LITTLE LAMB'S PRESCHOOL

Zion Lutheran Church knew that there was a need for a preschool in the area, they just weren't sure when to start it up.

In 1990 when the new Sunday School wing was built it was thought that in the future it would be able to house a preschool. Members of the church both old and young knew there was this need and so they all were in approval of opening the preschool.

It took a year of serious planning to get the idea off the ground. The process of getting everything up to code and meet all the expectations of the DCFS was one of the harder things that the staff had to overcome. And getting the word out that they are here.

The school is staffed with two teachers, both certified and both have their directors licenses. There will be two aides to help in each class. Heather Anderson will be the 4 year old teacher and the Director her aide will be Melody Mossman, 3 year old teacher is Wendy Wassell, and her aide is Shari Loy.

I had the opportunity to see and speak with the staff. They are busy making last minute preparations for the opening of

preschool.

I am taking from their hand out some of the guidelines that they will be using when teaching to the children.

Their opening statement as far as I am concerned tells me that they do care and are prepared to teach and nurture my child.

"We are excited to be a part of this important, starting step in a child's educational process. It is the aim of Little Lambs Preschool to offer the best environment possible for a child's full range of educational, social, and spiritual development."

Enrollment:

Children entering the 3 year program should be three years old on or before September 1st. Children entering 4 year old program should be 4 on or before September 1st.

3 year olds meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays mornings from 9:00 AM to 11:30 AM. 4 year olds meet on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 9:00 AM to 11:30 AM. Each class is limited to 10 students each. When the morning sessions are full they will then start a afternoon session. All

applications will be considered on a first come first serve basis.

Some Objectives of their preschool program are:

They work to: Lead the child to appreciate the wonders of God's creation and to trust in the Lord's wisdom and loving kindness.

Help the child develop love and tolerance for all people.

Help make his/her adjustment to school a happy and wholesome one.

Give each child a variety of opportunities to work and play

cooperatively in group settings.

Teach the child to act and think for himself, and to develop a degree of independence.

Help the child develop desirable speech habits that he/she might communicate more effectively and to grow in vocabulary.

Teach him/her good sportsmanship.

Cirriculum:

Students will learn to participate in scheduled academic and learning experiences. Each day they will participate in experiences which integrate: religious stories and prayer time, listening skills, color, vocabulary, large and small motor skills language development,

Jeremy, my only one in school this fall has been working so the no school part has not been a problem. He has a schedule just like school, up early every day. And believe me he doesn't like that part at all.

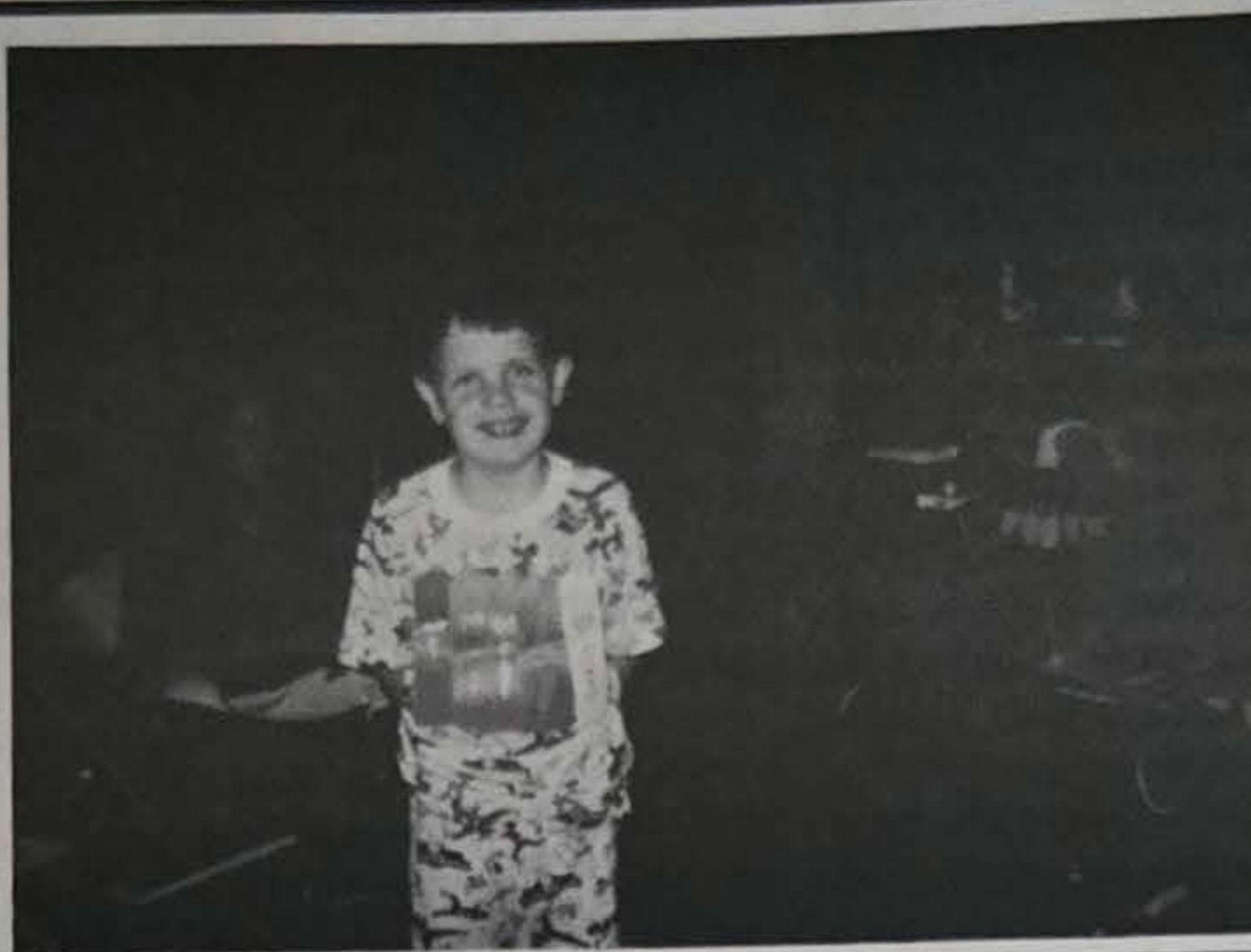
We are back from vacation, we took a trip to North Dakota over the Fourth of July.

