BUILD IT AND THEY WILL COME

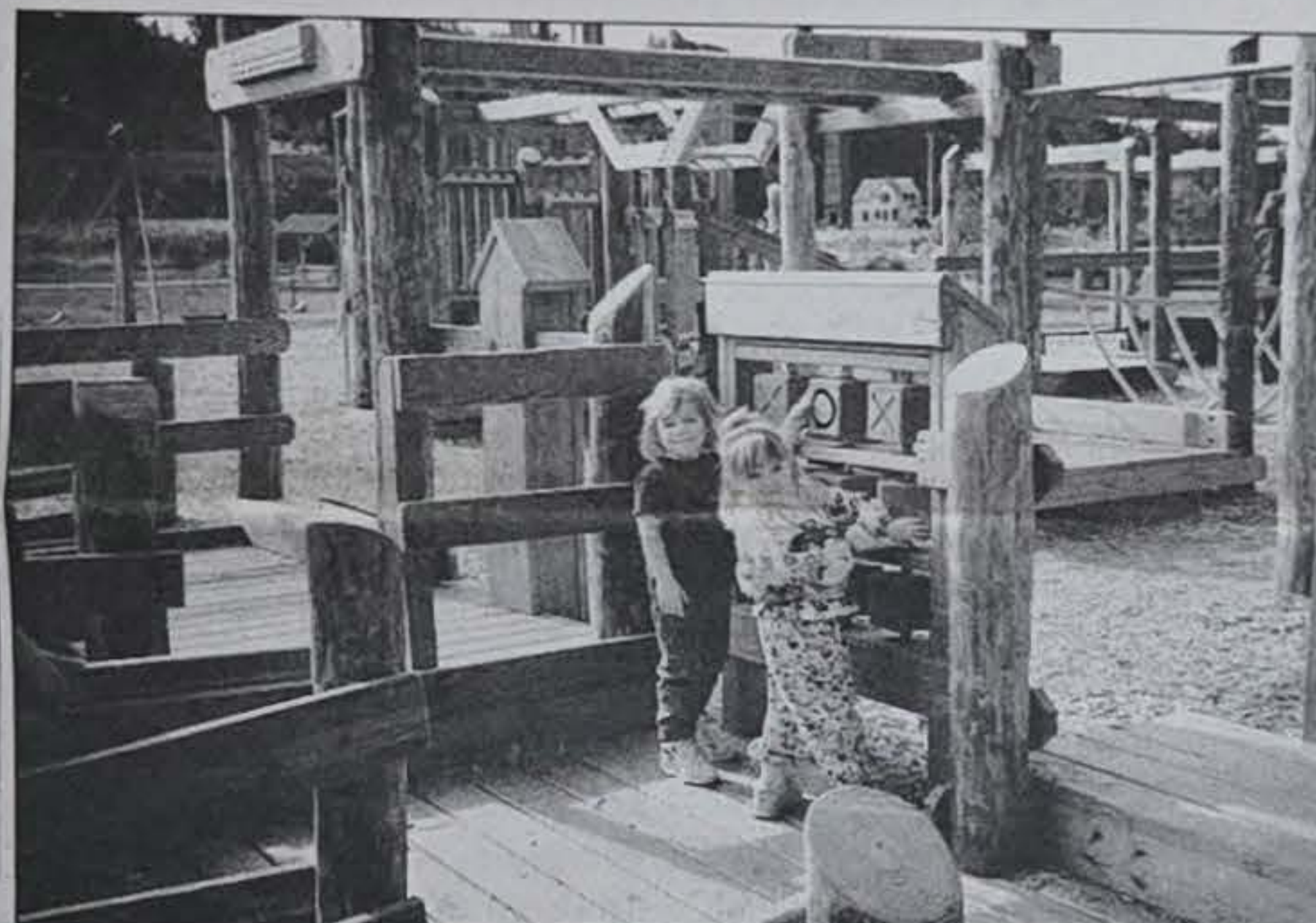
I had the privilege of helping and being a part of the E.M.P.I.R.E. Playground. It was the greatest community project that I have ever been involved in and actually the only one that I have been witness to.

