The one good thing about school going back is Mike and I will be back to coaching volleyball. Which is our favorite pass time. Camp will be starting up on August 14th and then the work begins.

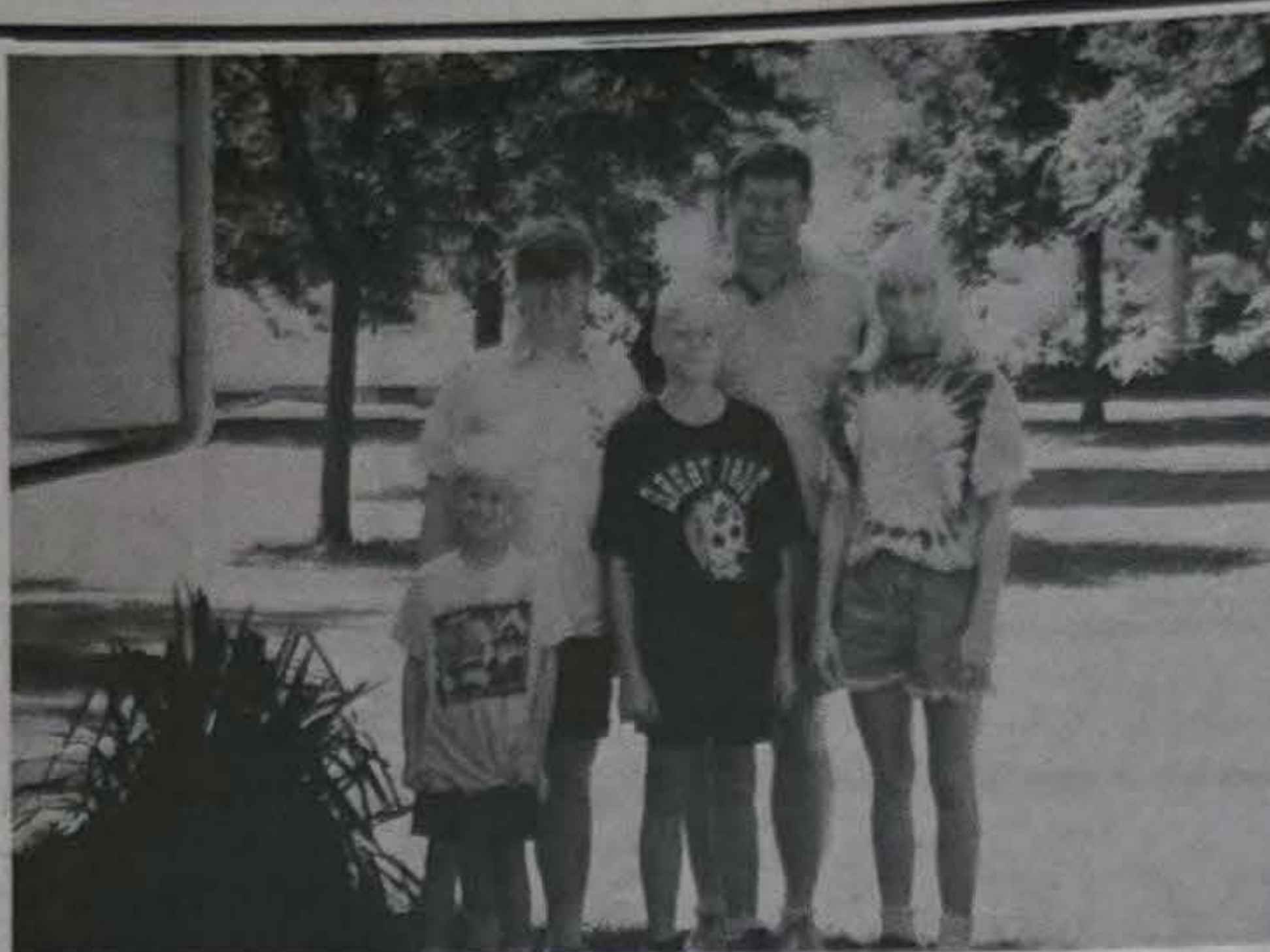

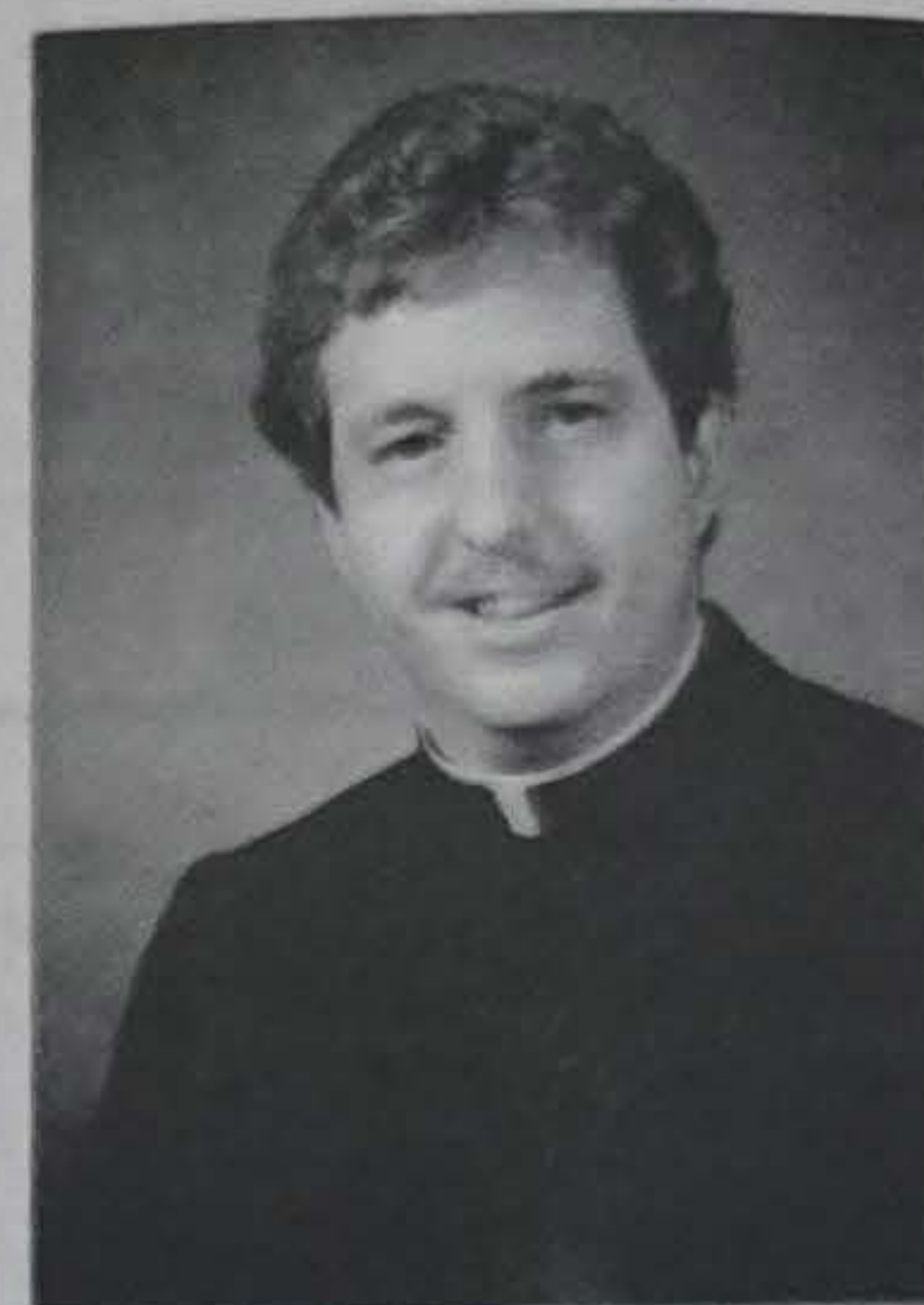

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VILLAGE BOARD NEWS

July 10, 1995

Approval of the bonds for streets, water and sewer were approved as well as the ordinance were adopted for the streets, water and sewer.

Ruhl and Ruhl has contacted the city and asked what is being done to get water up to the new site of Lighthouse Landing.

The hold up is the Rock Island County board. They can not make up their mind if they want the water lines to run on their property. The project has offered to pay for the whole thing and the forest preserve can then hook up to city water. Now the project may either go to a well system or the city will try to find an alternate route to put in the lines. Progress with the Rock Island County board is a backward thing.

Marina project, this seems to be a sore spot in our Mayors side. He is not happy with the progress. He would like to see things going quicker and the aren't. There have been changes and changes and more changes and this can make a project look like a stall tactic. I am not sure which party has the breaks on, but I would not like to be living next to a pile of dirt for another 2 to 3 years before the project is completed.

Maybe Scott is just looking out for our best interests, but at the board meetings there doesn't need to be so much foolish talk about the project. If Mr. Mosely is in violation then take care of it, just don't drag the meetings on with a vengeance.

