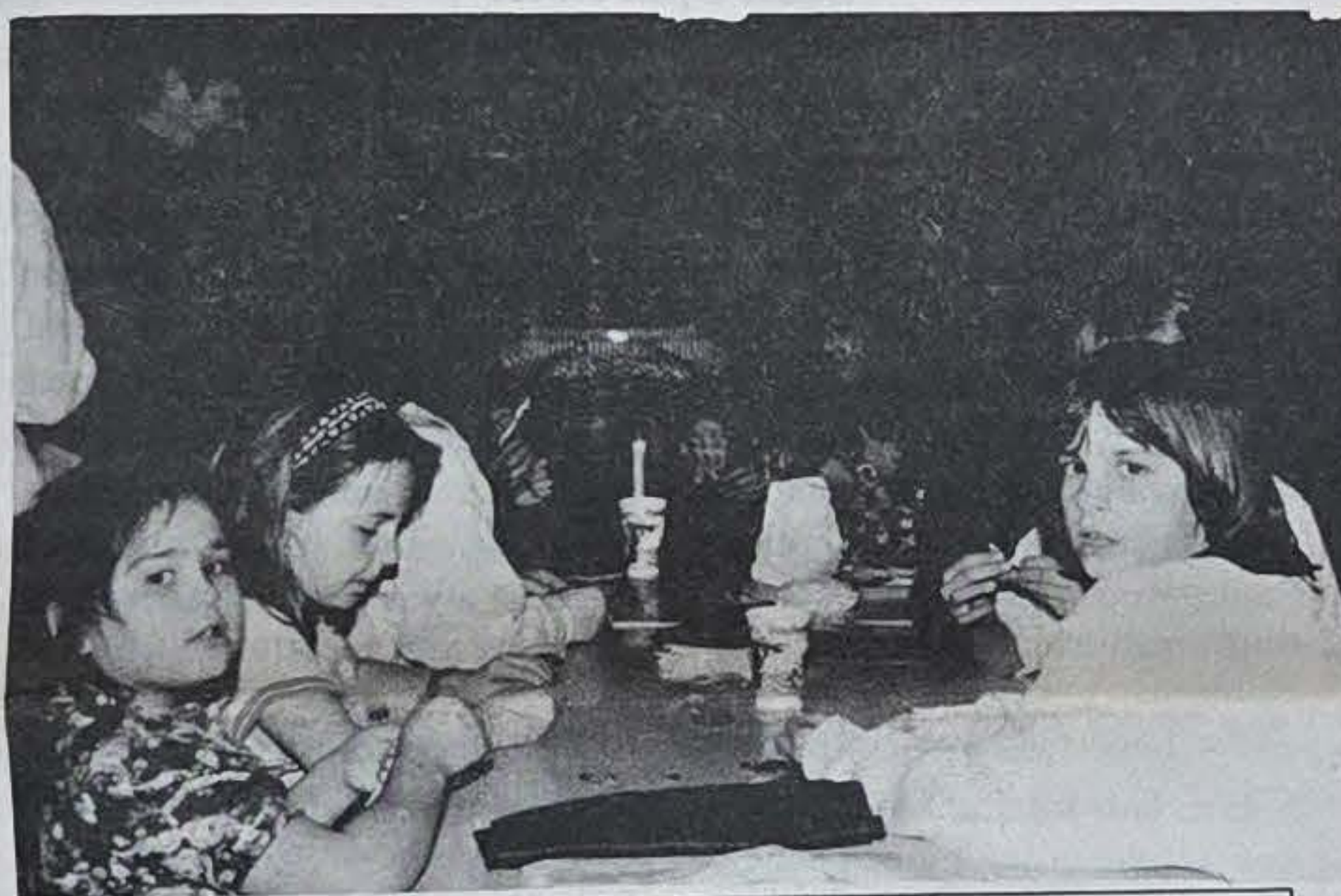
H.Y.C. Is All About Youth

I would like to explore the beginning of the Hampton Youth Committee. I felt since this is the season for caring and giving what a better organization to explore and tell people about.

The Hampton Youth Committee became a chartered organization in 1977. It was formed under the direction of the Illinois Commission for Delinquency Prevention.