It was amazing how the people came from all walks of life to help put together a dream.

As I arrived on Wednesday, September 6th at 6:00 AM, the supervisors and foreman were already there. Each one had a specific job and they were getting things into working area so when the crews of volunteers arrived they would have everything ready. The volunteers came every day early.

I would like to give you a few insides as to what went on behind the scenes of the building. Many other forces were there, some that really weren't noticed unless you came everyday and actually participated.

My job was to help get the food ready. You only saw us when the meals and snacks were needed. Some of the food crew did also run errands, but mainly we prepared and picked up food.

This was exciting, each of us worried that there would not be enough food to feed the troops, but each meal went off with out to many hitches.

The crews would stop at noon, and 5:00 PM for meals, donuts, sweet breads, juice and coffee, were served every morning for breakfast. We made sure that there was food on the snack area as well as water, juice, and coffee. There were a few miserable days that we kept hot water available for hot chocolate. None of this detoured anyone from helping to build.

Each day there was an estimation of about 300 to 400 hundred people building and we served almost that many for the meals. Each meal during the week was about 100 - 125 and on the weekend the meals were 125- 175. Yes, this was a task in itself.

On the building scene they had many people helping, they were skilled people as well as unskilled. Some of the workers I recognized as retired carpenters who took a great interest in the project and youth and wanted to see them have something they could enjoy as well as grow with.

The crews worked from different work stations and each day something new was happening. They spent time working on cutting all the fencing needed for the Tot lot, boards were cut for the mazes and then the next day they were assembled. The engineer and his assistant were there everyday keeping everything running smoothly.

After the 3rd day, you could look out there and see the makings of a park, no longer was there just posts, gravel, some pieces of equipment up. The pieces of mazes fell into place, the swing set and fencing went up the mulch was starting to be hauled in. (This came by the semi trailer load)

I want you to know that not only did adults help build this so did the kids, they had tasks of hauling the gravel, mulch, sanding (which was a lot since everything needed to be sanded) they sealed the wood with a protector, helped pick up the scrapes of wood, papers and ran errands for the other workers. So you can see they were interested in the park and wanted to be a part of the building. Some of the skilled laborers showed and helped the kids learn how to use some of the drills and saws. This made them feel very important also.

The fourth day the park began to take shape with the towers going into place and slides, bridges, fencing, tires were being cut for swings, the balisters were put into place with the names of people who donated money for them.

They workers worked each night until 9:00 PM and it was amazing to see how many stayed all day. This was total dedication.

By this time the media had really spread the word of the park and sightseers were starting to make a steady stream through the parking lot.

The 5th day was a little touch and go, the bosses were not sure we would finish on time. There was so much to do. The crew ate at 5:00 and Tom Peterson asked that all the workers stay and help finish up. Since this was Sunday night we weren't sure how many would stay it was amazing almost everyone stayed. I heard several say I've been here this long a few more hours can't hurt any. Well we finished the major things and everyone was able to walk through the park at 8:30 PM. The kids were so excited about the

new park and they really explored everything.

Now a little bit of info about what the park has to offer, because it is not the usual park, and each volunteer can tell you more about the park since they helped put it together.

The park is not just slides and swings, it has several mazes to climb through, a telephone system that really works (Hilary, Mike and I found it and tried it out) you do need to look for it, which makes that part of an adventure in itself. Balance Beams, Tic Tac Toe game, music pipes for the musically inclined person, a zip line that the older kids like, moving bridges, stairs that move a firemen pole, balance beam, sand boxes in the shape of boats, a car, rings. It offers a Tot Lot for the toddlers and everything is geared smaller for the little ones to be able to do things for themselves, and Mom and Dad

can sit right there and watch them because the entire Tot Lot is fenced in.

Since the park has been finished you find children there, they range from infants to grandma and grandpa, because we are all kids at heart.