Fire Chief Craig Haigh said that the Hampton Fire District is going to be re-audited and with any luck and hard work on the part of our Fire Department we may see a better rating and a decrease in our Home owners insurance. Thanks Craig and the whole fire department. So during the months of Sept and Oct. the fire department will be flushing hydrants and inspecting them.

July 24, 1995 Village Board meeting.

Al Kipp addressed the board on the parking outside the school. He would like to see the parking changed to parallel from the present vertical. He states that it is hard to keep the sidewalks cleaned when it snows, the broken glass around the playground area. Al did not come on behalf of the school he came because he is concerned about the street. It is a crowded street to narrow for people to come and go from. Backing out is a problem when there are games or activities at school.

The Board said that they would get back to Al on what they will propose to do about the parking when street committee chair Sandy Carmack has the time to look into it.

The water line for Lighthouse Town houses project will go in next to the highway as opposed to the County park as first planned. The County did not respond to the board about whether or not they would allow the line to go through the park. If they would have allowed this they could have hooked up to the

water line. Now that the line is moved to the road they will have to ask the city for permission to hook up to the line.

The water line will go to the Town Houses and the Corp. of Eng. would like it to be ran up to the Corps new campsites.

Seems that you can't please everyone at the board meetings. More arguments come up over the new housing development than really should. It is funny if you are a spectator at the meetings, the existing residents on top of the hill where the Ruhl and Ruhl exclusive homes are going to be build are arguing over the grade of their drive ways and the engineer and the board are not acting all that professional with their remarks. Some of these problems should be cleared up in committee and not run over for the public to witness.

E.M.P.I.R.E PARK NEWS

Volunteers needed to Build E.M.P.I.R.E. Having met its fund raising goal of \$80,000, the East Moline Park & Recreation Board is seeking volunteers of all ages, skilled and unskilled, to construct the 14,000 square foot EMPIRE Playground in

Mississippi Park form September 6th thro 10th.

According to Ben Zmuda, Chairman, East Moline Park & Recreation Board, "Representatives of Robert S. Leathers & Associates, Ithaca, New York, will be here to direct the building of the playground. WE need 300 to 400 volunteers each day to complete the facility which will be one of the largest on the Mississippi River.

"It is an old fashioned "Barn Raising" with work and fun for everyone. Help is needed from families, organizations of every kind, retirees and other individuals. There will be free food and child care on site. Without a doubt, with something for everyone to do, it is one of the biggest do-it-yourself projects ever undertaken locally."

An organizational event will be held on August 1st. Committee assignments and specific guidelines will be outlined for the construction phases of the play area.

HAMPTON HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

This month's Historical Society column should be framed in black. The Hampton Community and particularly the Historical Society has lost one of its most significant members, Florence Frazier McKay Arterberry.

Florence was the first Society president back in 1974 when it was formed. She was highly instrumental in the formation and organization of the Society and the whole thing got off the ground in no small measure because of her efforts.

Perhaps her greatest contribution came when Les Stone offered to give us the Black Store building in 1976. He has used it for apple storage for a number of years and had insulated and refrigerated rooms on the ground floor. The ravages of time hung heavily over the place. The southeast corner hung in air where the foundation was gone, the northwest corner had washed out in the flood of '65' and a

huge crack showed where the building was literally breaking in half. A fledgling group of Society members, with no money and no knowledge were faced with the decision to accept or reject Les Stone's gift. After much discussion and with great trepidations it was decided to accept, primarily because of the buildings significance to the history of our town.

So, we embarked on the task which looked impossible. Florence's son Tom McKay didn't live here but he was still interested and had a degree in historic preservation. He got us on the National Register of Historic Places (easy enough, because of the records of Francis Black from the beginning, preserved by the Putnam Museum). This opened up possibilities for government grants, meaning Uncle Sam would give us \$15,000 if we could match it. We were able to do it and government gave us another \$15,000 grant, which had to match. During this time

Florence McKay (no treasure) juggled the funds around to keep us ahead of the grant money and also the people who were restoring the exterior. Ron Nelson of Bishop Hill provided great service in this regard (for a reasonable price, as well).

Looking back, we now wonder how we did it, but we did, with Florence McKay contributing a giant share.

After several years of bad health

Florence was back this year, her old self full of enthusiasm and goading we lazy ones to action. Then this current disease struck and in a short time she was gone. It seems unbelievable that she is no longer here but some of her last thoughts concerned how our present restoration was going and anybody who sees the structure on 1st Ave and 6th St. is seeing the legacy of Florence Frazier McKay Arterberry.

