Mary and George were married in Missouri by a Justice of the Peace and it turned out that he was once the Mayor of Hampton, (George Moore).

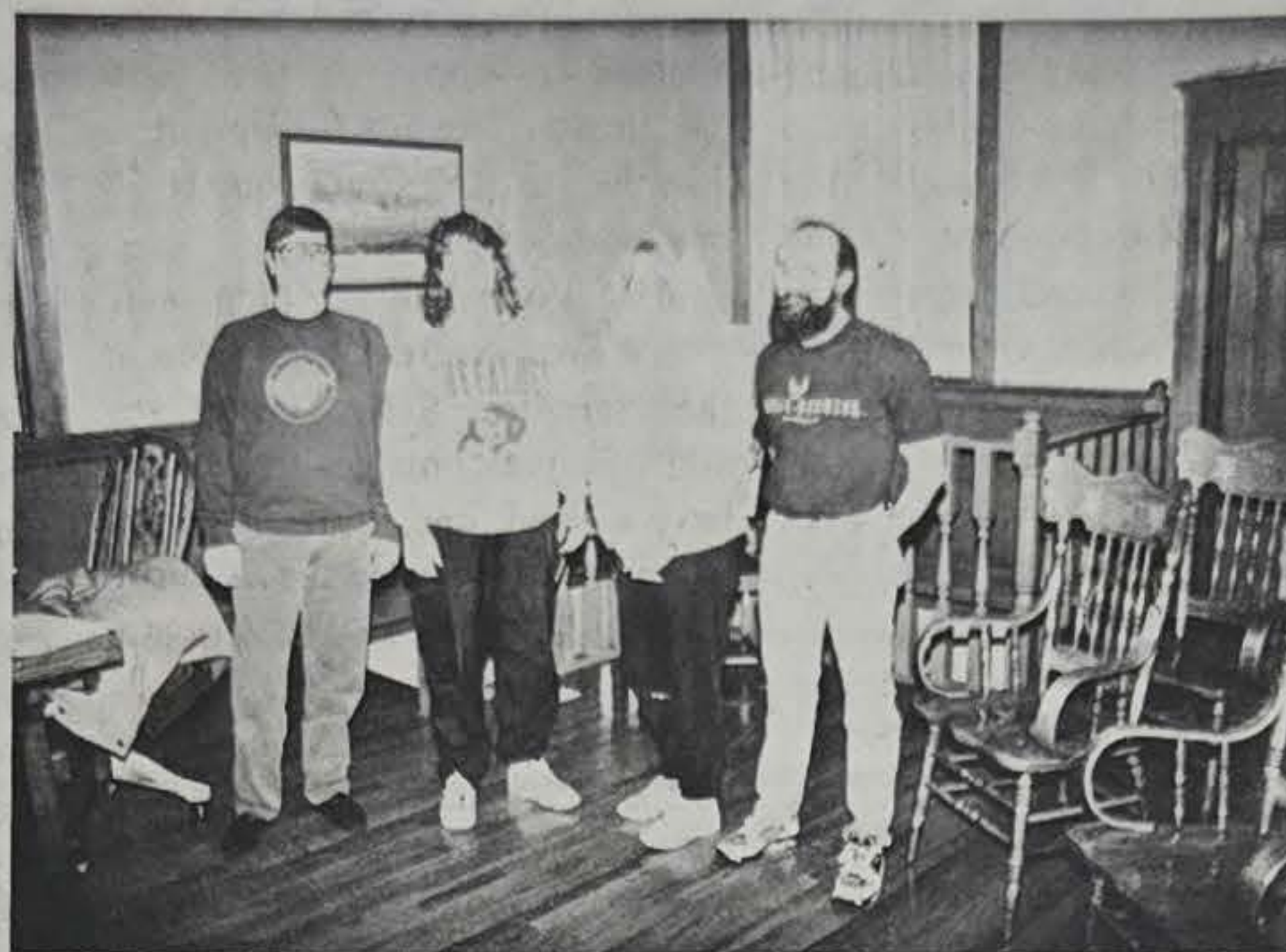
Mary said that George has spoiled her rotten, and made her life very happy.

VILLAGE NEWS

January 10, 1994.