Thank You to each and everyone who helped, not only were the workers on the playground essential, but everyone who donated food, drink or helped to serve the meals each person had a job and each one was essential in the making of a park that they can be proud of.

VILLAGE BOARD NEWS

September 11, 1995

The Hampton Town Board meeting was a packed house.

Over 40 people were in attendance to hear and voice their concerns over to heated topics. Hemp fest, and the Marina.

The first topic to be discussed was the hemp fest. Mr. Bob Moldenauer, explained to the village board that he can not afford to pay for the extra police and fire protection that is in the cities ordinance for that large a gathering.

He let the city know that they had a legal right to be on the grounds, even if they did not rent the pavilion.

Many guests at the meeting had valid questions for Mr. Moldenauer. They wanted to know if he was going to be smoking marijuana down at the park, and if others were?

Mr. Moldenauer responded that he would not, but he could not speak for the other. But he also interjected that smoking marijuana was not illegal.

Chief Terry Ott, responded that it was illegal.

The towns main concern was were are they going to be parking and who would pay for the damages that would occur with that many people.

That was not answered, except that Mr. Moldenauer said that he would make a citizen arrest if he caught anyone doing damage.

The Marina, this was very heated. Citizens are concerned with the safety of their children on 1st Ave if this is the only

access to the marina, and the parking that will be occurring in front of the marina, since the parking lot slated for 10th St. is no longer in the plans.

Many residents are upset that the marina is starting to look like a gravel pit. And they are worried that this will be taking away from their property values.

James Weissmann asked if the city would be condemning properties to help with the parking. He states that in the past other cities up and down the river have done this to help big business move in and take over.

One gentleman requested that the city just go ahead and put in the turn lanes on 10th St. and be done with the problem of 1st Ave, since the IDOT will probably be needing turn lanes on 7th St. as soon as they do a study and see how much traffic will be going down that road.

In other business the dike at the south end of town should be completed soon with all the grants in.

Barrington Drive will be ready for paving soon with water and sewer just about completed.

Village Board News
September 25, 1995

Motion was made to have an ordinance to make a private drive into a city road from Lighthouse development.

Extension was given to contractors doing the work at Barrington from October 31 to December 8, 1995. The city will make sure that the contractor holds to this agreement.

Residents living next to the new construction are concerned as to what will happen if the contractors ask for an extension again and the board assured them that there will be no new extension.

Dike at the south end will be complete by the end of this week.

Questions over the Marina were brought up and hopefully some of the concerns about the parking on first avenue were resolved. The parking from what the council said would have to be on 10th St. and the overflow on the avenue. The town is willing to split the cost of the turn lanes to keep the traffic off 1st Ave. It appears that the town is trying to work with Mr. Mosely, but the citizens who live next to the mound of dirt and the big hole are wondering is it ever going to be done.

Mr. Ropp stated that right now Mr. Mosely is writing the corp. back answering letters that citizens in town have written to the corp. with questions concerning the Marina.

Mr. Moldenauer returned the \$100.00 check unopened. His deposit money back to the city, he also sent a letter explaining his right and several other items.

According to Chief Ott everything was calm no major problems and our park was kept clean and undamaged.

(Personal note: Thank You to the Police Department, the State Police and the County for keeping an eye on our town, especially with the patrols that went through Rt. 84 on a regular basis.)

Letter to the Editor:

To the residents of Hampton;

As most of us are aware, Heart of Hampton Development Corporation has been developing the former quarry along First Avenue into a boat marina and condominium complex.

Initial plans presented to the Army Corps of Engineers and to the Village of Hampton show the main vehicle access to the marina being from IL. Route 84 with a berm or dike surrounding the entire marina.

Most residents of Hampton have the impression that the neighbors to the marina development will be looking at a park-like surroundings, with all vehicle traffic and boat traffic activity and noise being contained within the marina development. At first it was thought that the number of boat slips would be 70 openings for boats greater than 25 feet in length, leading everyone to believe that this marina would be quite manageable and contained.