Cont. from page 1 Preschool creativity and imagination, dramatic play, music, art, finger plays, numbers, self concept and social activity.

There will be once a month field trips, show and share days. They will be Training the Whole Child. This means that they attempt to provide activities that will develop your child's mind, body, and soul. Unless children learn to value themselves as

beings who are loved and redeemed by God, they cannot learn to fully value and respect others.

We know that a child has to become involved in order to learn. He/she has to see and feel, taste and smell, listen and do. Becoming messy or dirty or wet or ruffled can be part of the learning process. Becoming involved often means noise and

much activity. A clean, quiet child may not be a learning child. We attempt to provide the children with a well rounded learning experience and a wide range of learning activities that will better prepare them mentally and socially for kindergarten.

Handwriting:

Riverdale and East Moline School districts are using the D'Nealian Handwriting system. Instead of circles and sticks, the child forms the whole letter at

once, using continuous strokes. The preschool will be using this system. We hope that this will provide a smooth transition into kindergarten for most of our students.

There will parent teacher conferences that will be held in November, January, March and at the end of the year.

Home visits:

Near the end of August, your child's teacher will be contacting each family. Whenever possible, the teacher will schedule a time to meet with you and your child in your home. This special way of introduction helps make the first day of school more pleasant. At that time, the teacher will also be presenting you with a list of information such as school year schedules, snack lists, field trip information, etc.

HAMPTON HISTORICAL SOCIETY

We have had more visitors than usual at Brettun and Black Mercantile Store and Museum this past few weeks. Among them was one with a name familiar to many Hamptonians, George F. McNabney. Many may remember that name as belonging to a man very important in this community. George McNabney served as mayor and in many other Civic capacities, and also wrote a history of this town. No, he hasn't returned from the grave, but his grandson, bearing the same name is still around and is the visitor mentioned above.

He lives in Elgin, Illinois, and came to Hampton with many questions about his grandfather. We supplied him with what information we had and steered him to some people who knew more, notably, Hampton's resident Guru of the past, Eliza Haertjens. Mr. McNabney was very appreciative and sent us some copies of old pictures that he had.

Another recent visitor was former Hamptonian, Edmund Seefeldt. Mr. Seefeldt and his wife Ruth moved to Youngtown, Arizona some years ago. Ruth was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Art Petersen and her brother Art was married to Mary Jane Frazier Brown. They all lived on 3rd

Ave, a block up from the school. Unfortunately Ruth passed away a year ago. Ed was chipper and active, full of curiosity about what has transpired in Hampton since he left. he was especially interested in the Soldiers Monument, and said he had helped build it as a young man. He is 86 and it was dedicated in 1926. he remembered 2 more plaques in addition to the one on there now. Other people have said there were more, but still others maintain the one there now is the only one, there ever was. In any case it reminds us that it is high time to fill up the spaces with the plaques that belong there.

Our problem has been in identifying those who went to the Armed Forces in World War II, Korea, Vietnam, and the Persian Gulf. Any volunteers that have expertise in this area: We have found no place one can get that information without examining thousands of records. We should be about getting this together some way. Aunt Hilma's Sugar Cookies

This is Rocky Nelson's Aunt from Oelesby, IL. He name was Hilma Anderson Hansen. She came to America from Sweden in the early 1900.

3 cups Flour all purpose unbleached.

1 cup white sugar

1 cup butter or stick margarine or 1/2.

2 whole eggs

A pinch of salt

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon baking soda

Mix all the dry ingredients together with the fat like pie crust. This means cut in. Beat the seperated eggs. Beat whites until soft peaks and yellows until thick and light yellow, then beat together. Add to the dry mixture and fat. You may mix with your hands. roll thin with a rolling pin. Cut with desired cookie cutter. Put on ungreased sheet. Bake 375 degrees. Sprinkle with white or colored sugar.

