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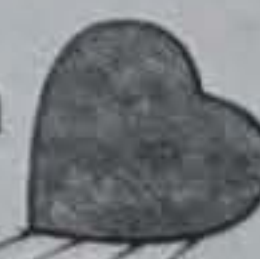
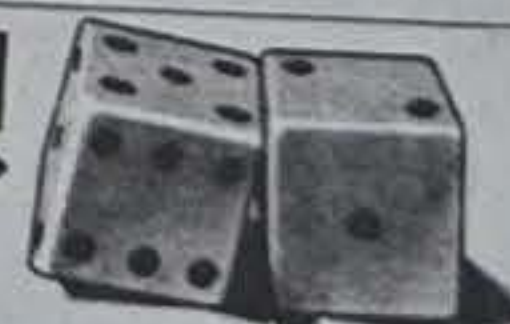

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VILLAGE BOARD MEETINGS

Village Board meeting August 28, 1995

Jim Bittner with Ruhl and Ruhl on Light House Landing addressed the board with the plans for the development.

The engineer for the city showed the plans for extending water to this project as well as Fishermen's Corner. There was discussion on the railroad crossing at the new site. The railroad would like to see the crossing made public as apposed to a private one. The city and their attorney Graham Lee will be looking into this before a decision is made.

Marina the permits are all in all the city is waiting for is a plan and answers as to what he is doing with the project.

There were concerned citizens at the meeting with questions on the parking the road access. President Scott Newberg said that they will be able to see the final plans when they are submitted to the board.

Dike at the south end is still waiting for one last permit then the work will start.

Hampton Woods has started the process of sewer lines and water lines going up the hill. If everything goes according to schedule there will be pavement in approximately 3 weeks.

The council will be looking into updating the Liquor Control Ordinance in committee meeting.

Burn Ordinance needs to be brought to everyone's attention again. You can not burn anything that does not grow on your property. There could be fines assessed if a person is caught burning other things. If you have a problem with someone burning contact your police or fire department.

September 23, in East Moline

and Hampton parks there will be a Hemp Fest. The board has approved the renting of the pavilion for this as long as the group hires 8 police men, at 10.00 an hour per man, and they hire the fire department for emergency rescue, at 10.00 per hour and 100.00 for the vehicle. The

parking situation was addressed and Ken Wright had a viable solution to this. Let the cars be parked in the park and keep them out of the village proper and off 84 as much as possible. The fest is expecting about 700 people.

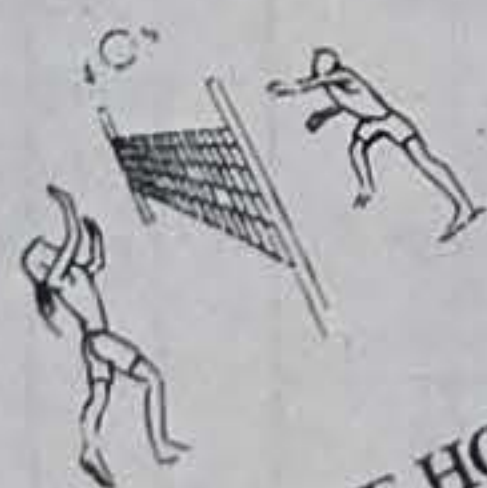
renew your membership before the price goes up. We need advance notice if you plan to attend so as to inform the ladies how much food to prepare. Call 755-0362 and reserve a place.

YARD AND GARDEN TIPS

Finally summer is almost gone and hopefully with it, the weather! For some of us, fall can't come too soon this year. I keep having thoughts of winter and snow memories of huddling in front of the fireplace to keep warm. My how time flies!

However, now is the time to think of spring and start planning for spring color. Fall bulbs will be available soon. It seems like a big chore now but it is always worth the extra effort. Remember to add a little fertilizer to the bottom of the hole prior to planting. Bulb Booster (9-9-6) works great. I believe it gives them an added boost come blooming time.

Fall is also a good time to consider planting any trees you may have in mind. They usually start their dormant period in the fall so planting shock is less of a problem. Be sure to water them late in November.

You may want to take a look at your turf these days, since the white grub worm usually makes its appearance from mid-August

through October. You will notice dead areas of turf that pull up like carpet. If you catch the infestation in time you will see the small "C" shaped larvae when you pull the grass up, 8 - 10 worms per square foot is considered an infestation. An application of insecticide applied according to the directions will usually take care of the worms. You may have to reseed some of the areas if damage has occurred.