A very calm meeting the Flood Plan Amendment passed.

Dick Porter TIF approved and a loan of \$10,000 was issued.

A \$100.00 contribution to the Hampton Boosters was approved for their fund raiser.

A question was raised about the dike at the south end of the village. The only thing holding up the go ahead is a approval from the Corp.

The subject of what is happening with Addante's restaurant. When can the city take action on getting the building torn down. The city has to wait until all lawyers are finished with their legal rights. The city has given the lawyers a 30 or 60 day time frame to have this completed. The time is soon to expire.

January 24, 1994

A lengthy discussion was held over who is at fault if anyone over the lights at the parking lot in the south end of towns park. Two lights are not working and they are not exactly sure as to when they went out. It either happened when they put down the black top or when we experience the flood. Art O Lite will be checking for breaks in the line.

The village board meeting for Feb. 14 will be changed to Feb. 15 so the committee of a whole can go to the East Moline Board meeting, about what to do with the sewer bill.

On January 31st a representative will be here to discuss what will

be going on when the rip rapping begins. They have 62 days from beginning to end to complete the project. The concern of the board is what type of damage will the streets receive when the big machinery comes into town. John Sansale is in charge of this operation and he will be over seeing the work.

Anyone, society member or not, is invited to attend.

Our "Ghost" Town

An interesting facet of life in 19th century America was the rise and demise of towns. They would be created because of the commencement of a mining operation or because of the construction of a railroad or boat landing, or for many other reasons. When the reason for existence disappeared, the town would languish and also

disappear. Our community had one of these "Ghost Towns".

About 1870, coal prospectors struck a vein of coal south of what we now call Hubbard Road in the area east and south of the present Golfmohr Golf Course. This region had acquired the name "Happy Hollow". Soon several shafts were sunk and extensive mining commenced.

Some of the miners lived in Hampton and made the trek on foot to and from work, but a large number of them lived in the community they called Happy Hollow, neighbor to the mines, there was a wagon road on the edge of the present golf course property that led to the miner's cottages and beyond that, to the mines. In the beginning the coal was hauled by wagon to Hampton to be loaded on the railroad, but soon a line of narrow gauge railway was built from the mining area to Port Byron Junction, which was located, not in Port Byron but on the site of present day East Moline. There was a large trestle from behind the site of the old John Deere school extending

over where the present business district is, over the Rock Island Railway Tracks and turning right along the Milwaukee tracks (today 12th Ave runs beside this area). Here the coal was dumped to be reloaded on the standard gauge trains.

None of this is evident today, illustrating how transient the works of human beings are in this world. The mining era changed Hampton profoundly in many ways. We will explore this in greater detail later in this column. For now remember our "Ghost Town". Memories are all that's left of it.

Born 90 years ago in the small town of Blandensville, IL. is a friend and a neighbor of many Hampton people. February 23rd will mark a mile stone in Gertrude (Trudy) Coder's life.

Trudy has lived in Hampton most of her life moving back when she was 5 years old. When she was 5 her mother passed away and her father placed her in the care of her Grandparents Charles and Ann Eliza Lee.

She graduated from Hampton Grade School and went to work in the onion fields here and in LeClaire, Iowa. She said she was the best stripper. At first I asked what she meant by this. She took the tops off the bulbs. She quit the onion fields at 17 and stayed at home to help take care of her grandparents.

When she was 21 she and Harold William Coder Sr. were married. They had no courtship 3 years and then when I asked her how he proposed she said she couldn't remember she taught it was just expected that they would be married. So they were married on April 12, 1925 by Rev. Neill of the Hampton Methodist Church. She was married at the home of her grandparents.

Her grandfather was one of the founders of the church her gave the first thousand dollars to help start the church.

When she and Bill started out housekeeping they bought their first house at the south end of town. Years later they bought the house at the north



end. She has lived at the present address for 51 years.

I asked her how life in Hampton differs from when her children grew up she said not much has changed except more people are moving in and since she doesn't get out as much she hasn't met them. She believes people are the same maybe busier but the same.

She and Bill have 4 children Harold William Jr.