Peppy Dill Wedges

Via: Diabetes Self - Management Healthy & Hearty Diabetic Cooking and Jane Nelson

4 cups cucumber wedges (about 1 large or 3 quartered, and cut into one inch pieces)
2 cloves garlic (optional)
2 Tablespoons pickling salt
1 cup cider vinegar
1 Tablespoon dill seed
1/2 teaspoon red pepper (crushed)

Combine the cucumber wedges and garlic, and pickling salt, in a glass bowl. Cover with ice cubes. Let stand in a cool place at least 6 hours or overnight. Drain Well.

In a nonreactive saucepan, combine the vinegar, 1 cup water, dill seed, and red pepper. Bring to a boil. Add the drained cucumbers, and return to a boil. Cover and cook 2 minutes.

Spoon into hot sterilized canning jars. Seal well and store in a cool dark dry place.

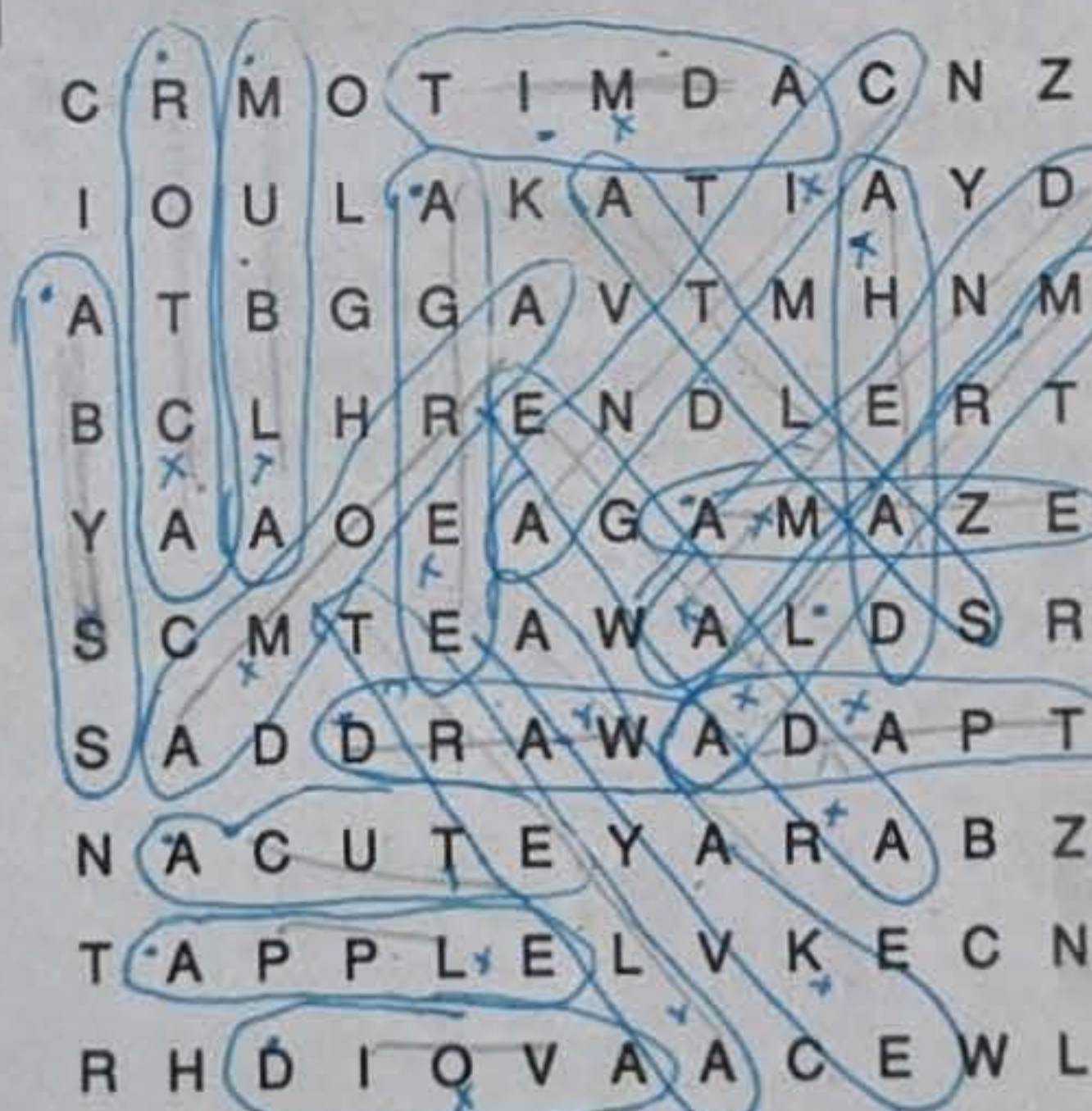
