## New York and Home

Recently four members of the Hampton Fire Department made a trip to New York. Their reason for going was to observe and learn new fire fighting techniques.

Chief Craig Haigh, Todd Springsteen, Brian Neels and Darrell Unzel went on their own time and expense to New York with the sole intent to learn and bring back new ideas to enhance the operations here at Hampton. They did bring back plenty of new knowledge, but they also found that a lot of what they are doing now is exactly what the bigger departments in New York are doing now.

The four men stayed in a motel and then would go to the fire stations and when a call came in they would go and observe the others in their job. Craig said that he would watch the Command Chief and see how he operated and each of the others watched the person who did the same job that they themselves would be doing.

In the larger stations the shifts of the fire department are different then ours in the area. Due to the amount of calls the NY department receives they have shifts of 10 hours and 14 hours. There is always something going

on in the big city.

One incident that occurred while they were there was a helicopter crash. A student pilot and his instructor were making a flight when the helicopter became tangled up in the power lines. The helicopter crashed on the interstate. When it crashed it was close enough to a parking lot with 75 cars in it which all went up in flames. This call was a 5 alarm call and our firemen were able to observe a large operation in progress.

What is a five alarm call it is a call with 15 ladder trucks, 15

engines, 14 chiefs and 1 rescue, plus 20 misc. units. Big.

The picture on this page is one of the crash that one of the four took. They have rolls upon rolls of film that they took while on their trip.

The response to our volunteers was great they welcomed the guys with open arms there was not stigma about them being volunteers like there is here. The departments out there were more than happy to have them there and they showed them different ways to use tools, techniques that work faster and help to save lives

and time.

They found out that a lot of the same techniques that the bigger departments use are the same. Craig said that the fire department here receives a lot of harassment about their techniques and the way they train. They are looked as the odd balls, they take a lot of flack.

Craig's main goal for the Department and the town is this " Citizens deserve same response as the paid departments, there should be no differences between paid and volunteer." And one thing is asked do not say well they are only a volunteer department, because they really aren't they work and train very hard to bring the town the same type of expertise and performance as the larger companies.

Here is a run down of a typical meeting night. Firefighters arrive between 6 and 6:30PM and they go through each truck and get a complete check of equipment and supplies. At 7 they start their meeting, there is several areas that each person goes to. And each week they go to a different area to train, so that everyone is able to do all jobs and do them well.

An example of our training time compared with Rock Island. Rock Island has 63 firefighters (paid), and they put in 8600 man hours for training. Hampton has 35 Volunteer firefighters and they have 6400 man hours for training. This is a large number of hours that each of the firefighters give up to protect our town.

There are several techniques that were brought back from New York on how to take out windows in a multi level building. The ladder truck is used. With the building of new home the contractors are using double and triple pane glass and it is hard to break the window out with the standard tool, because it takes a lot of time. The ladder truck is used. They just put the ladder

through the window, poof the window is out. The ladder truck is also used to vent a roof, with the cheaper way the houses are being built and the tresses being only made out of 2 x 4's it is to risky to put a fire fighter up on the roof so they extend the ladder over the roof and then vent it. The goal in the future of our department is to have a ladder truck. This will keep fire fighting safe and casualties low.

Brian Neels told me that seeing the fires and going to the calls, he was able to observe what each fire fighter was doing and how they did their own task. he picked up ideas on techniques and the guys on the departments were very eager to help and answer any questions that Brian had.

One of the Fire fighter updates that the department gets from New York, recently showed how to vent a hood on a burning car. Training was done in the

classroom about this new procedure, and recently the fire department needed to use this new technique and it did work. With out the help of the larger departments and the material they supply to Hampton we could be still working in the stone age like so many other departments that do not like change.

A great philosopher said "Easy to be afraid of change, but be more afraid of not changing." Craig uses this often, to keep people thinking positive.

Chief Haigh saves the department money by checking everything out before they go to purchase any new equipment, he never acts on what a salesman says. If someone is selling something that is suppose to save time and lives, he will do research and contact other larger departments that might use the equipment several times in a day and ask for their impute. Many times he has found that the salesman is just trying to sell them a piece of equipment that is not necessarily needed or right for the department.

The 4 men were able to tour Cairns and Bros. while they were on their trip. They saw the way the gear was made and what specifics were needed and what were not needed. Now when a piece of equipment is ordered Craig will know what is actually needed and what is not.

Our department is a department to be proud of and not to criticize. Know one knows exactly how hard each one of them works and the amount of time they give up for the better of the community. Next time you see a fire fighter Thank them they are here for you.

## VILLAGE NEWS

The trustees are moving their committee meetings to the 1st and 3rd Mondays of each month, and the regular board meetings will be 2nd and 4th of each month.

There is a new corporal in town he was appointed by Chief Terry Ott to handle the training of the Auxiliary Police. His name is Matt Iverson.

The police department is now functioning well with the new dispatch unit which is out of Silvis. The emergency number is 911, and the non emergency number is 755-4524. Put this by your phone so you will have it.