Clifford of Hampton, Betty Eggerichs of Hampton and Jack of Hampton. Their are 13 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

She worked for 16 years as a clerk at the Hampton Post Office retiring when Bill retired from John Deere. After retirement she travels with Bill in the fall to Florida or Arizona. She has been in all the states in the union except Hawaii.

As a child growing up in Hampton I have had the great opportunity to be in and out of her home. Her grand daughter Sue Coder was one of my best friends. All of Sue's friends and I am sure all the other grandchildren's friends have

referred to her as Grandma. It is the only thing to do, it did come natural.

JAM'N WITH JANE

During my lifetime I have saved many, many recipes. To keep these in some order K and D Woodworks in Hampton designed and made me a cupboard that is now overflowing. About 10 years ago, I started writing recipes I liked in a blank book. I numbered the pages and made a table of contents. This year I many need to start a new book because this one is full. The big project this year is to put them on a computer disc with the idea of writing a cookbook in the future.

If you would like to start your own cookbook here are ideas to put in it for Christmas. I found

these to be quick and attractive. One recipe uses the white coated oreo. If you have time you could dip your own in almond vanilla or chocolate bark.

For Christmas I decorated them with the squeeze type frosting tubes.

I made two green leaves and three red dots to resemble holly.

I think this would work for most any occasion. You could make

a heart, shamrock, egg, chick, flower, candle, diploma, flag,

star, sun, book, pumpkin, bunny

or cornucopia depending on the holiday that you are celebrating. This also works on the chocolate marshmallow Snackwell Cookies by Nabisco.

Another clever idea I found in a craft magazine takes regular shaped pretzels. Place a small dab of melted white chocolate in each opening. At the top place 2 green M&M's and 2 straight pretzels broken in half for antlers and eyes. Then add a dab of chocolate and a red M&M for the nose and you have Rudolf the Red Nose Reindeer.

One of the favorite cookies I make every year are similar to rice crispie squares but you use corn flakes and 1 tablespoon green food coloring. Then shape into wreaths and decorate with red candies. This year I shaped them like Christmas Trees and used mini colored chocolate morsels to decorate them. For Valentines Day you could color them red and shape them like hearts. For Easter season I have left out the coloring, shaped them like nests and filled them with mini jelly beans.

Since I am diabetic, I discovered jigglers with sugar free Jello this Christmas. Tupperware has a new mold for this that is really great for kids. It holds one recipe and you get nine or so animals.

Hopefully next year you will get all your shopping organized and your baking done early like I finally did this year. I really thought it was because of retirement but maybe I finally got organized.