The most recent plans submitted to the Army Corps of Engineers by the Heart of Hampton Development Corporation for their permit application now indicate that the main vehicle access to the marina will be from 1st Ave with head in parking along 1st Avenue and an increase of slips from 70 to somewhere between 70 to 200 boats of various sizes.

As currently proposed, a new street (10th Street) will intersect Route 84 allowing the most Northerly residents along 1st Avenue access to their homes. This street will also create a new railroad crossing. The railroad will not maintain any additional

crossing, and for this reason 8th Street will close. All traffic will then be routed down 7th street to 1st avenue, then to the newly proposed marina entrance and parking areas.

Hampton residents should be concerned that marina traffic will not only come down 7th street, but down all streets and along 1st Avenue Bike Path, if for no other reason than to enjoy the view of the river. This traffic will not only create immediate danger to children and pedestrians, but interrupt the peaceful and scenic environment that we all have grown to enjoy and expect in our village environment.

Additional traffic that will most certainly exist in lower Hampton also raises another issue. Who will pay for necessary street improvements and continued maintenance? Most likely, Hampton residents will experience some increase in their taxes.

At this point, revenue generated from the marina project remains in question. A projection of revenue income to the village has not been presented to the citizens.

Although this is a private project making use of some limited public assistance, it is imperative that the village take a more active roll to ensure that this project, designed to benefit a few, will not become an eyesore, financial burden and danger to the community as a whole.

Surely the Village Board and Heart of Hampton Development have not only worked with their own interests, but also with the Village's interests at "heart". It is imperative that the residents of the Village of Hampton continue to let the Village Board know what is truly in the "hearts" of Hampton Residents. Sincerely,

Superintendent's View of the School

Dr. Ron Paquette

We are nearing the midpoint of the first quarter of school. After a successful start of school, the first progress reports will go home. Our enrollment on opening day was 225 and has increased since then. We added a classroom aide to assist teachers in grades 1,2,3, & 5 with large class sizes. The Planning Committee of the School Board has worked with the superintendent to formulate goals and specific objectives for this school year to provide the best possible education for all Hampton students.

The focus for much of the activity and resources this school year will center around these six goals with accompanying objectives:

I. Create a safe attractive learning environment for students,

1. by investigating the feasibility of fix/install security light on west side of the building

2. recommend use of the upstairs rooms for special education classrooms

3. develop a building and grounds inspection tool to be used quarterly for scheduled inspections

II. Ensure a sound educational foundation for all students within the financial limitations approved by the board,

1. by facilitating the installation of a telecommunication connection to the River Bend Library

System to increase student access to library resources

2. recommend actions to improve Writing as assessed in the school Improvement Plan

3. establish a schedule for textbook rotation based on a curriculum review process that is consistent with UTHS

4. survey present and former students and parents about interest and need in the school's curriculum like industrial arts and home economics or other courses

III. Encourage students to become responsible citizens,

1. by developing a school-wide citizenship program with weekly and quarterly rewards

2. investigate starting a school store

V. Reach out to the community to improve communications with the village government, the churches and residents as well as facilitate open communications between teachers, school board and parents

1. by creating a monthly superintendent column in Towne Crier

2. attend a majority of school extra curricular activities

3. initiate writing a monthly School News Letter

4. implement a suggestion box for parents, students and teachers that will be reviewed monthly by the Board

VI. Bring our school into the age of technology and computers to assist in an active learning process,

1. by implementing a computer lab for students to use

2. developing staff inservice in use of computers

3. make recommendations to the board about the use of computers in the curriculum