Fall is also a great time to core aerate your lawn. Core aeration is best performed by using a gas powered core aerator. The machine pulls up plugs of turf and drops them on the tip of the ground. Be sure not to roll over any shallow buried lines like cable, t.v., gas grill lines, etc... and don't rake up the left over "plugs". The dirt they bring up has microorganisms in it which feed on thatch and helps to reduce the amount of thatch in your yard. Core aeration is great for reducing thatch, loosening up compacted ground, opening the turf for over seeding and fertilizing.

Fall is also the best time to kill those broadleaf weeds in your

yard. In the fall the weeds translocate carbohydrates down to their roots, so the weed killer is absorbed quicker and give a better kill on those problem weeds. Weed and Feed in the fall is a good choice as long as the temperature is not too high, or you can spray them with a straight weed killer from your garden hose or spray bottle. Always read the label before applying.

If you are like me and hate to mow, but want a near perfect yard, I suggest 2 things for this fall. Kill your weeds now and apply a winterizer fertilizer late in fall. The winterizer will enhance root growth for the following year. Skip the early fertilizer application in March and around the 15th of April apply a Crabgrass Preventative + Fertilizer and that should hold you till fall again. Remember to mow your grass high in the spring and summer and you can drop the height down in the fall when the grass is going dormant.

Fall is also the most important time to add some extra insurance to your plants. Besides using

the winterizer on your lawn, be sure to check your plant beds to make sure everything is mulched in especially the perennials. Also don't forget to water all your plants in late November. The need water around the roots which will help get them through the cold winter months.

The list seems endless, but fall is still *my favorite* time of the year. If nothing else the temperature has to be better!

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JAM'N WITH JANE

It's September already. The summer has oozed by in a shimmer of hot air, and luckily I don't have to go to school. This will be the third year of retirement. When you read this I will have finished the booklet for my HS graduating class. We are having our 45th reunion form UT, Sept. 2 at the Holiday Inn in Moline. Then I will need to get busy on The Great Fall Apple Festival.

I have 110 apples in the freezer and I need to wrap dough around these for dumplings. My friend Roger Widermuth from Geneseo gave me a tree full of apples and also helped pick them. Rock, my husband, and Jan Corsaro helped me peel them. We also have 5 gallon bags of sliced apples for pies. The peelings and cores produced 8 pints of apple sauce and 14 jars of apple butter. Now I need about 50 more apples, any more volunteers?

If my memory is correct you have my recipe for dumplings, apple cake and applesauce pie. Maybe you would like Caroline

Larrison's recipe for Swedish Apple Pie. She gave it to me when we had rave reviews at the Apple Festival and it is printed in our Apple Cookbook.

Swedish Apple Pie

Grease pie plate and fill 2/3 full with sliced apples.

1 teas. sugar, 1 teas. cinnamon, 1 cup flour, 1 cup sugar, 3/4 cup margarine melted, 1 egg beaten, 1/2 cup chopped nuts.

Mix all but apples together and pour over the apples in the pie plate. Sprinkle the sugar and cinnamon on the top. Bake 350 degrees, 45 minute or until apples are done.

Several interesting apple recipes I found in a booklet "Pioneer Cookbook", favorite camping and kitchen recipes from early American, edited by Ferne Shelton; Hutcrafft, High Point N.C. 1973. I think I got this book at Stone's Apple Barn.

Fresh Apple Cake

2 1/2 cups flour, 1 teas. soda, 1 teas. cinnamon and allspice, 2 cups sugar, 1 cup butter, 1/2 cup water, 4 eggs, 3 med. apples chopped, 1 cup nuts chopped, 1 teas. vanilla. Sift together flour,

spices and soda. Cream butter and sugar well. Add eggs, one at a time, and blend. Then add dry ingredients and water. Lastly, add chopped apples, nuts, and vanilla. Pour into greased tube pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hours (or bake in layer pans at 400 degrees for about 30 minutes) Serve plain, or iced with Butterscotch Frosting.