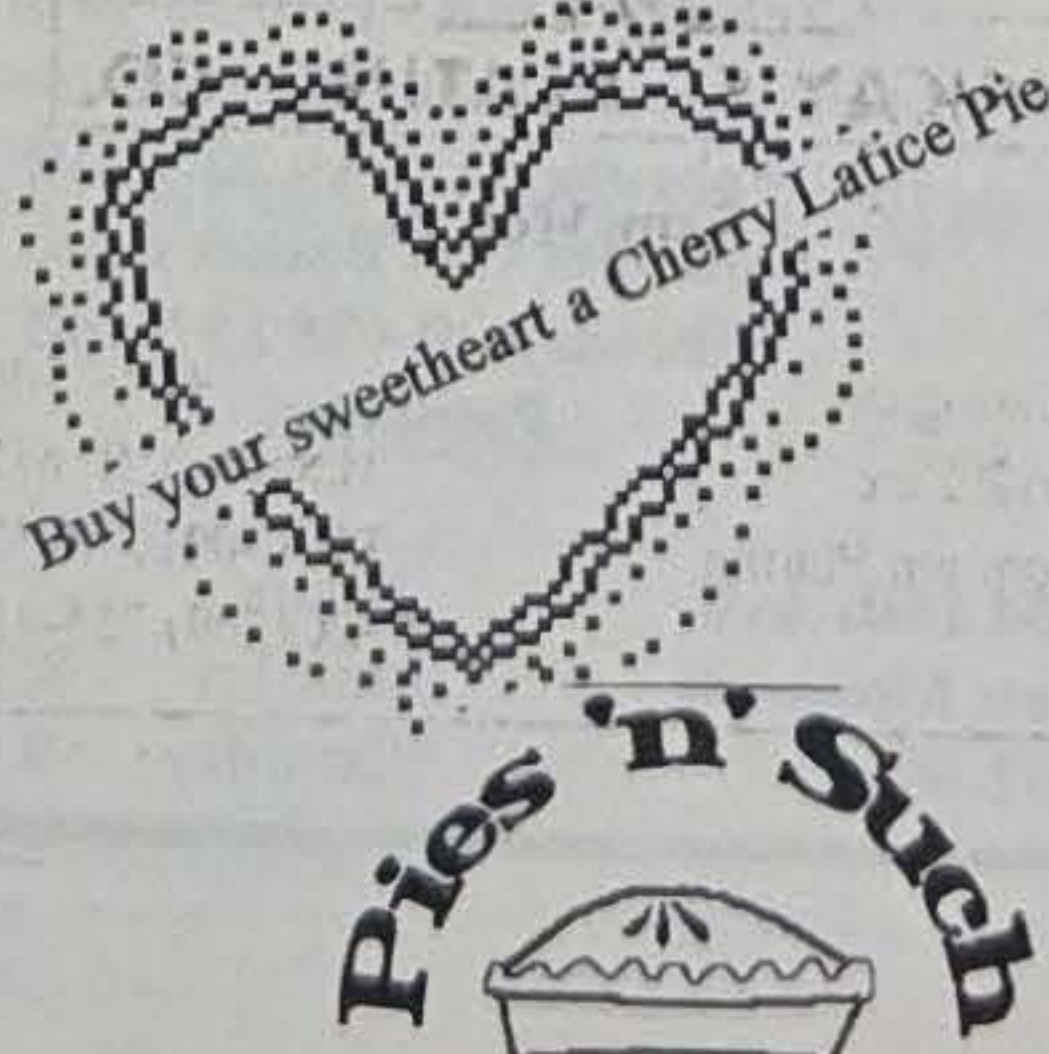

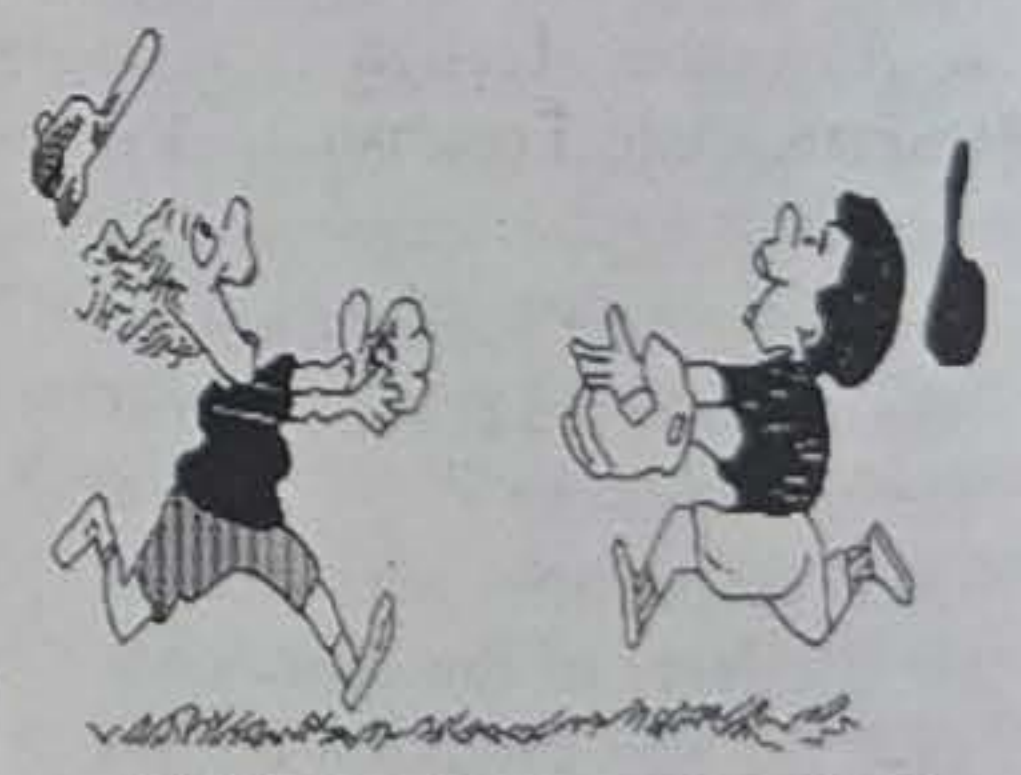

They do Van and Truck Conversions for the handicap. The install a unique type of lift,