In 1977 Mr. Tom Stimpson, who worked for the Illinois Commission for Delinquency Prevention, published an article in the newspaper which asked for volunteers to form youth groups in the Quad City area. At that time Hampton had no organized activities available to their youth other than school activities. Most of the outside activities required parents to transport their children to East Moline or Silvis to participate.

Gladys Ryherd read the article and started the ball rolling for Hampton. Gladys was very concerned about the youth of the community. She approached friends in the community who had teenage children and asked if they thought something like this would work in Hampton. Many parents thought it was a great idea and jumped on the bandwagon with

The Hampton Youth Committee provides activities for all children who live within the Hampton School District boundaries.

Shortly after the HYC was formed a co-ed softball program was set up. Boy did that ever get a frown from the "guys". It didn't take them long to realize that there were some girls in Hampton that could hit a mean ball and they weren't bad at catching the ball either. It wasn't long and everyone was having a great time.

The group started out with

approximately 20 members in the 15-17 age bracket. As the years passed the numbers steadily increased until they were providing softball for all children from seven to eighteen years of age.

Several other organizations were formed within the area including East Moline, Silvis, Rapids City and Carbon Cliff. The softball program grew by leaps and bounds.

It is interesting to note that the first concession stand was ran out of the trunk of Gladys' car. She made many trips to the grocery

store to buy the bargains: pop, hot dogs, buns and the fixings. No frills!! Somehow everyone survived until the real concession stand was built and candy, bubble gum and chips were added.

Tom Stimpson was very instrumental in helping to get the ball season organized and all the shirts ordered. Tom seemed to know who to call and where to go to get the best deals. At that time, the youth committees were receiving financial help from the state. They also received funds for equipment.

It wasn't long before the ambitious parents of Hampton were raising money and becoming self sufficient. It is because of the time and effort of a community willing to work together for a common cause our children that the Hampton Youth Committee is in its 17th year.

Other activities which are organized by the Board of Directors are: Christmas Party for the younger youth, dances for the Jr. High Youth, Easter Egg Hunt, Witchmobile, scholarship fund and adult volleyball.

The committee also provides food baskets for the less fortunate at Thanksgiving and Christmas time. Cont. pg 2

A water rate study has been done and accepted. Ordinances will be drawn up by January 1995 with a increase in the up coming months. The increase will be 28%. The new minimum bill will be 20.00 up from 17.00 for the first 6,000 gallons used per quarter. After the first 6,000 gallons, each 1,000 additional gallons will cost 4.00. It will be a 14.9 increase for users of only 6,000 gallons.

Everyone must remember that the water fund has to support itself it can only use money from its own revenues. So if East Moline ups the fee we must pay them then we must have a increase. Remember that the labor, maintenance, testing of the water and the price we pay to East Moline comes out of one fund. And we are still paying off bonds.

Mr. Ken Strand presented Mayor Protem Kenny Wright and the Village of Hampton with a POW Flag. VFW Post 8295 out of Port Byron gave the flag as a reminder of the guys left behind in the wars.