There will be rental fee for the pavilion in the river park. That fee is \$25.00 and is non refundable. You must contact the village hall to reserve the pavilion.

A new auditor for the town has been hired for \$6,000.00 per year and the contract goes to Morgan and Peterson.

Bike Trail is moving slowly there have been meetings but as yet no movement.

Seeding needs to be done to the dike on the north end of town before there is no dirt.

Remember if you have used old tires that you no longer want June 21 and June 22 is the time to get rid of them for free. You can take them to Whiteside FS in Silvis between 9AM and 3PM.

The East Moline Correctional Center will be the place to take them after the 1st of July, but there will be a fee. You will also be able to get rid of your old

## JAMIN WITH JANE

This time I need to remember I'm writing in May but you read it in June. Well, you read in May I did become a Grannie. I never had pictures in my purse of my children but I do have pictures of Linley. We have also been to Chicago to hold her and love her.

I believe I promised casserole recipes. I have three I put together, but never have written the first two down. So I imagine they have changed a little from the originals.

The first one and the most popular is one I used in college that came from the Good Housekeeping Magazine in "53". I've always thought I would go to a library and look it up. The recipe was called Johnny Marionzette. I make it several times a year as it is an old standby for taking to friends in need or want.

1 bag med. shell pasta, 1 can 46 oz. tomato juice or 1 qt. + 1 can 11.5 V8 Picante, 3 - 4 med. onions chopped, 1 lb. ground beef, 1 lb. mushrooms sliced or several cans, 4 + cups shredded cheese + 1/2 cup Parmesan (I

use all the leftover little pieces of cheese that seem to accumulate in the refrigerator) If you don't have these use at least two different kinds of rather flavorful cheese.

Cook the pasta as directed on the package add the tomato juice (If you have a little spaghetti sauce this will spice it up little). Brown the hamburger with onions and mushrooms. In the summer I sometimes add green peppers, tomatoes, or zucchini. Then add half of the shredded cheese. Stir. Remove when the cheese begins to melt. Then mix both together in a large casserole bowl. top with the remaining cheese and bake until crusty and brown. 45 to 60 minutes at 325 degrees. Serve with garlic bread and a green tossed salad. The more variety in the cheese the better the casserole.

A fall favorite is one for which I've never had a written recipe. it is a corn sausage casserole. Mrs. Ila Hoffstetter who used to live and run a store in the house where I now live. (I used to live across the street) She brought us this casserole once either when there had been an illness or death in the family. A nice tradition in

our little Village of Hampton. I never had this written down, but my mom made it and told me the recipe. We have it often in the fall of the year.

1 lb bulk sausage, 1 can whole kernel corn, 4 slices white bread, 1 cup mild 1 - 2 eggs, Soak the broken bread in the milk. Add the beaten eggs. Crumble the raw sausage and add the corn. Mix, if it seems dry add more milk or some liquid from the corn. Salt and pepper to taste bake 325 for 1 hour. Serve with Rye bread and cole slaw.

My newest hit isn't really a casserole. It is a pasta dish combines with stir fry. Very quick, tasteful and easy.

2 Tbls. olive oil, 5 cloves garlic, 1 lb. asparagus (Dennhardt's is the best), a few drops hot sauce, 1/4 tsp. red pepper flakes, 10 oz. pasta or noodles. I've used a mix of small shells, wheels, stars, hearts or bunnies, 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese.

Wash and break your asparagus into 1 inch pieces. Put water on for the pasta. When it boils add pasta. Put olive oil in a skillet with minced garlic, hot pepper flakes and hot sauce. Cook two

minutes be careful not to burn. Add asparagus and cook 8 to 10 minutes. Stir often. Toss with pasta and cheese. You may wish to serve with a green salad and some fresh fruit. A nice crusty bread is a nice touch.