it is called a PAL. It needs no more than 31 inches of clearance to operate. Standard lifts need 40 inches for the platform plus additional room for the chair to exit.

Mrs. DeSplinter said that they would go vehicle shopping with you so you do not buy too much vehicle and then not be able to use it all. This seems to be a large problem when someone does not know what they do and don't need.

The DeSplinters will make house calls and install lifts in the home. They also can do elevators or stair chairs. They do not limit themselves to just automobiles they can modify a desk so it can fit a wheelchair.

The biggest obstacle is the funding, government regulations are the stopping block. So much paper work to be completed and then wait to see if the funding will come through.

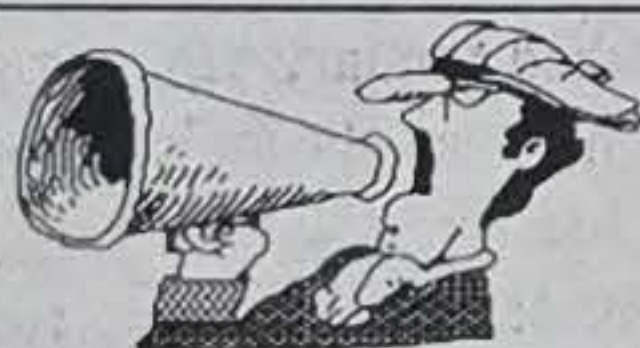

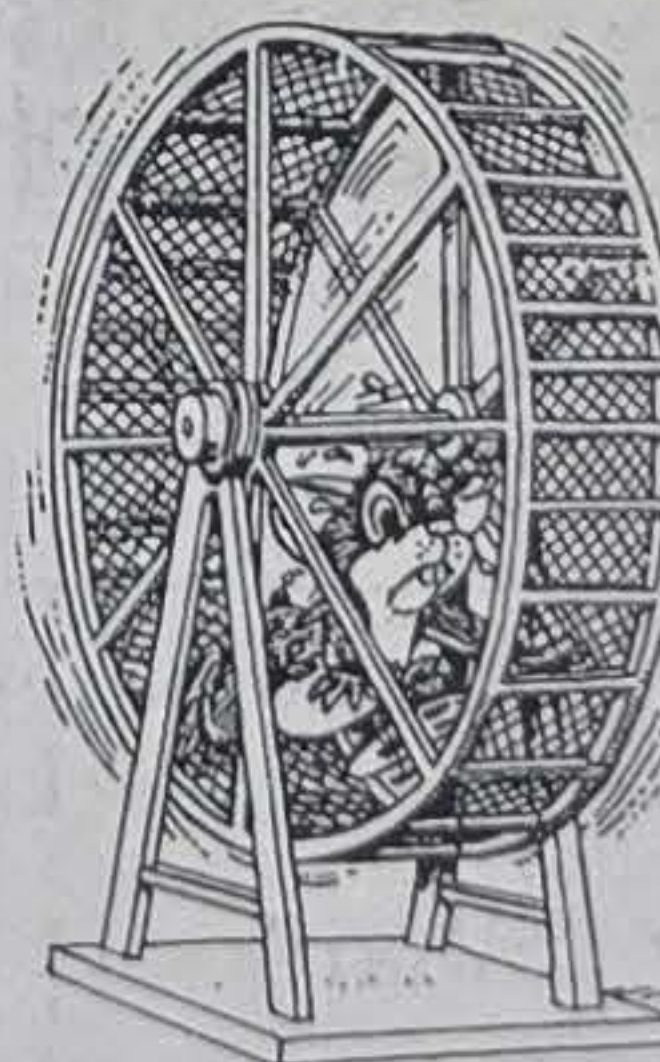