4. apply for technology grants

Many of these goals have been started. Thanks to Mike Graham, Charlie Sward and Mike Toalson our computer lab is programmed with software for student use. A recommendation to lease a classroom in the upstairs to Silvis Mini-Cooperative Special Education was approved by the Board in September. An architect was directed to develop specification to remove asbestos contaminated soil in the cellar. Improving Writing will be a focus of our school improvement activities during inservice this year. This is the second column published in the Towne Crier. The Hampton School News first edition was in September and was available for residents at Porter's store. Thanks to Porter's for offering ice cream cone incentives to students who celebrated international literacy

day by reading with their family. We had 90% of the students successfully involved in celebrating literacy. Amy Meeske and Shelly Wallace along with the superintendent attended a conference on Complex Generated Outcome learning Activities or COLAnet 1. This conference attended by over 200 educators demonstrated use of Internet to assist teachers and students in Authentic

Assessment of Science Literacy Objectives. I just returned from the IASA conference of school superintendents in Springfield. The theme of the conference was Technology. Our school is on it's way to being on-line with current technology tools to assist teachers in delivering and assessing student progress towards learning outcomes that are world class.

Well, The Great Fall Apple Festival is history. We did very well, making over 1,000 dollars in four hours. I made one hundred and seventy apple dumplings and ran out by 2:30. I plan to have classes this winter and teach a few more people how to make apple dumplings so I have a little help next year making apple dumplings. I think I can have a class of four or five. You bring your supplies or I can charge you. Then we can set up a schedule. Call 755-0362.

Guess who the person was I talked to and wanted a recipe in my column. It was Marlene Mohr. We had a discussion about my bread maker. I told her it only had 1 T fat and you can make it with no salt. Then she said you should put it in your column. Then I promptly forgot. When Marlene read my article last month she promptly called me and said she was the person I had talked to but she couldn't remember what it was, but by the time we had completed our conversation on the phone we

both remembered our conversation.

This is the recipe I have converted from the bread machine. I still have to try it out using the machine. This is the recipe I plan to follow:

Soften in 110 degrees of 1/2 cup water. 1 t yeast, add 1/2 cup warm milk 110 degrees, 1 T canola oil, 2 T sugar, 1 cup flour, 1/4 cup oatmeal.

Beat with the electric beater until it looks stretchy. Add 1 cup flour and stir adding another 1/4 cup flour until it leaves the sides of the bowl. then turn out onto a floured board and knead until it is a nice smooth ball. Turn back into bowl and let rise until double. Punch down and let rise again. This should take about 2 hours. Shape into a loaf let rise until it reaches the top of the pan about 1 hour. This depends on the temperature, if it is 90 degrees it will take less time, if it is below 0 it will take longer. Bake 375 degrees for about 45 minutes. It should sound hollow when you thump the loaf with your knuckle. Good luck this makes a 1 lb. loaf in the

bread maker. Mine is a panasonic.

Another recipe I'd like to give you for Halloween is my Apple Peanut Butter Fudge. I don't know where I got this recipe but it is in my apple cookbook at B&B store. I doubled it and it turned out great. This is a person who has failed at making no fail fudge.

Single recipe

6 oz. chocolate chips, 1/2 jar marshmallow creme or 1/2 bag marshmallows, 1/2 cup peanut butter, 1 t vanilla, 2 cups sugar, 2/3 cup apple cider or juice.

Combine first 4 ingredients in a bowl. cook sugar and cider over moderate heat to soft ball stage (240 degrees) remove from heat. Beat in remaining ingredients with a electric mixer. Pour into a 9 inch buttered pan. cool and cut into squares.

I wish to thank all the people that go out of their way to tell me they read and enjoy my column. I'll try next month and come up with some good ideas for Thanksgiving treats.