DAVE VANDEVENTER FUND RAISER

Dave was diagnosed with multiple myeloma in the spring of 1994. He received aggressive chemotherapy treatment under the care of Dr. Lawrence Allen, Moline, after previously being cared for by Dr. James Lindley, Silvis.

It was determined that he wasn't getting better and before his disease progressed he should have a bone marrow transplant. He was fortunate to find a perfect donor match from his brother Larry of Muncie, IN. He received the transplant June 2, 1995 at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, Omaha.

The transplant will cost somewhere between \$150,000 - \$250,000. Dave's estimated out of pocket expenses could be as high as \$35,000, not including the

loss of income for 6 months.

Many of you may remember Dave VanDeventer from High School. Dave graduated from U.T.H.S. in 1973. Dave's wife, Jenny, is a Dental Hygienist in the Quad Cities. She has worked part-time in different dentist's offices including Doctors Eggar and Smalley. They have three children ages 7, 4, and 18 months. Dave grew up in Babcock Addition, East Moline and comes from a large family.

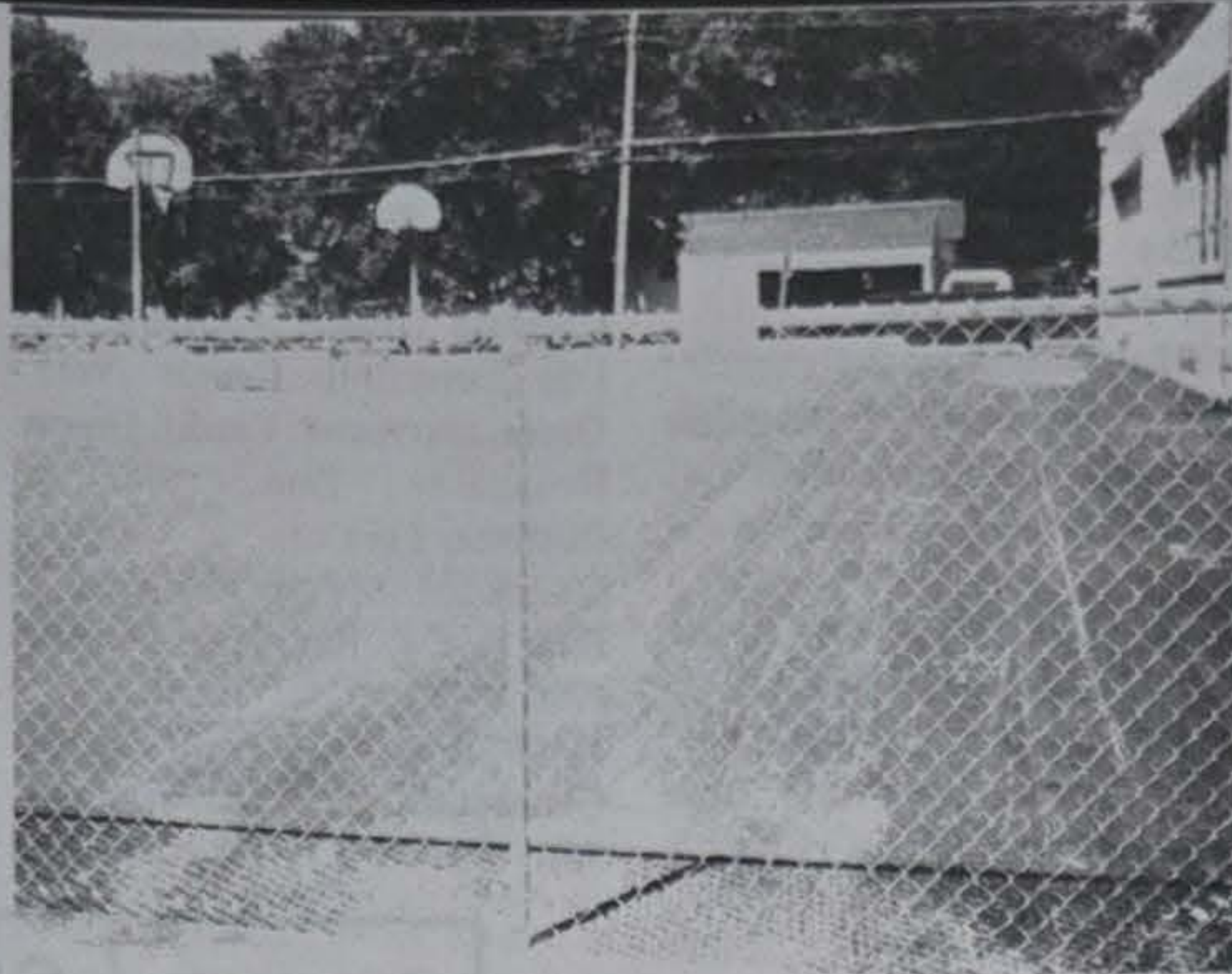

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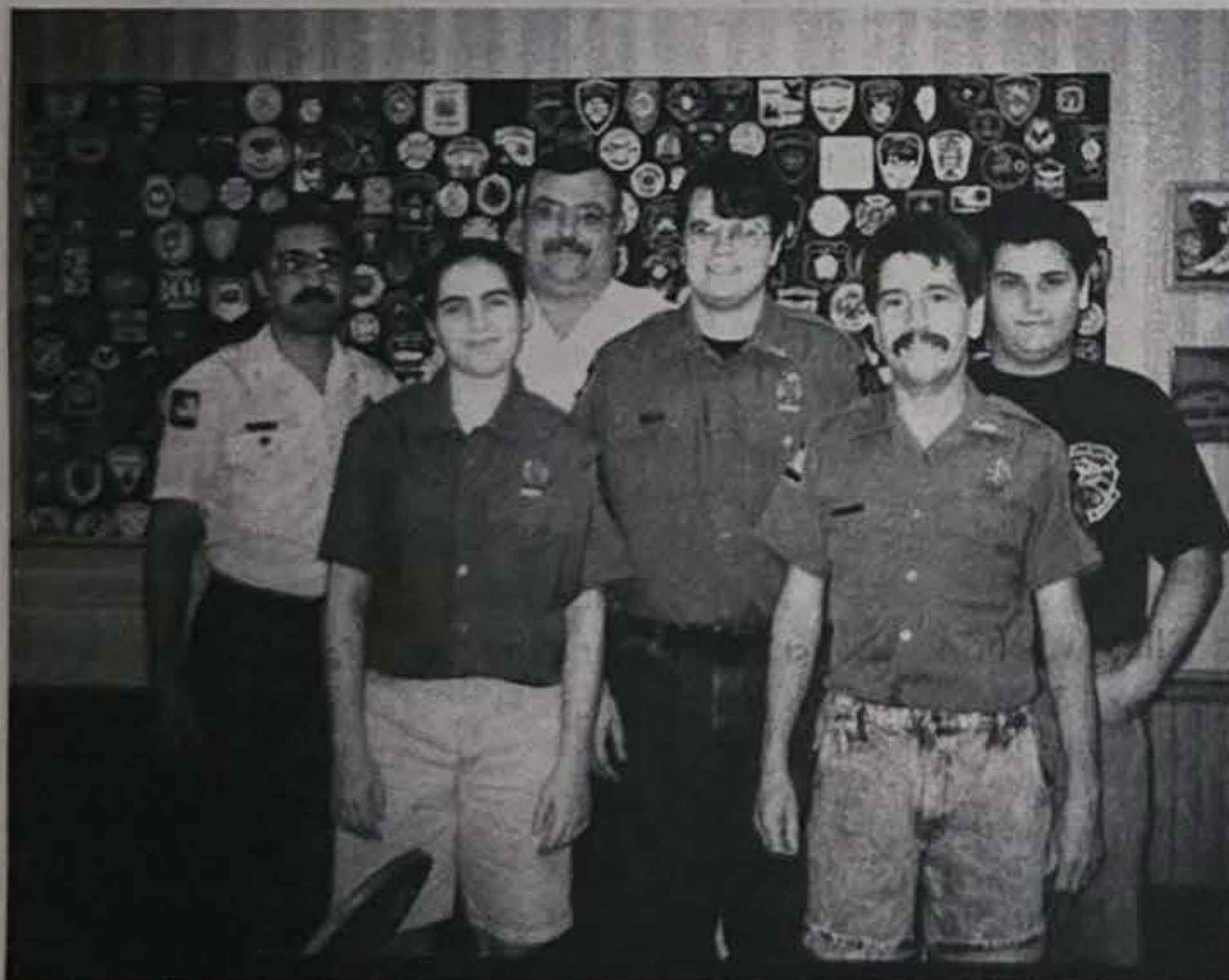

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JAM'N WITH JANE

It is hard to think about food or anything with all this hot weather. Of course, my favorite vegetable is in season, green beans. I don't like anything fancy, just plain old boiled 20 minutes, green beans. Also we had our first sugar and cream sweet corn, from farmer's market. Since I gained 5 lbs. in England I've had a terrible time getting it off. So I've found a neat trick for beans and corn. I Can't Believe It's Not Butter is making a spray margarine that is no calories and just a whisper of a spray is enough to give that buttery taste.