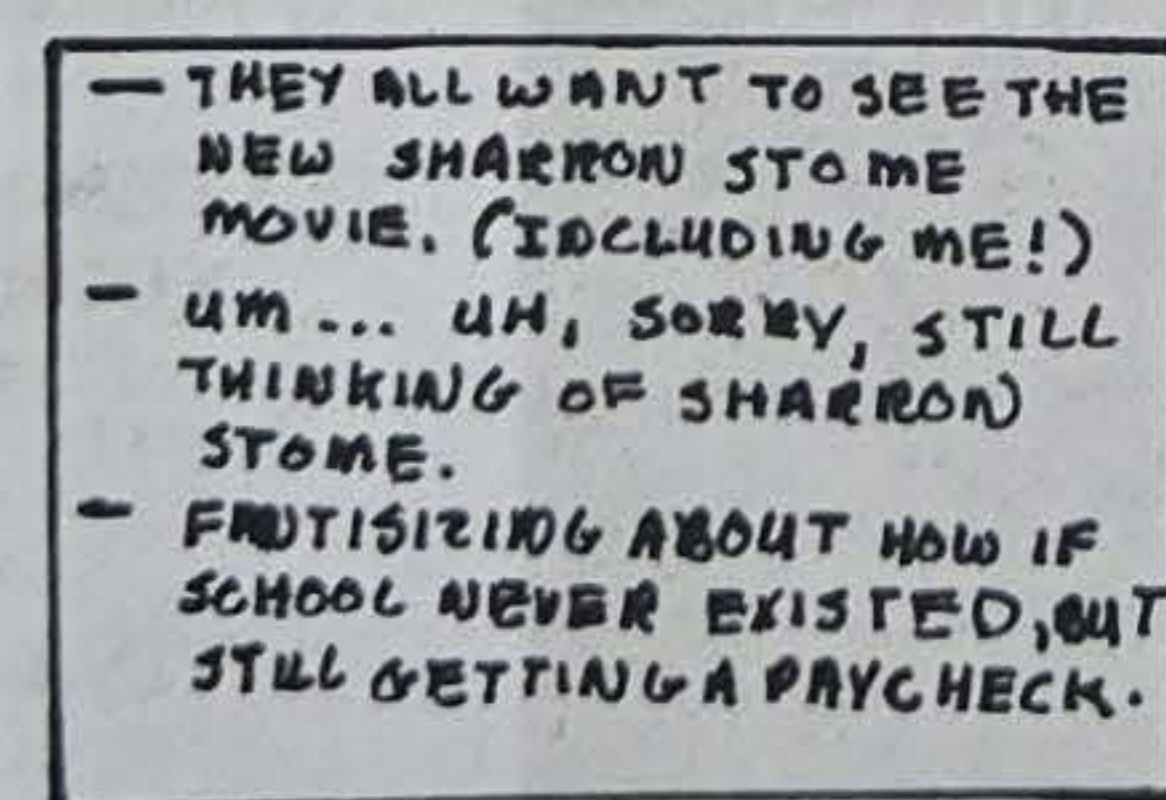
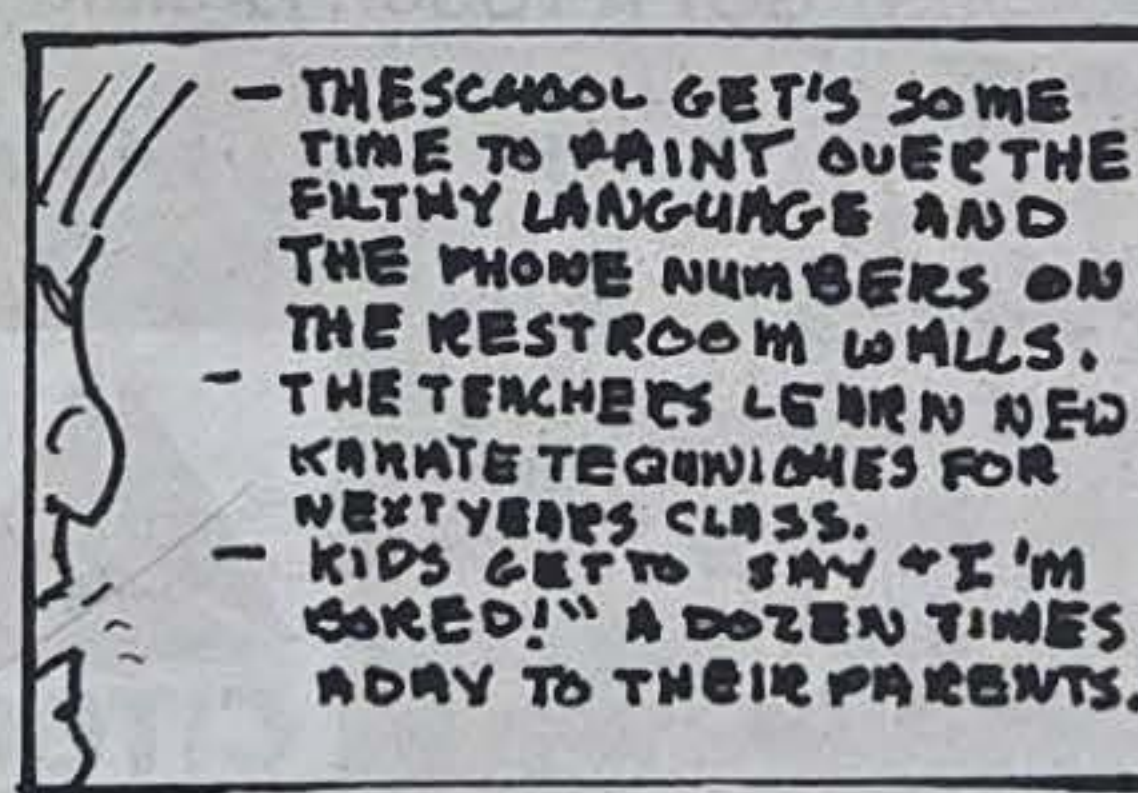
