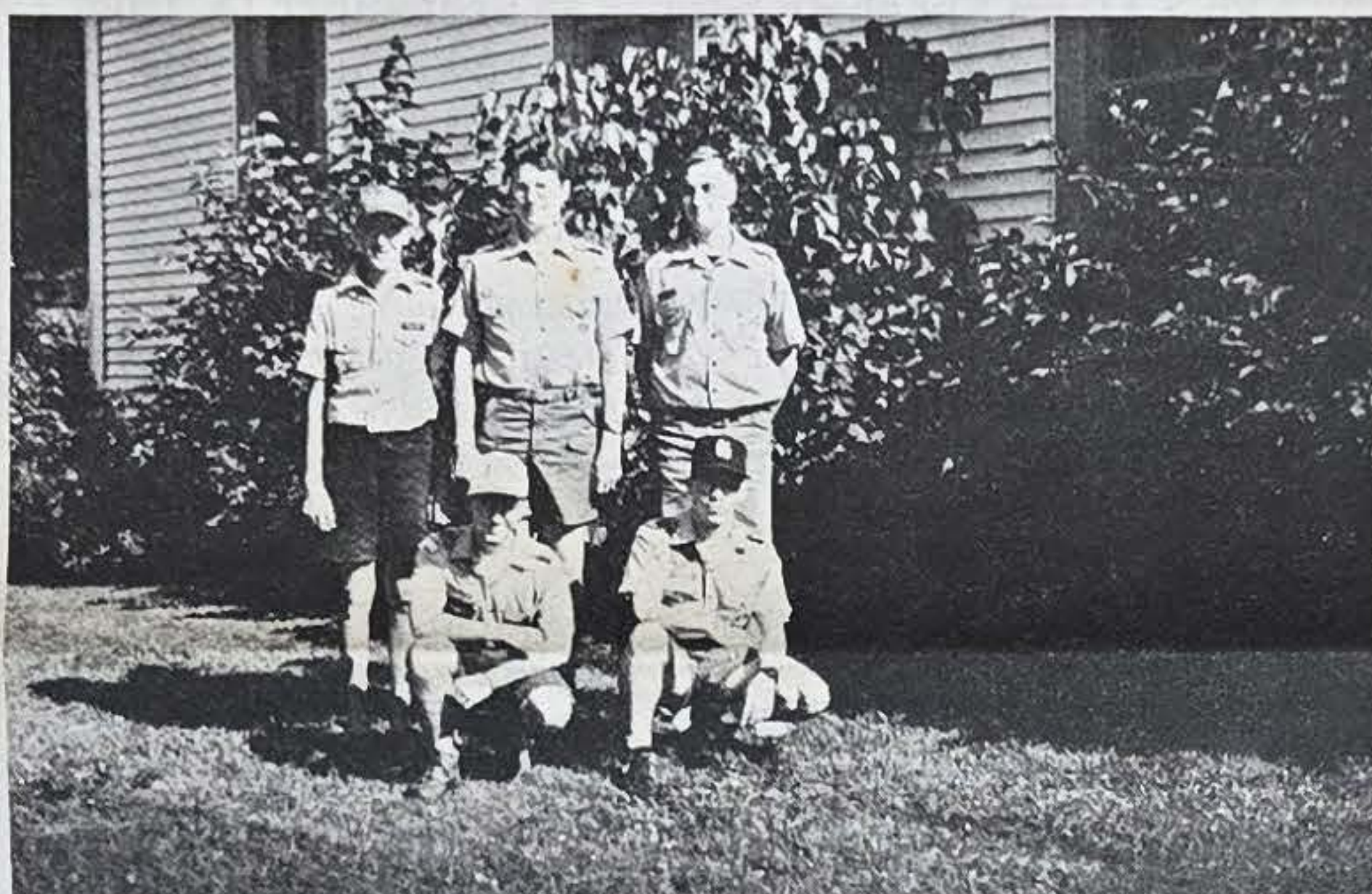

Boy Scouts Earn Top Honors

I had the privilege of meeting the Boy Scouts of Hampton Troop 236. I enjoyed learning about their accomplishments. The troop has 11 active members and out of these 11 there are 5 who either have or will soon be completing their Eagle Scout Badge Award. This is a great accomplishment to achieve this rank and from what I was told only 1% of all Scouts receive this.