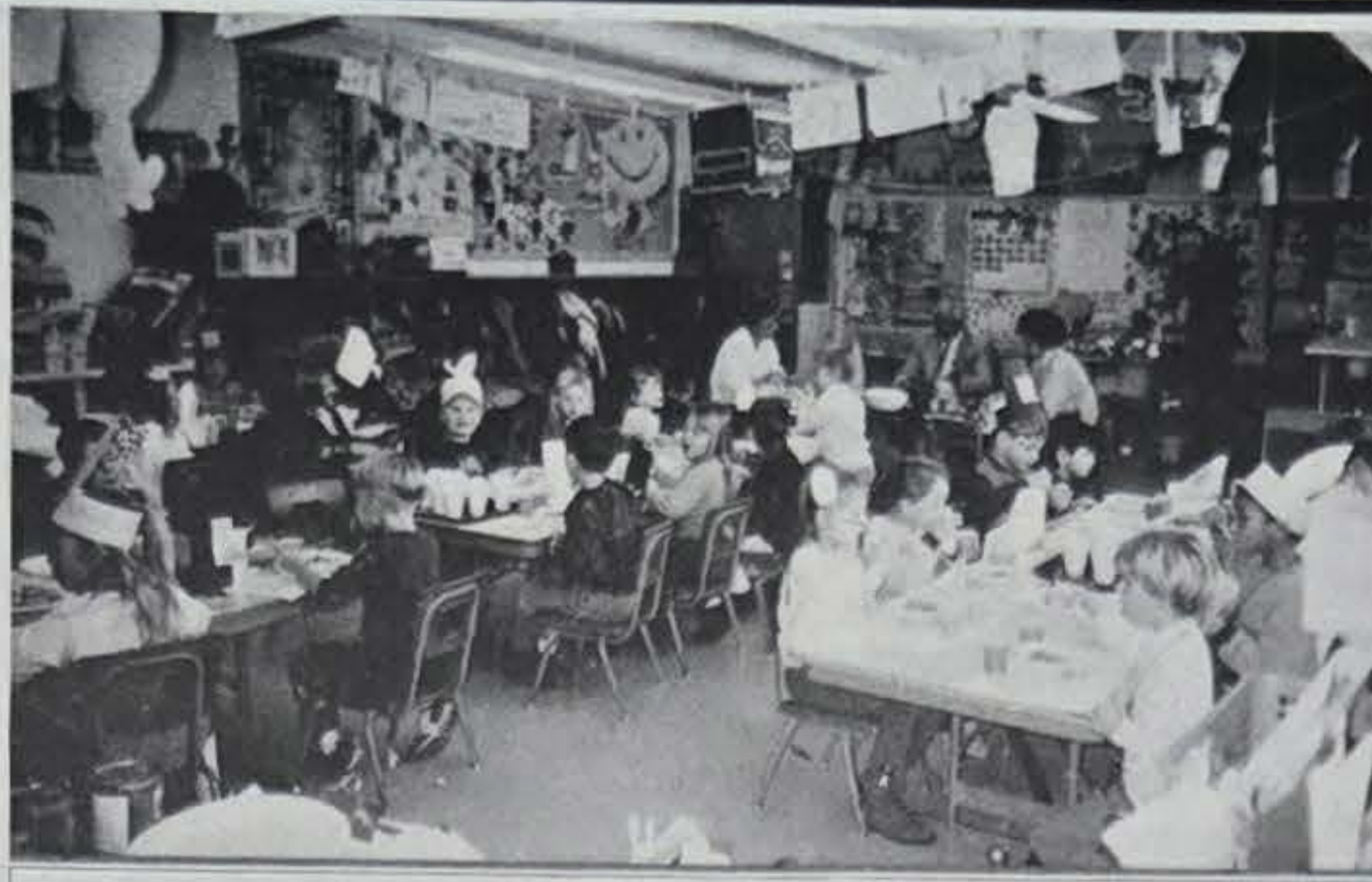

VILLAGE MAINTENANCE NEWS

No parking during snow removal (Ord. 425, 1/8/79)

A) There shall be no parking upon any public way between the hours of 9:00AM and 5:00PM on any day when there has been snow accumulated to a depth of 2 inches or more.

B) This prohibition shall be in effect until the Village maintenance crews have cleared the public way and the snowfalls has ceased for that day.

C) The presence of operating Village snow removal equipment on the public ways of the Village of Hampton shall be conclusive evidence of two inches of snowfall.

D.) It is the policy of the Village of Hampton that snow removal from the public ways of the Village shall not be required where there is less than two inches of snowfall.

E) No person shall clean private drives or sidewalks in such a manner as shall result in the deposit of snow into the public ways due to the snow removal from such private drives or sidewalks.

F) Violations: Vehicles in violation of Section 4.8.2 of the Hampton Village Code will be ticketed by the Hampton Police Department and towed away. (Rev. Ord. 527 1/11/88)

Give Dean and his help some consideration and keep your vehicles off the streets during the snow plowing time.

HAMPTON HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

If you have occasion to look at photographs of Hampton taken in the last century you will see that virtually every house had a picket fence around it. These fences were not put up to be picturesque, but rather to meet a need. The need was to keep out the animals because the streets of old Hampton greatly resembled a barn yard.

In Morris Heagy's reminiscences he describes the scene. In those days, between the end of the Civil War and the dawn of the 20th century, almost everyone in our town owned a

cow (a few had two or three). In the summer these cows were allowed to run at large on the streets. Broad Street (now called 2nd Avenue) had been platted as the widest street in town and was a favorite place for the livestock to roam. Heagy relates how, on a hot day, the cows would go down to a sand bar below Black's wharf, wading out in to the river to get away from the flies.