They don't give a recipe for the frosting. To make Butterscotch Frosting I take 1/4 cup brown sugar and 1/4 cup margarine. Mix and cook until boiling for 1 minute. Then add about 2 1/2 cups powdered sugar. Beat and then frost cake. If it is not thick enough add powdered sugar until it is thick enough.

Apple Nut Cookies

Mix together 1 stick butter, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup applesauce 1 egg, 1 tsp. soda, 1 tsp. salt. Add 2 cups flour, 1 tsp. each ground cloves, cinnamon, allspice, 1 cup nuts (walnuts or pecans) Blend well. Drop by teaspoonfuls on well greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 for 15 to 20 minutes.

Apple Butter (30 minutes)

8 cups applesauce, 5 cups sugar,

1/2 tsp. each clove, allspice, 1/2 cup cider or (vinegar), 1 tsp. cinnamon.

Mix together in large pot. Heat slow and stir often. (I put mine in a disposable aluminum pan in the oven) Cook about 1/2 hour or until thick. Pack into hot sterilized jars and seal. Process in a hot water bath for 10 minutes.

(Other butters can be made form pears, peaches, tomatoes, plums grapes, and pumpkin. Fruit was chopped, cooked and "flavored to taste".

Next month will be a surprise for both of us. Someone asked me a question the other day and I answered and they said I should put it in my column. At the moment I don't remember what it was. I will write about that or something else pertaining to fall. If you are the person, please call and jog my memory.

I do appreciate the many compliments I get from all you loyal readers. Don't forget Jam'n with Jane will serving her apple dumplings and many other goodies at the Fall Apple Festival Sept. 16, at the Brettun and Black Mercantile and Museum.

It is that time of year again when the children return to school, the weather changes and the fall cycle of activities start. I hope you have had a relaxing and enjoyable summer. My summer was taken up with our family's move to Hampton. I have been on the job as your new school superintendent/principal since July. We moved into a house on 5th St. A. Ammon (12) and Brianna (10) started Volleyball camp. Ethan (7) is helping Mom (Lisa) get the house ready before school starts. I am ready to make this one of the best school years ever for the students of Hampton Elementary School.

The School Board has been working hard to provide every student the opportunity to acquire the knowledge, attitude, and skills necessary to be a successful high school student, a responsible citizen, and a life long learner. Besides hiring a new superintendent, the Board has been reviewing recommendations for action from the Planning Committee Survey conducted recently. The final report accepted by the board had five strategic goals

with 44 accompanying actions for the Board's further consideration. The School Board Building Committee has taken several direct actions to implement the recommendations of the Planning Committee. Examples are: enlarged paved playing area, new fence, new basketball goal, new blinds for classrooms, handicap parking place with relocation of bike racks, new tile in the front hall, and new paint in the kitchen area. In addition,

Thanks to the Booster Club, the Youth Committee and the School Board new Volleyball stand holders were installed in the gym.

Bruce Stout, the Rock Island Arsenal and the Regional Superintendent of Schools, Joe Vermiere teamed up to bring 14 computers to our school. These will help start our computer lab. Senator Denny Jacobs and the River Bend Library System will get our school library on-line with a computer connection soon.

The School Office will get computers for administrative work. A computer is part of the new Gifted Education delivery model that will be implemented this fall.

Our new band director, Merit Donis, will be holding a parent meeting in mid August to talk about her plans for the band program.

We hope you will stop by the school or stay in contact with school activities through Classroom Connections.

If you would like to donate any computer equipment, especially, printers to the school, it is a tax deduction, and you can call the school for more information.

We need your support and comments to maintain the reputation of providing the best possible education in the area for all our students.

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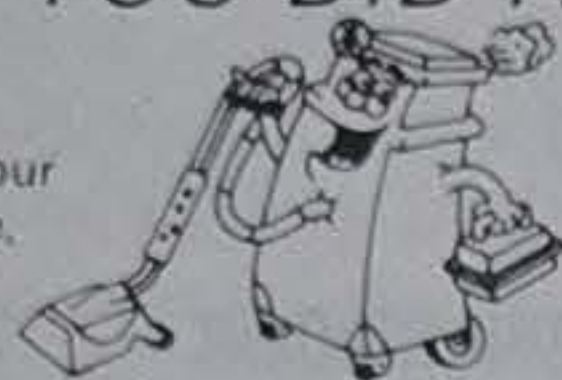
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