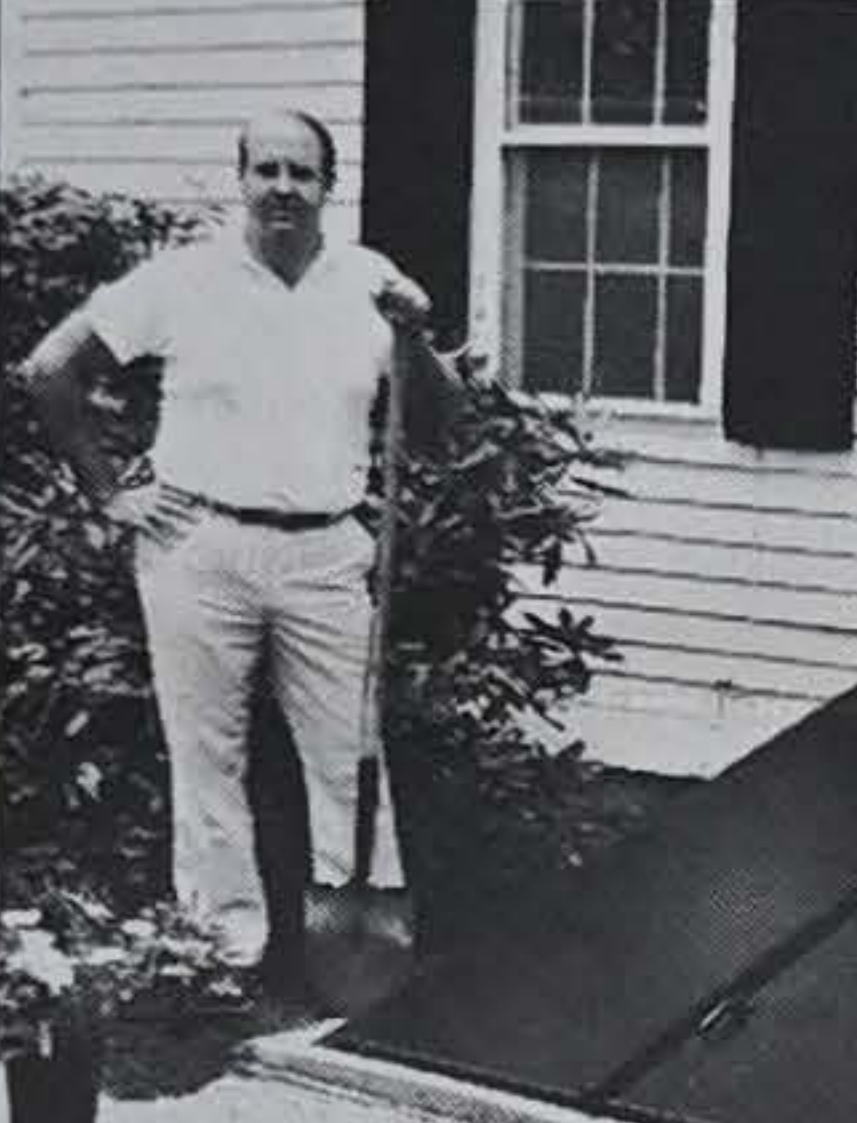

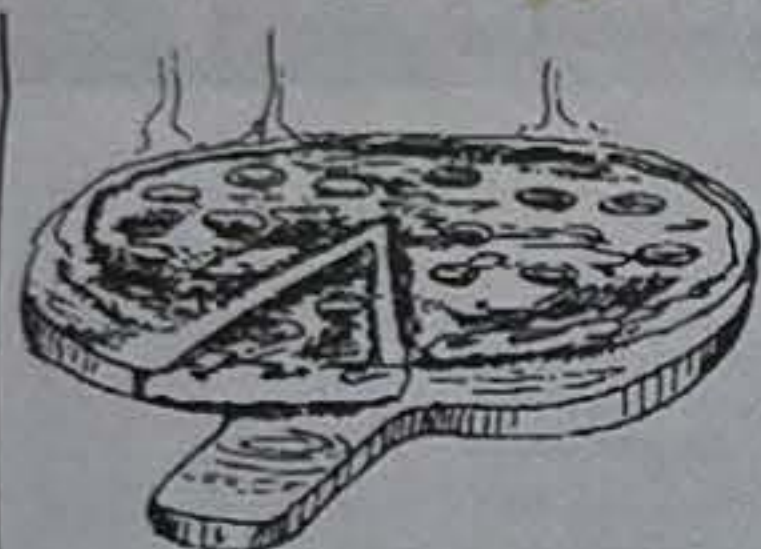
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