Another time savor I found are ready made crepes. I got them at Cub food. They are made by Frieda's Inc. P.O. Box 58488, Los Angeles, CA USA. They are paper thin. They remind me of the delicious one I had at Porta Bella Market in London. The put sugar and lemon juice on theirs. Here I put a little sugar free ice

cream and fresh raspberries or strawberries. Roll them up and then top with a little light Cool whip and a few more berries. There are four recipes on the back, I plan to try. They are as follows: Asparagus Souffle Crepes, Individual Quiches in Crepes, Banana Foster Crepe and Fruit'n Cheese Blintzes. You will find 10 in the package for \$2.99. They are easy to make but in this hot weather I think \$2.99 for 10 is a steal.

At Cub they also have a little revolving unit with little folded information sheets with nutritional information and recipes for all kinds of fresh fruits and vegetables. I picked up one on green beans. 3/4 cup green beans is only 14 calories. I think this recipe in the folder sounds great. Although I tried it today and it needs a clove of garlic, a tablespoon of garlic flavored olive oil or 2 tablespoons of fat free Italian dressing to perk it up a little.

Easy Green Bean Salad

1 lb. fresh green beans, 1/2 cup red, yellow, or green peppers, 1/2 cup green onions sliced with tops, 1/4 cup unsweetened apple juice, 2 tablespoons cider vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/8 teaspoon oregano or snips of fresh. A little basil would add a lot with the other suggestions above. Fill a large pan with 1 inch of water, bring to a boil and add green beans with all other ingredients. Be sure to mix the dressing ingredients together before you mix with the vegetables. Cover and chill in the refrigerator over night. Makes about 6 servings.

From JoAnna Lund's monthly newsletter of Healthy Exchanges, I found the basis for the following recipe.

Fresh Veggie Salad

1 1/2 cup chopped cauliflower, 1 1/2 cup chopped broccoli, 1/2 cup chopped cucumber, 3/4 cup chopped fresh mushrooms, 1/4 cup chopped red onion, 1/4 cup chopped green pepper, 1/4 cup

shredded carrot, 1 cup chopped or sliced thin cabbage, 1/2 cup fat free mayonnaise, 1/4 cup fat free dill chip dip, 2 tablespoon, fat free Kraft French dressing, 2 teaspoon white vinegar, 1 teaspoon Equal, 1/4 teaspoon black pepper. In large bowl combine all the cut and chopped veggies. In a small bowl combine mayonnaise and the rest of the ingredients. Mix well. Add to vegetable mixture. Toss gently to combine. Cover and refrigerate at least 1 hour. Mix gently again just before serving. Serves 6, 3/4 cup servings.

Next month get ready for the Hampton Historical Society Fall Festival, so we should have some apple recipes. If anyone has extra apples to give away or sell cheap let me know. I've just heard my friend in Geneseo has no apples on his tree. I will be desperate for 150 apples for dumplings.

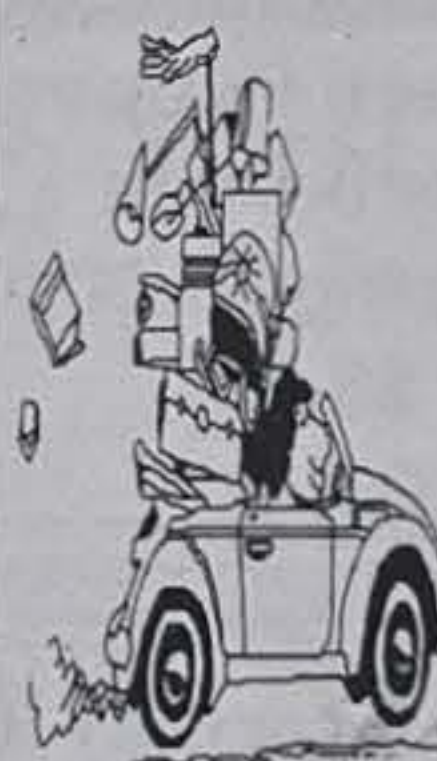
The Mushroom Story