It was not an easy road for them to go. Each merit badge and each rank took a lot of time and commitment. To get to the Eagle Badge Award each Scout had to complete 10 required badges and 11 elective badges. The steps to complete before Eagle are: Tenderfoot, 2nd class Scout, 1st class Scout, Star, Life and final the Eagle.

The troop as a whole do many community projects to earn badges, many of the projects are things that help to beautify our community. The buildings at the Ball diamond were painted by the Scouts. They help with the food drive in February, the placing of flags on the veterans graves during the Memorial Day Celebration. They are the honor guard at the ceremony held at Blacks Museum. The boys also expressed that in being a Scout it has kept them out of the wrong crowds. They each felt that they have gained the respect of their family and friends. They also agreed that Scouting has helped with their maturity and physical

fitness. All the Scouts expressed that they enjoyed the family participation that scouting offers. They all agree that it has helped to bridge some of the generation gap.

David Verdick is a Eagle Scout, his community project was to relocate veterans graves and place markers on each one. In doing this he needed to go out and solicit businesses to help defray the cost of each marker. The markers are in the Hampton Cemetery.

David expressed the need for his project as a way to find them during the holidays to place flags and to enable the relatives to find their family.

Shawn Gillespie will complete his Eagle Scout requirements in the next few weeks. Shawn choose as his community project the painting of the Hampton Cemetery Pillars. In doing this he had to scrape and sand before he was able to paint them. Shawn choose this project because he felt that they needed to be repaired and

he wanted to have them look attractive.

Tony Patton has completed his Eagle Scout requirements and is just waiting for the paper work. Tony choose to make bird houses for the Park to the south of town. Tony made fifteen bird houses in various sizes and types. The houses were designed to house wrens, robins, or sparrows. The houses were made in memory of Tony's grandfather A.J. Patton. It was his grandfather that guided Tony in this project.

HAMPTON HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Hampton Historical Society has some major events coming up in September. September 15, is the annual banquet celebrating the formation of the Society in 1974. It will be held at the Hampton Methodist Church at 6 P.M. anyone welcome, member or not, but we do need advance reservations so the Women's Society of the church will know how much food to prepare.

The next Saturday, September 18, will feature the annual Apple Festival, from 1:00 to 4:00 at Brettum and Black Mercantile/Museum will be open and selling desserts, mostly centered around the apple. If you have enjoyed the delicious food before, be sure to come again and notify your friends. This year there will be more homemade crafts than in the past and also more demonstrations.

An old mystery partially solved.

One time, a few years ago, I mentioned some of the things in Hamptons past that we are ignorant about and continually looking for information. One of these mysteries involves a grave in Hampton Cemetery. Each Memorial Day the Scouts put a flag on a grave marked "Unknown, U.S.

Cavalry". We have always wondered how an unknown person came to be buried here, and if he was a member of the military unit indicated on the gravestone. We have finally found an explanation, though most of it is speculation, based on a few facts that came to light.

It seems that after the Civil War, it was possible for communities to have the body of one of the unidentified soldiers killed in battle, buried in their cemeteries as a sort of memorial and tribute to those who died. we have not been able to pinpoint whether this was done through the Federal Government, the Grand Army of the Republic, or some other veteran's group. Also, the unit designated on the stone - "1st U.S. Cavalry" is a clue. In the Civil War the recruitment of soldiers

was under the jurisdiction of the various states, so most who entered the military served in units called (for example) 89th Illinois Infantry, or 6th Illinois Cavalry (both of these had many Hampton men). There was however a small regular army that was under the direct jurisdiction of the Federal Government. It existed before the war - a small group, maybe 20,000 when the war started, and mostly spread out on the frontier. These regulars were concentrated when the war began and served from beginning to end. It was possible during the war to enter the regular army but there were few recruits, since most who joined through the state units were given a bonus (called a bounty), but joining the regulars provided no money.