And flies there were in great abundance. Most of the houses had a barn behind them, facing the alley. It housed the cows, of course, and most people would have a couple of hogs, also. Horses too (after all these were the "horse and buggy days"). These barns and pig pens provided the perfect environment for breeding flies. Not to mention odors. Few houses had screens, and the swarming flies were an ultra-nuisance.

Another animal prominent in this era was the goose. Many people raised geese, especially Mr. Stoddard who lived in the red house at the north end of Broad Street (2nd Ave). She had an especially large flock, led by

an immense gander called "Jumbo" (after P T Barnum's famous elephant). Heagy tells how Jumbo would lead his flock with slow, stately tread, down to the river in the morning for a swim and then back to Broad Street to dine on grass the rest of the day. Jumbo was the bane of existence for the little boys of the town. The whole summer was spent either avoiding Jumbo or finding ways to irritate him. However, Jumbo's size, spirit, and the fact he would tolerate no nonsense earned more than a few boys a pinch on the rear by a beak like a pair of pliers.

We don't see livestock in the street any more (even dogs are secured) and anyone who erects a picket fence does so because they saw it in "Better Homes & Gardens". We can look back at the time when our town was a farm-yard. For my part I'd rather look back at it than had to have lived it. Flies and odors hold little appeal.

Oh, well much has changed in 55 years since I started school at PS 29.

Before I know it, Christmas will be here. The picture is taken for cards but letter is not written. *Thanksgiving plans are still in the works.* A lot presents are ready to be wrapped and a few to be purchased after I take inventory of what I have on hand. Also there are a couple I don't have a clue as to what to buy, so I have to wait for a inspiration or winning the lottery.

Our Christmas menu differs for the traditional, I usually have food that I can make ahead of time and enlarge quantity so it will last for a couple of meals in some form or other. Then of course I bake several kinds of cookies, including the sugar

cookies that I have already given you the recipe. I usually go on a cookie walk or two and buy a few varieties to augment the old tried and true recipes. I noticed in several of the magazines, they have had on basic recipe with 5 or 6 variations. Since my husband and I are both diabetic I need to look up some new no-sugar recipes.

One non sweet recipe for an hors d'oeuvre we all like is garlic roll. Of course, it is not low in fat. this originally was my sister, Bev Coders recipe. I have made a change so I guess it is mine now. I use fresh garlic instead of powdered garlic. It is really quite simple and can be made ahead of time.

Garlic Roll

Use equal parts of butter and cream cheese. I use lite cream cheese. 1/2 lb butter to 8 oz. of cream cheese makes enough for a large gathering. Soften and then beat butter and cream cheese together. Soften and then beat butter and cream cheese together. Add two cloves of mince fresh garlic. Spread a 12 inch square of plastic with paprika and 1/4 cup chopped walnuts. Spoon the butter and cream cheese mixture down the middle of the wrap. Roll back and forth on the wrap until covered with the nuts and paprika. Wrap securely and refrigerate. Serve with an assortment of crackers at room temperature.

Two weeks ago we were in Chicago and my daughter Mindy gave me a copy of a magazine "Martha Stewart Living". I had not seen the magazine but I have heard of Martha Stewart. I found several rather clever ideas. One

was wreaths made from maple leaves. Since we have and abundance of yellow maple leaves I decided to try the wreath.

I clipped about seven or eight small branches from the tree. Then I pounded the stems with a hammer so they would absorb the liquid. I put these in 3 lb. coffee cans filled with 1/2 gallon water and 6 oz. glycerin (3/4 cup). You can get the glycerin at a drugstore. After 3 to 5 days the leaves will feel supple. Take them from the branches and wire with florist wire into nice size bunches. Then wire to a wreath form. I found the wire forms at Ben Franklin. I had enough leaves for about three wreaths. Take a look. I have 2 on my house. I think they turned out great.

There are several other ideas in the magazine I plan to try. One is to take inexpensive baskets and cover the inside with cloth. Then you can also dry herbs in kosher salt. There are some great ideas for carving pumpkins and gourds. Another great idea is making potpourri bags as moth proofing. This was all in one article called "Good Things".

Have a Great Christmas and will be with you again in 1995. Can you believe that. Five years until 2000. Hope I'm still here and able to type.