Apparently the man who lies in the grave on the hill, was one of these

regulars, a man with no family attachment, whose only family was the US Army. I find it interesting to speculate on what kind of person he was, but I'm happy we honor this man along with our other deceased veterans.

Village Board

July 26, 1993

The city received a sewer bill for \$26,746.00, this was during the flooding. Pres. Scott Newberg went to the East Moline meeting to asking for some cooperation with the bill. The City of East Moline will be giving us 12 months to pay this bill off. The town will pay \$6,700 now and spread the rest out over the next 11 months.

The town people effected by the flood met prior to the regular session to discuss problems with action taken during the flood.

It was mostly favorable with a few complaints. The board will hold a special session on August 4th to discuss with the residents on what could have been done differently.

The road around the manholes seem to be sinking. There is concern as to whether or not there might be trouble with the sewer lines. This will be checked.

A new bat wing mower to be purchased for approximately \$10,440. Motion was made to purchase. This will cut down the amount of time it takes to do the mowing.

A special meeting will be held in August, to make a decision on the road behind State Street Duplexes.

August 9, 1993

Sixth Street sewer project has approval and will soon be worked on. The cost being 21,437.50 this is 12% down from previous bid. Walter Laud Construction will be doing the work.

John Versypt was at the meeting and asking how the progress is going with the road behind the State Street Duplexes. There is still a impasse on this another meeting will be held to talk with all parties involved.

If there are any elderly residents that need help with clean up they should contact 764-6804, Partners in Job Training.

August 23, 1993

Motion was made to have Performance Pipeline come and flush out the sewer line so that a camera can be placed down to check for damage done to the system since the flood. The cost of just the flushing and the camera is \$8508.00.

Scott Newberg shared with the board the information he received

from the Government Flood Recovery Summit he attended last week.

The village stresses that if you are going to be doing work on your property since the flood that you get a building permit.

The Hampton Fire Association and Shannon's restaurant raised \$900.00 in their fund raiser. The money from this will be dispersed

by the city for sewer and water bills to the individuals affected mostly by the flood.

August 30, 1993 there will be a flood meeting discussing the proper procedures for handling a crisis such as the flood.

Motion was made to seek bids for the Lorraine Mabeus Memorial.

Meeting ended in closed session, to discuss personnel policies.

July 27, 1993, a public hearing was held to inform people of the tentative bus route. Many residents from the top of the hill were present to express their views on the route.

The tentative route for the bus service will be to come in off of route 84 down to 7th Street and through town via third avenue. The bus would not be going to the top of the hill.

Questions were asked as to why the upper part of town would not be serviced and the response was that a survey was done and it proved that the people on top of the hill would not use the service. More cars were available to the residents on top of the hill. As opposed to the residents below the hill.

Questions were raised if there were enough calls requesting service would they change the route? Yes, they could possible do this. We will have to wait until after the meeting on the 4th of August to see if we will get a direct response service to the top of the hill or not.

Effective August 23, 1993 Metro Link will service Hampton. Route #10, red line stops at all three main terminals (East Moline, Moline, and Rock Island). Passengers can transfer with ease to all other routes, including Bettendorf and Davenport. Transfers within the Metro Link system are FREE.

The new projected route runs up the back hill called Rt. 52 down the cemetery hill turning right at 84 goes to 6th Street turns left on to 2nd Ave and turns left at 4th Street and stops at Quinn's before returning to East Moline. The bus will run every 1/2hour to Hampton starting at 6:15 at Quinn Pharmacy this means that when it come up the hill from Babcock it

will be a little earlier for those of you who will be catching in on top of the hill.

Adult fare is \$.60. Senior citizen, disabled with a reduced fare authorization card, those with a Medicare/Medicaid Card and children 5-15 years old pay only \$.30. Ticket Books are 10 tickets and the punch pass is 20 punches and the 21 st ride is free. Applications must be filled out if you are any senior citizen or disabled so you can get a authorization card.
